





Diagram represents the mouth wide open

Referring to your letter of recent date, I beg leave to advise you that while the Department is not advised in individual cases, it is understood that it has not been the policy of those having the matter in charge to cremate any of the bodies of the soldiers for burial. When the work of the general transfer of the bodies is begun, the remains will be returned to this country in hermetically sealed metal, or metal-lined caskets.

While indefinite promise cannot be made at this time, that the bodies will be buried in any particular Cemetery, on account of the lack of available space, it will be the policy of the Department to meet the wishes of relatives, in so far as it is practicable.

It is desired to express the sincere sympathy of the Department on account of the great loss you have sustained in the death of your son, and to commend you for the contribution made to the cause for which this soldier gave his life.




