

## AFFIDAVIT OF FOSTER PARENT

I promised his father before he died in the Germantown Hospital to take his son and raise him as my own. I faithfully kept my promise. Residence during this time 5751 Wayne Avenue, and 156 W. Price Street, Germantown, Philadelphia.
