It appears from the files of this office that a woman posing as the widow of the late Herbert A. Cooley made the pilgrimage to Europe under the provisions of the Act of Congress for the purpose, but the fact that she made the trip illegally was not brought to the attention of this office until after her pilgrimage was completed.

There appears to be nothing this office can do in the matter and the case is considered closed.

In reply to your correspondence, the name of the soldier is ²⁹³Herbert Cooley XC-100-787, this woman was my wife from 1922 to 1939, what I don't understand is this, how is it that my name never appeared on any government correspondence, I never was able to get this information whether she was entitled to this trip to France or not, most people I talked to say no, I talked to the parents of the boy Mrs. Royal A. Cooley Route 1 Box 119 Fruitport Mich, the mother said she had an invitation but did not go on account of her age, my former wife told me the U. S. Government invited her to go cause Mrs. R. Cooley said it was all right for her to go. I think if this office would investigate her case thorough with me, certainly will find that there is a lot of dirty work behind this woman. Her name is starting with her maiden name is Anna Starfield, Anna Johnson Anna Cooley Anna Langlois Anna Kletz, her government checks of \$7.50 were always sent in the name of A. E. Cooley Langlois Box 248 Muskegon Mich Post Office. My name don't even appear here in Muskegon when she was getting \$20.00 a month for her daughter Isabel June Cooley, I was hidden for some reason, although I raised the child from the age of four. I could write a lot, but am able to explain better from person to person.

I am living here in Chicago with my brother at the present time. I have been doing a lot of investigating on my own part. Another thing the boys father said, he can't understand is that when his boy was killed in France, he was not married to his son, but some how they made Anna Johnson his wife a common law wife, although he was dead; in other words how can they marry a woman to a dead man, according to Mr. Cooley that's what was done. I just want to make a direct contact with this office, I still believe there was a lot of smooth work pulled on the U. S. Government. Also was she entitled to soldier's Michigan State Bonus. I even wrote to Chicago Tribune Law Dept. Well lets hear from you, I certainly will give you all the help I can.

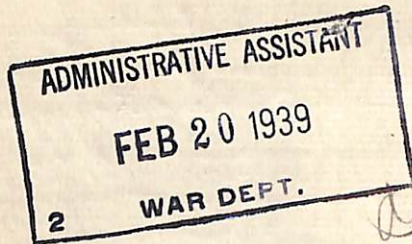

Dear Madam:

The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries Of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

In order to assure proper and satisfactory accommodations for the mothers and widows making the journey in 1933, reservations for steamship transportation must be made by this office several months in advance. It is requested that you answer the questions below by writing "Yes" or "No" or "Undecided" in the blank space following the question. When you have answered the question, sign your name and return this sheet in the enclosed addressed envelope which requires no postage. PLEASE DO NOT DELAY, as it is essential that the information be in this office promptly.

This letter is being sent to all eligible mothers and widows who did not make the pilgrimage during the years 1930, 1931 or 1932. There is enclosed a circular of information WHICH YOU SHOULD READ VERY CAREFULLY BEFORE MAKING YOUR DECISION.
