
Dear Madam:



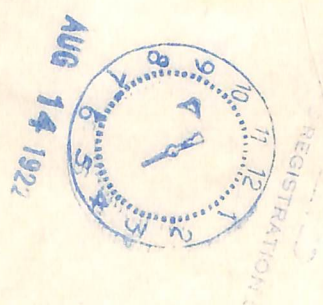
