Thank you all, and welcome to the White House. As I like to say, *mi casa blanca es su casa blanca*. We're gathered to celebrate the contributions of Hispanic Americans to our national life. In a few moments I will also sign an executive order creating a Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans, to open new doors of opportunity for Hispanic boys and girls across America.

Judge Gonzales, thank you for the introduction – and thanks for coming to Washington with me. I always count on Judge Gonzales for good counsel, and I'm proud to have him at my side.

I thank the young ladies and gentlemen who have led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. These past weeks have given new meaning to those old words, and only deepened our allegiance to our Nation and its flag.

Jaci Velasquez, thank you for singing the National Anthem with such feeling and beauty.

Gloria Estefan, it's good to have you here. Emilio came to the White House for Cinco de Mayo, and we told him, "Nice to see you. Next time, bring Gloria."

I'm grateful to Luis Palau for leading us in an invocation. And I thank all of our other distinguished guests for joining us today.

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Also with us today are three men who represent the thousands of Hispanic Americans who serve in law enforcement and public safety: Anthony Miranda of the Latino Police Officers Association; Louis Hernandez of the Hispanic Society of the New York City Police Department; and Miguel Ramos of the Hispanic Society of the New York City Fire Department. Gentlemen, you are here today as our honored guests.

This is a time of great national unity. We have been brought together by shared grief. We have also been inspired by acts of incredible kindness and heroism. That is part of the good that has come out of an immense tragedy. In a moment of crisis, we have all come to realize how much we need each other.

Our enemies are learning a thing or two about America as well. They are learning that we cannot be cowed or divided by hardship. They are learning that we are a Nation made up of many cultures, races, and religions – but we are still one Nation. We have suffered loss together. We have entered a new struggle together. And together, we will prevail.

The diversity of America has always been a great strength of our country. Here you can be proud of your cultural heritage, proud of your ancestry, proud of your native language – and still be every inch an American.

We see this spirit of pride today most vividly in the ties between our country and the people of Latin America. A lifetime in Texas gave me many things I'm thankful for, and one of them is an appreciation of Hispanic culture. Hispanic life, Hispanic culture and values, are inseparable from the life of my state. And they have become inseparable from the life of our Nation.

This month, our country recognizes just how much we owe to Hispanic culture – and more important, to the Hispanic Americans we are proud to call our fellow citizens. And as we do so, we recognize as well our obligation to ensure that every American has an equal place in our society, from the earliest years in life. This Nation of immigrant heritage believes that all children, whatever their circumstances, deserve a chance to learn and rise in the world.

This principle has guided my education reforms, as we work to raise the standards of public schools across America, and bring new hope to every classroom and every child. The task force I am authorizing today will help chart the path to greater achievement among Hispanic-American students in every part of our country. I am pleased to sign the order in such distinguished company, and I thank you all for joining us today.

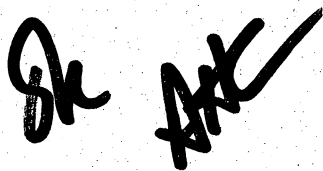
