The map attached shows the location of the eight permanent American Military Cemeteries in Europe. The records show that 81,155 members of the American Expeditionary forces gave their lives during the World War. At the request of relatives 46,296 of these were returned to the United States, 605 were sent to other countries, 74 were left in their original graves outside of permanent American cemeteries, 32 removed to Lafayette Escadrille Memorial, 29 Special cases (returned at private expense, cremated, turned over to relatives, etc.) and 30,818 are now buried in the cemeteries described below. Approximately 3,301 bodies have not yet been recovered, of which number 1,798 were lost and buried at sea.

The Meuse-Argonne American Military Cemetery near Romagne contains 14,187 graves. The soldiers who rest in this cemetery came from almost every Division in the American Expeditionary Forces, most of them having given their lives in the Meuse-Argonne operation.

The St. Mihiel American Military Cemetery near Thiaucourt contains the graves of 4,152 soldiers, the majority of whom were members of the American Divisions attacking in the great offensive action of our First Army which resulted in the reduction of the St. Mihiel salient.

The Oise-Aisne American Military Cemetery near Fere-en-Tardenois contains 6,012 graves. The majority of the battle dead who sleep here are from the divisions that fought in the vicinity of the Ourcq River and in the territory from there to the north as far as the Oise River.

The Aisne-Marne American Military Cemetery near Belleau Wood contains 2,284 graves. The majority of the soldiers buried here are from units that fought in the immediate vicinity and along the Marne River.

The Somme American Military Cemetery near Bony contains 1830 graves. Most of the soldiers buried in this cemetery were members of the 27th and 30th Divisions who fell in the vicinity, as well as those of the 1st Division who gave their lives in the operations near Cantigny, and of the 33d and 80th Divisions, who fell in the operations while serving with the British.

The Flanders Field American Military Cemetery near Waeregheim, Belgium, contains 366 graves. The soldiers buried here are mainly those of the 37th and 91st Divisions who died in this part of Flanders and of the 27th and 30th Divisions who fell near Ypres.

The Suresnes American Military Cemetery near Suresnes contains 1534 graves. The soldiers buried here came from various organizations, and many of them died in hospitals in Paris or vicinity.

The Brookwood American Military Cemetery located in England twenty-eight miles southwest of London contains 453 graves, consisting of those members of the American Expeditionary Forces who lost their lives in England, Scotland and Ireland or in surrounding waters during the war.


NORTH SEA

Cemetery indicated by symbol and name of a nearby town } THUS:  **BONY**





From Xray and clinical examination we are of the opinion that the tumor mass on the left leg is a myositis ossificans, slowly progressive in which the muscles and soft parts of the left calf has been invaded by osteo-blasts. These however do not apparently arise from the interstitial elements of the soft parts themselves and not from the bones. The Tibia and Fibula are not involved and the comparatively little invasions of the osteoblasts into the tissues between the tibia and fibula account for the lack of disturbance of the blood supply of the foot, the invasions is traveling slowly up into the popliteal space but from the history and the slow progress of the case, I believe that Her normal life span will have ended before this condition spreads enough to cut off the circulation and produce an acute surgical condition.

The case is a rare and interesting one- thanks for sending it.

It is assumed you request the privilege of making this pilgrimage for Mrs. Bolger, under the provisions of Section 4 (a) of the Act, which states in part "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces". In determining who is meant by the term "who stood in loco parentis", this phrase has been given its usually accepted legal meaning and it has been held that:

- (a) A person cannot stand in loco parentis to an adult who is not incapacitated either mentally or physically.
- (b) In order for a woman to occupy such a status towards a minor or incapacitated adult, she must act the part of a lawful father of such person in performing the duty of providing for him, intending thereby to take the place of the father in this particular.
- (c) In order to receive the benefits of the Act in question, she must have occupied the status toward a particular deceased member of the military or naval forces "for the year prior to the commencement of his service in such forces".

The records indicate that your brother, the late Lieutenant Daniel M. Connolly was 23 years of age when he was commissioned in the Army for service during the World War. There is a positive showing that he was not incapacitated either mentally or physically at the time of his entry into the military service and that he was more than 21 years of age when he was commissioned. The Quartermaster General desires you to be informed, in reply to your letter dated September 9th, 1925, that the records of this office show as follows:

1st Lieutenant Francis J. Connolly, Attached to the 32nd Aero Squadron, presumed killed in action, July 18th, 1918, WITHOUT A GRAVE LOCATION.

2nd Lieutenant Daniel M. Connolly, Company A, 312th Inf., reported buried Oct. 22nd, 1918 at coordinates 92.0, 85.6, Busancy Map 1/20,000, by Chaplain Harry S. Davidowitz of the 312th Inf., without definite record regarding the officer's identification tags.

When the Graves Registration Unit went to Plot A, American Battle Area Cemetery, Grandpre, Ardennes, they reported the body found in Grave 1, as "Lt. Connolly". It appears that this data was then recorded on the case of Lt. Francis J. Connolly, and reporting him with a reburial from this Grave #1, to Grave 189, Section 55, Plot 4, Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery, Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Meuse, France, instead of Lt. Daniel M. Connolly. This entry was found erroneous and the same was due to the fact that the burial slip merely showed "Lt. Connolly".

The body in question bears Lieutenant Bars and officer's collar ornament on blouse with teeth 14, 19 and 29 reported missing before death. This dental information checked with that reported for Lt. Daniel M. Connolly at time of enlistment. Therefore, this body is now carried as this officer.

Dental information for Lt. Francis J. Connolly is recorded as, teeth 17 and 20 missing before death. His case is now under investigation and every effort will be made by the Department to locate his grave. In the event of any favorable developments, you will be informed.
