There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

Enter information, as noted below, on reverse side of sheet in the *corresponding numbered space*. This form is supplemental to and is to be forwarded with G. R. S. Form 1-a, reporting reburial locations. To be used in answer to Question 26, Form 114, in case no means of identification on body.

1. Show soldier's name, serial number, rank and organization, and by whom disinterred and reburied.
2. Give date and accurate information as to location from which the body was disinterred and the group and unit which made disinterment.
3. Give date and accurate information as to location of reburial and the group and unit which made reburial, and how reburial was made—in casket, wooden box, etc.
4. State to what degree decomposition has progressed, whether recognition is possible, and how the body was originally buried—in a casket, box, burlap, etc. This statement should be as complete as possible.
5. (a) State whether identification tags were found buried with body and on grave marker by reporting "Yes" or "No".
 (b) State whether or not body appears to have been a hospital case. Were any identifying articles found in or on body or grave? List any personal effects, letters, money-order receipts, and the like found on body or in grave. Give any and all information which it is thought might be of use in identifying the body, other than that tabulated under Item No 6.
6. Give all information as to body description and dental chart as nearly correctly as the condition of the body will allow. Items (e) and (f) under the body description are very important and should be very complete. The dental chart is also very important and should be filled in with great care. There are 32 teeth to be accounted for, as shown by the numbers on the chart. Beginning at the middle line in both upper and lower jaws, the teeth are arranged symmetrically on either side and classed as incisors (cutting teeth), cuspids or canines (tearing teeth), bicuspids (chewing teeth), and molars (principal chewing teeth). An examination should be made and findings charted to cover the following basic conditions: Lost teeth, crowned teeth, bridge work, fillings, caries (cavities of decay), dentures (plates), and any deformity of jaws found.

MISSING TEETH All teeth missing through previous extraction (not those fractured or displaced by recent wounds) should be scratched out, thus:

Dear Sir:

The Quartermaster General is pleased to inform you that the investigation which has been conducted with a view towards locating the grave of your son, the late Private, 1st class, Edward E. Carley, Company C, 101st Infantry, has proved successful. The body was identified in an isolated grave in the Commune of Consenvoye, Meuse, France, and is now in the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery, Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Meuse, France, awaiting instructions as to its final disposition.

There is on file your request for the return of the body to this country for private interment. As some time has elapsed since you made the request, this letter is to inquire whether it is still your desire that this action be taken. If you still wish the return of the remains, they will be brought back on the first available Shipping Board vessel sailing from a channel port. This should be within the next two or three months.

Please understand, it is not the policy of the Department to attempt to influence relatives as to the disposition of their dead, but to endeavor to carry out their wishes so far as is humanly possible. On the other hand the Department is honored when relatives entrust the remains to its care and intends to administer that trust in a manner befitting the service the soldier rendered his country and humanity. If agreeable to you, this office will be glad to receive your permission for burial of the remains of your gallant son among his comrades in Europe and where his grave will be tenderly cared for by a grateful Nation.

As action is suspended pending your decision, it is requested that you kindly reply as soon as possible, using the inclosed envelope, which requires no postage.

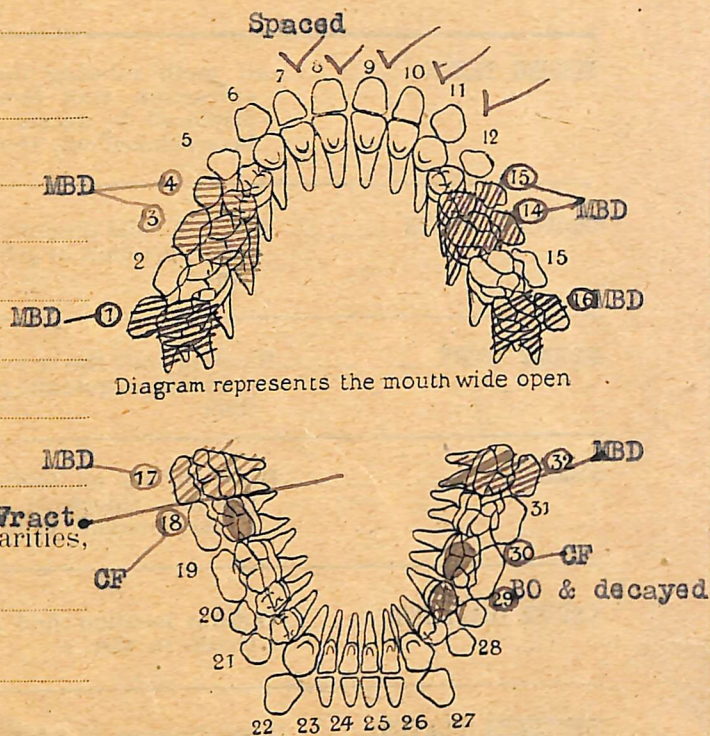
