Dear Mr. President:

We are convinced that dissident voices need to be a part of the discourse surrounding the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

Yet we are concerned that these voices may be circumvented by an institutional process within the State Department that has frustrated Republican and Democratic presidents alike. We refer to "clientitis," whereby career foreign service officers advocate for the views of their host governments rather than the interests of the United States. Typically these institutional tensions have been most evident within the regional bureaus, which include the East Asia Pacific Bureau with jurisdiction over the China desk. We are concerned that those clamoring for "good relations" within the State Department have triumphed over those in the functional bureaus championing cross-cutting issues of human rights and religious freedom—both serious weaknesses for China and as such inconvenient realities in any diplomatic discourse.

To account for these institutional challenges and blind-spots, we urge you to meet with several leading Chinese dissidents in America whose own life experiences speak directly to the brutality of the Chinese government. Several suggestions follow, but there are many others.

Harry Wu, a 2002 Nobel Peace Prize nominee, spent 19 years in 12 different Chinese labor camps. He was beaten, tortured and nearly starved to death. Through his tireless advocacy at the Laogai Research Foundation, he exposed the brutality of China's forced labor camps—the historical equivalent of the Soviet gulags.

Bob Fu attended People's University in Beijing and was a leader of the student democracy movement that culminated in the 1989 Tiananmen Square massacre. By 1992, he was pastoring a house church of 30 students, and had started a bible school with his wife. In May 1996, after secret police discovered the school, both he and his wife were imprisoned. Upon their release they fled to Hong Kong as tourists, applied repeatedly for visas, and arrived in America days before the British hand-over of Hong Kong. In 2002, he founded the China Aid Association which draws attention to the ongoing persecution of house-church Christians.

Wei Jingsheng, also known as the "Father of Chinese Democracy," was arrested in 1979 and sentenced to 15 years of prison, mostly in solitary confinement. Upon his release in 1993, he worked to revive the democracy movement in China which had suffered a devastating blow with Tiananmen Square. Shortly after meeting with the then U.S. assistant secretary for human rights, he was again detained incommunicado, and then subject to a show trial and sentencing of 14 more years. International pressure for Wei's release mounted and he was exiled in 1997. He is the recipient of the Sakharov Prize for Freedom of Thought, named after the famed Soviet dissident Andrei Sakharov.

Rebiya Kadeer, herself a Nobel Prize nominee, is a champion of the rights of the Uyighur Muslim ethnic group in northwest China. She was detained in August 1999 on her way to meet a visiting congressional delegation and convicted of endangering state security, even though the local newspapers she was carrying at the time of her arrest were all publicly available. She was tried in secret and sentenced to eight years in prison. Following intense international pressure, her sentence was reduced by one year. While her advocacy has continued here in the states, several of her 11 children still in China have faced ongoing harassment, detentions and even imprisonment.

And finally, Sasha Gong, author of Born American, formed an underground dissident group in China as a young woman, which produced writings urging people to consider democracy and rule of law. She was jailed for nearly a year and subject to intense interrogation. Hers is a remarkable story of achievement in the face of oppression—shortly after being freed from prison she sat for the national university entrance exam and despite never having completed elementary school, achieved the highest score among 200,000 students. She eventually earned a fellowship to Harvard and is now an acclaimed scholar and activist in the United States.

Just over a year ago, you delivered a compelling speech at Czernin Palace in Prague, during which you announced your intention to have Secretary Rice send a directive to every U.S. ambassador in an un-free nation to seek out and meet with "activists for democracy...those who demand human rights." We have in our own country individuals of that caliber who can speak with authority about the nature and the scope of Chinese abuses embodied in the slave labor camps, the suppression of free speech, and the arbitrary arrest and persecution of people of faith. We urge you to seek them out and meet with them, prior to travelling to Beijing, that you might be equipped with first-hand accounts that shape your public statements about the Chinese government.

Do not underestimate the power of your words and the hope they can provide to thousands who feel silenced and forgotten. When famed Soviet dissident Natan Sharansky was asked if there were moments in the gulag that he could recall being sources of strength and encouragement to him and his fellow prisoners, his answer was an unequivocal, yes. He recalled, *"It was the great brilliant moment when we learned that Ronald Reagan had proclaimed the*

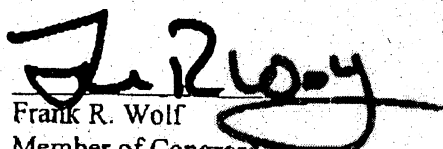

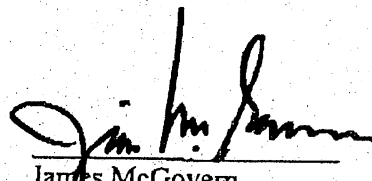
Soviet Union an Evil Empire before the entire world.... This was the moment. It was the brightest, most glorious day. Finally a spade had been called a spade."

We are confident you will call a spade a spade after meeting with these brave individuals who have suffered a the hands of the Chinese government.

Dear Mr. Wolf:

Thank you for your letter of July 31 to President Bush expressing appreciation for his decision to meet with five human rights activists prior to traveling to China. Your letter also suggested that he deliver a public address on human rights while in Beijing. We have been asked to respond on the President's behalf.

During his recent trip to Beijing, the President discussed human rights and religious freedom directly with President Hu and other senior officials. He also reaffirmed in his public remarks the promotion of internationally recognized human rights and religious freedom as a key element of our China policy.

We have consistently urged China's government to use the opportunity of the Olympics to demonstrate greater openness and tolerance. As President Bush said in Beijing, we must "continue to be candid about our belief that all people should have the freedoms to say what they think and worship as they choose."

We thank you for your keen interest in China and your continued strong support for human rights and human rights defenders.
