Reference is made to previous correspondence from this office relative to the pilgrimage of mothers and widows to the cemeteries of Europe under the provisions of the Act of Congress of March 2, 1929.

It is possible that your wife may be eligible to visit your brother's grave under the provisions of the loco parentis clause of the Act which was amended May 15, 1930, to read in part as follows: "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor, or marine becoming eighteen years of age."

In order that it may be determined whether or not she may be eligible to make the trip, it is requested you advise the age of your brother at the time he came to the United States.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of recent date relative to the eligibility of your wife to visit the grave of your brother, the late Private, first class, John D. Gindis, Co. C, 326th Infantry, who is buried in the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery in France.

It is assumed you claim this privilege under the provisions of Section 4 (c) of the Act approved March 2, 1923, which states in part "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces". In determining who is meant by the phrase "who stood in loco parentis", this phrase has been given its usually accepted legal meaning and it has been held that:

- (a) A person cannot stand in loco parentis to an adult who is not incapacitated either mentally or physically.
- (b) In order for a woman to occupy such a status towards a minor or incapacitated adult, she must act the part of a lawful father of such person in performing the duty of providing for him, intending thereby to take the place of the father in this particular.
- (c) In order to receive the benefits of the Act in question, she must have occupied the status toward a particular deceased member of the military or naval forces "for the year prior to the commencement of his service in such forces".

The records indicate that the late Private, first class, John D. Gindis was 22 years and 5 months of age when he enlisted in the Army for service during the World War. As there is a positive showing that the soldier in question was not incapacitated either mentally or physically at the time of his entry into the military service and that he was more than 21 years of age when he enlisted, it is not possible for his sister-in-law to have stood in loco parentis to him for the year immediately preceding the commencement of his service in the Army. Accordingly, it does not appear that the relationship of mother within the meaning of the Act has been established.

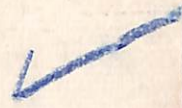

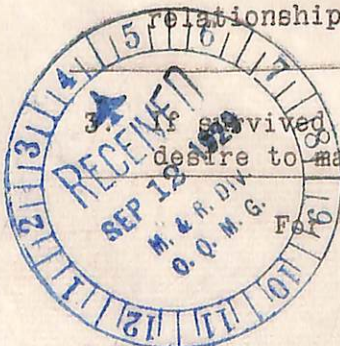

Block B, Meuse-Argonne American cemetery at Romagne-sous-Montfaucon,
Department of Meuse, France.

2. This is one of the permanent American military cemeteries
to be maintained by this Government in Europe. Each grave will be
marked by a headstone of white marble, of suitable design, with name,
rank, organization and date of soldier's death. The headstones will
be placed at all graves in connection with the improvement work now in
progress, as soon as possible and without waiting for special action
or request on the part of relatives.

3. In effecting removal, the utmost care and reverence were
exacted and more than willingly accorded by those performing this
sacred duty. The grave of the deceased will be perpetually main-
tained by this Government in a manner befitting the last resting
place of our heroes.

1. In reply to your letter of January 8, 1921, requesting that the remains of your son, the late Private 1st class John D. Cindis, Company G, 326th Infantry, be returned to you for private interment, you are advised that it will be necessary for you to furnish this office with an affidavit to the effect that the deceased resided in Italy for a period prior to his enlistment in the United States Army, and that you are the legal next of kin to the deceased in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 7, of the inclosed Cemeterial Division Bulletin No.10-F-W. Upon receipt of this information, instructions will be issued that your wishes be complied with.
2. For your information and guidance you are advised that the matter of transferring the body to Italy is subject to the sanitary laws and health regulations of both the country of interment and that to which removal is requested, as well, also, of any intervening country, through which the remains must be transported. Should any of these agencies prevent the transfer desired, the body will be retained in the care and custody of the American Graves Registration Service, Q.M.C. in Europe.
3. The remains of the deceased are now interred in Grave 207, Section 16, Plot 4, Argonne American Cemetery at Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Department of Meuse, which cemetery lies within the combat area "Zone of the Armies", and the officer in charge of European operations estimates that work there will begin about the middle of April next. While work in this Zone is being expedited as much as possible, the magnitude of the task must be realized as well as the many transportation and labor problems, together with unforeseen difficulties to be overcome in this area. It is, therefore, impossible to state at this time when this particular case will be reached.
4. The United States Government bears all expenses in connection with the return of our soldier dead to the place designated for final burial, and your attention is invited to paragraph 6, of the above mentioned Bulletin, on this subject.

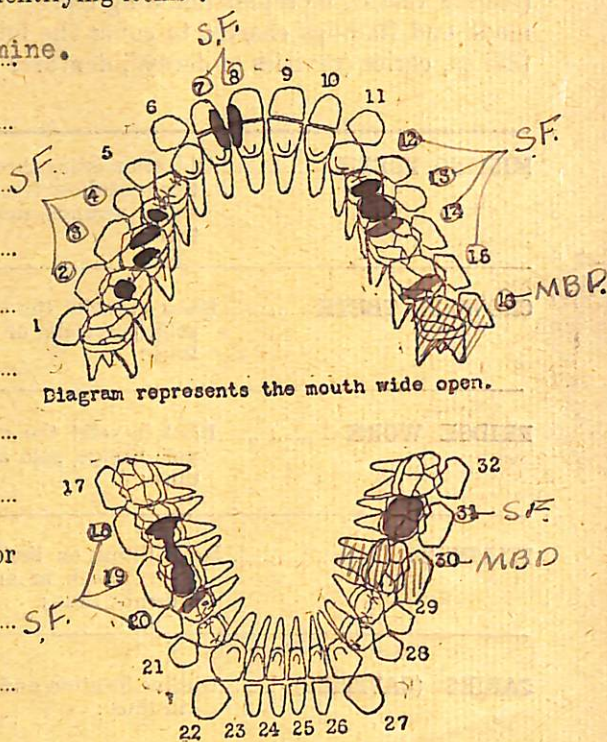

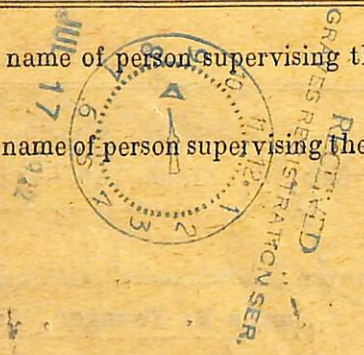
INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE PROPER COMPLETION OF G. R. S. FORM NO. 16-A

Enter information, as noted below, on reverse side of sheet in the *corresponding numbered space*. This form is supplemental to and is to be forwarded with G. R. S. Form 1-a, reporting reburial locations. To be used in answer to Question 26, Form 114, in case no means of identification on body.

1. Show soldier's name, serial number, rank and organization, and by whom disinterred and reburied.
2. Give date and accurate information as to location from which the body was disinterred and the group and unit which made disinterment.
3. Give date and accurate information as to location of reburial and the group and unit which made reburial, and how reburial was made—in casket, wooden box, etc.
4. State to what degree decomposition has progressed, whether recognition is possible, and how the body was originally buried—in a casket, box, burlap, etc. This statement should be as complete as possible.
5. (a) State whether identification tags were found buried with body and on grave marker by reporting "Yes" or "No".
 (b) State whether or not body appears to have been a hospital case. Were any identifying articles found in or on body or grave? List any personal effects, letters, money-order receipts, and the like found on body or in grave. Give any and all information which it is thought might be of use in identifying the body, other than that tabulated under Item No. 6.
6. Give all information as to body description and dental chart as nearly correctly as the condition of the body will allow. Items (e) and (f) under the body description are very important and should be very complete. The dental chart is also very important and should be filled in with great care. There are 32 teeth to be accounted for, as shown by the numbers on the chart. Beginning at the middle line in both upper and lower jaws, the teeth are arranged symmetrically on either side and classed as incisors (cutting teeth), cuspids or canines (tearing teeth), bicuspid (chewing teeth), and molars (principal chewing teeth).
