Dear Sir:

The Quartermaster General desires you to be advised, in reply to your letter of the 15th instant, addressed to the Graves Registration Service Hoboken, N.J. and forwarded to this office for consideration, that the photographs of original burial places of our soldier dead in Europe were made by the Red Cross, but it does not appear from records here that the original grave of your late brother, 1st Lieutenant Fred E. Clark, Company M, 120th Infantry, was photographed, and it is, of course, now too late. The Red Cross did the best they could, under very trying circumstances, to secure photographs of all graves, and a great many had to be retaken because the first attempt was not a success. This may have been the case in this instance and the photographers did not find it possible to return for a second effort.

There is no appropriation by the Government for photographing graves, but the Graves Registration Service in Europe has been making some photographs, using supplies left by the Red Cross in Paris. If these are still available, and somewhat qualified to make photographs, remains in the Service, it is thought that a photograph of the present grave can be secured. Therefore, request to that effect is being made this date to the Chief, American Graves Registration Service, Q.M.C. in Europe.

The present grave of this soldier is, Grave 27, Row 6, Block A, Somme American Cemetery at Bony, Department of Aisne, France. This cemetery has been designated for permanent retention and you are assured the grave will be marked by an appropriate headstone of white marble and will be tenderly and fittingly cared for by this Government for all time.

The Quartermaster General desires that you be informed that the permanent grave of 1st Lieutenant Fred E. Clark, Company M, 120th Infantry, is Grave 27, Row 6, Block A, Somme American Cemetery at Bony, Department of Aisne, France.

This is one of the permanent American military cemeteries to be maintained by this Government in Europe. Each grave will be marked by a headstone of white marble, of suitable design, with name, rank, organization, date of soldier's death and State from which he came. The headstones will be placed at all graves in connection with the improvement work now in progress, as soon as possible and without waiting for special action or request on the part of relatives.

In effecting removal, the utmost care and reverence were exacted and more than willingly accorded by those performing this sacred duty. The grave of the deceased will be perpetually maintained by this Government in a manner befitting the last resting place of our heroes.
