Will you tell the Secretary to arrange for the two ceremonies and it is my suggestion that they take place, if possible, at the Brooklyn Navy Yard? Also to find out what day in early August is King Haakon's birthday. An invitation to be sent to the Crown Princess of Norway; and to find out from the Netherlands Ambassador if there is any anniversary date in Netherlands' history for turning over the "Queen Wilhelmina" to the Dutch and that the Princess Juliana be invited to the ceremony either in New York or Boston.

It is of the utmost importance, however, that the Norwegian Embassy and the Netherlands Embassy assemble their crews beforehand and that there is very little time left to do this.

This will acknowledge your memorandum of June 17 dealing with the gift to Norway, under Lend-Lease, of one of our 173-foot sub chasers and a similar craft to be given to the Netherlands. x 4193

I think this would be a very gracious act and I am taking steps at once to have the plan put into effect. When the plans are a little further along with respect to the details, I will advise you as to the progress made. Do you desire the Navy Department to make the arrangements for the two ceremonies, or will that be handled by the White House?

MEMORANDUM FOR

THE SECRETARY OF THE NAVY

Sometime ago I took up the possibility of our giving (Lend-Lease) one of our 173 footers to Norway on the King's seventieth birthday on August third (I think that is the correct date). Operations told me there was no reason why this could not be done. We can take one of the 173 footers, which have just gone into commission, transfer the command to a Norwegian crew which can readily be found in this country and, at the same time, give her the name "King Haakon VII" and have her recommissioned under the Norwegian flag.

It is my thought that this ship can properly be put into escort duty from here to Iceland or from Halifax to Iceland and that the Norwegian Navy would be glad to do this. I would let the Norwegian crew handle her during the shakedown period.

We might make a bit of a ceremony out of this and the Crown Princess can be invited to be present, together with the Norwegian Ambassador.

A little later on I think we should do the same thing for the Netherlands, naming one of our 173 footers "The Queen Wilhelmina." The Queen (who may be in this country a little later) or the Princess Juliana could be invited to the ceremony, and I think the Dutch Navy can provide a crew.

As there is not very much time left, will you please go ahead and put this whole thing through?

My dear Mr. President:

Referring to our conversation on April 2nd I take the liberty to ask now that Mr. Harry Hopkins has returned from London whether it would be possible for me to get in touch with him concerning the possibility of celebrating King Haakon's seventieth birthday in the way suggested by me.

At the same time I take the opportunity of mentioning that our Prime Minister, Mr. Nygaardsvold, who has arrived in this country, expects to see you in the near future. Of course he will be introduced in the proper way by our Minister, but I know that it is Mr. Nygaardsvold's very earnest desire to have an opportunity of a private talk with you later on. He is rather shy about speaking English in the presence of his compatriots, feeling that he has learned it in the lumber camps of Oregon, and along the railroad tracks in the middle and the far west when he worked here as a young man. And he also feels that he might want to have an opportunity of discussing certain things with you without any protocol or officialdom. So if you, at any time, should see fit when you have first met him to call him to a private talk, I know that nothing could give him a greater satisfaction.

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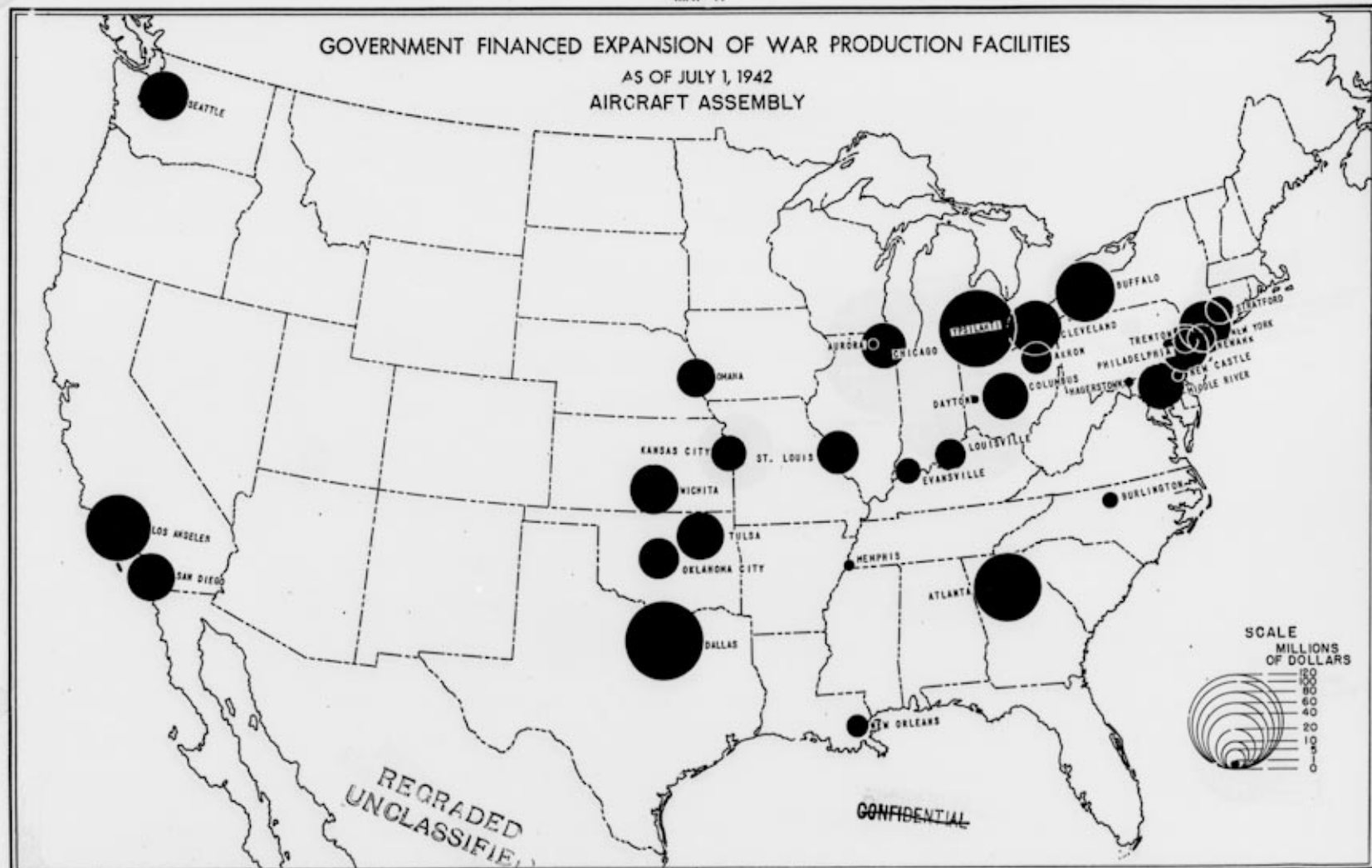

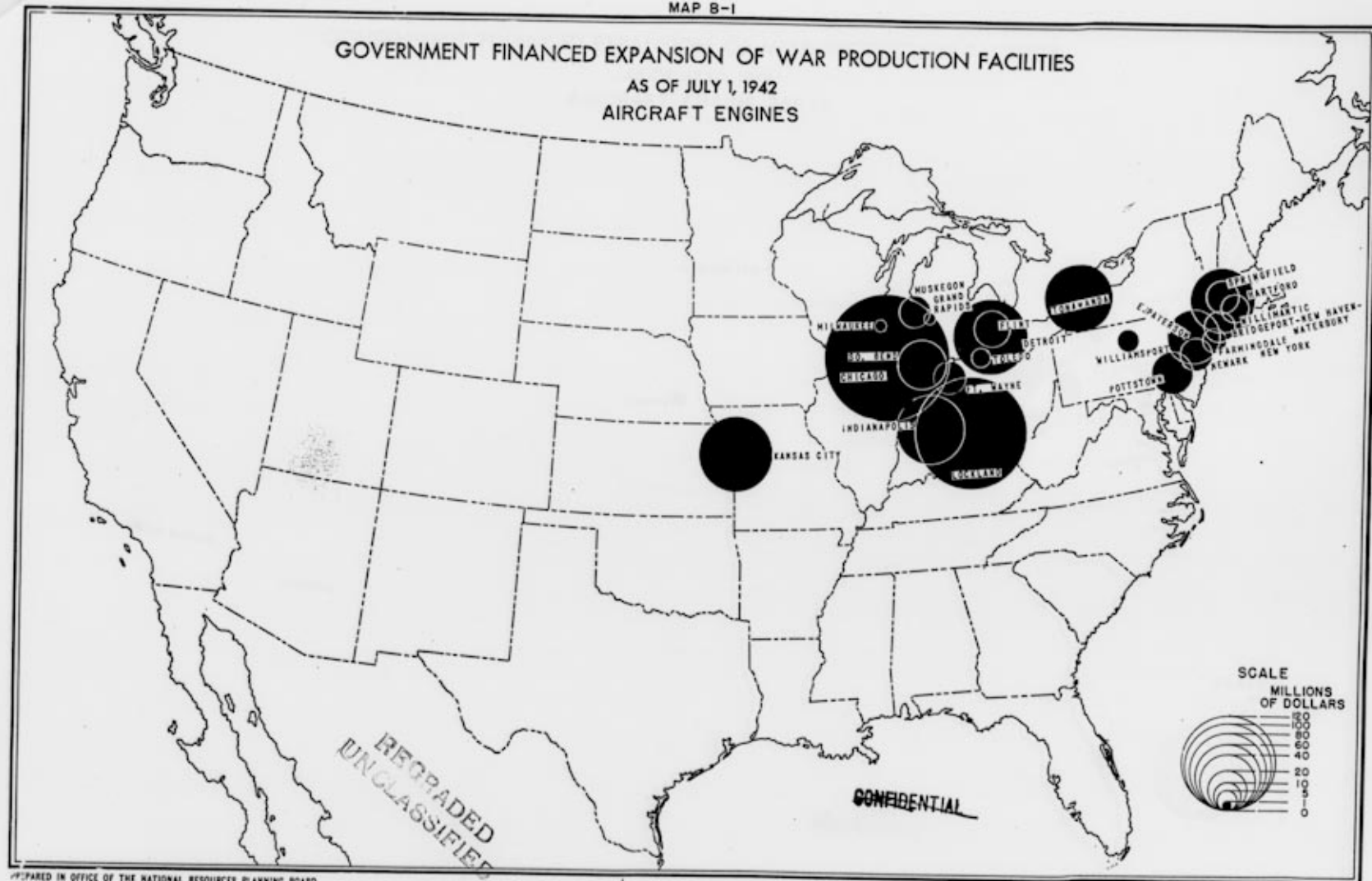

AIRCRAFT ASSEMBLY



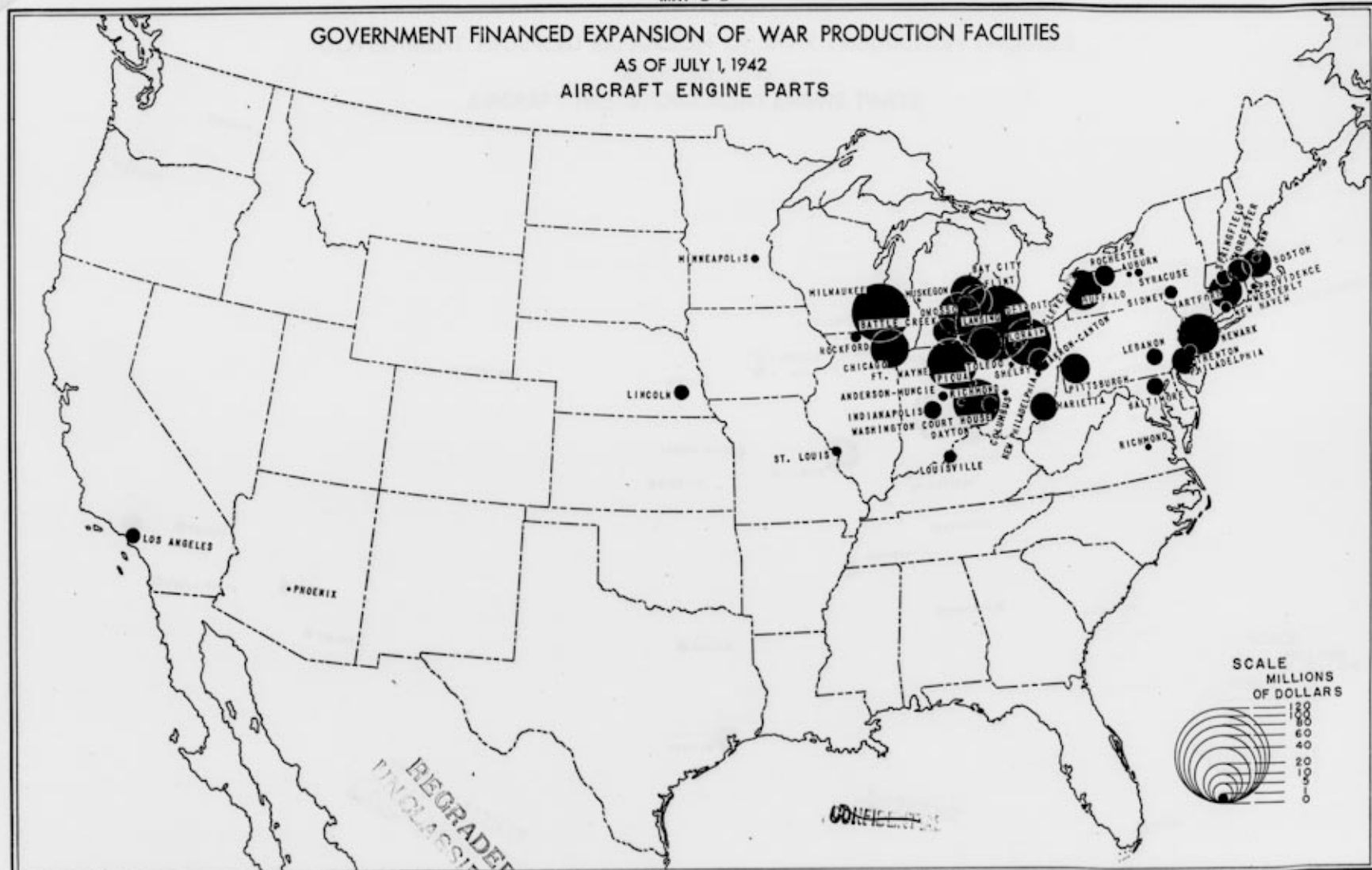

AIRCRAFT ENGINE PARTS

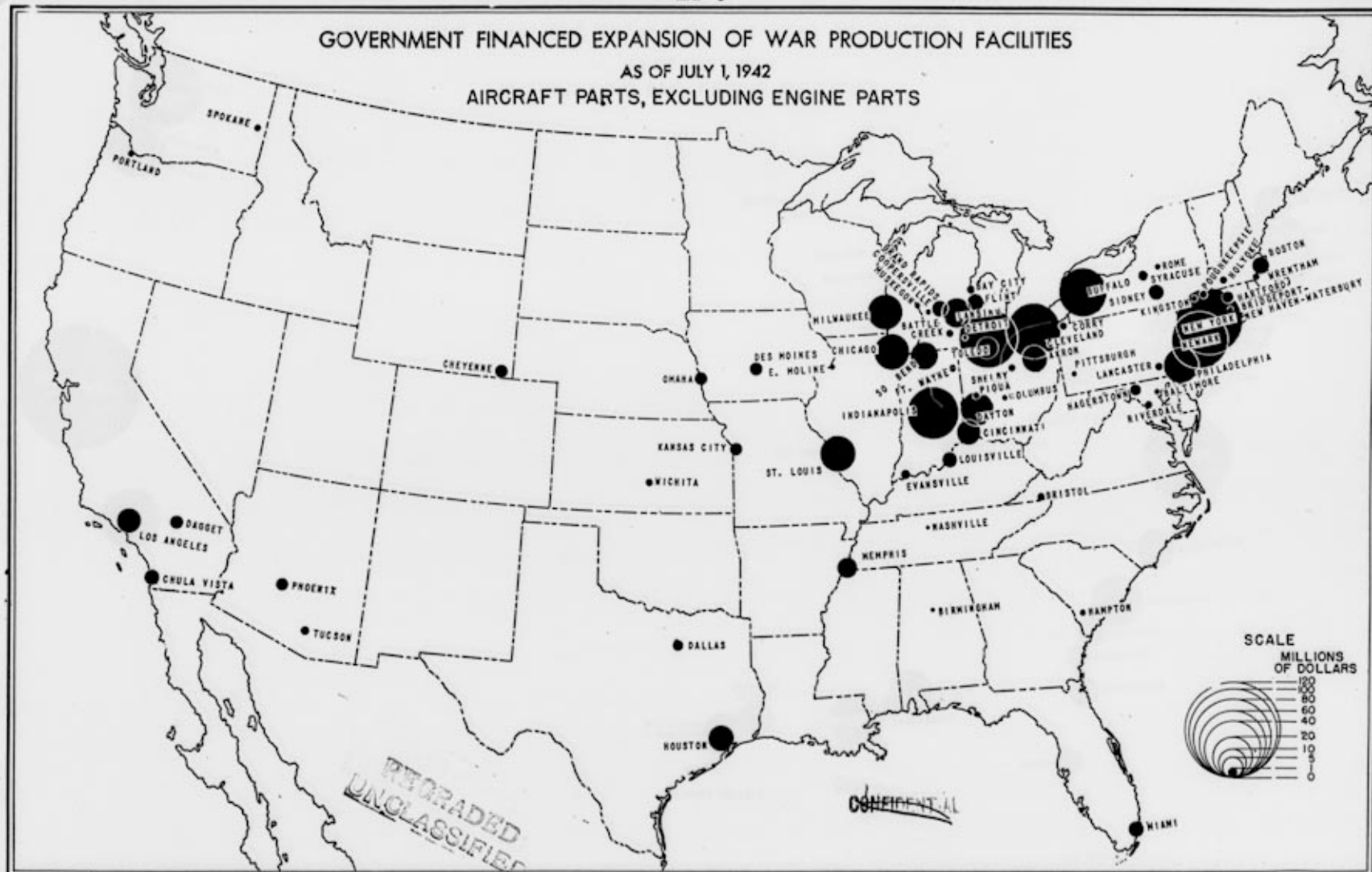

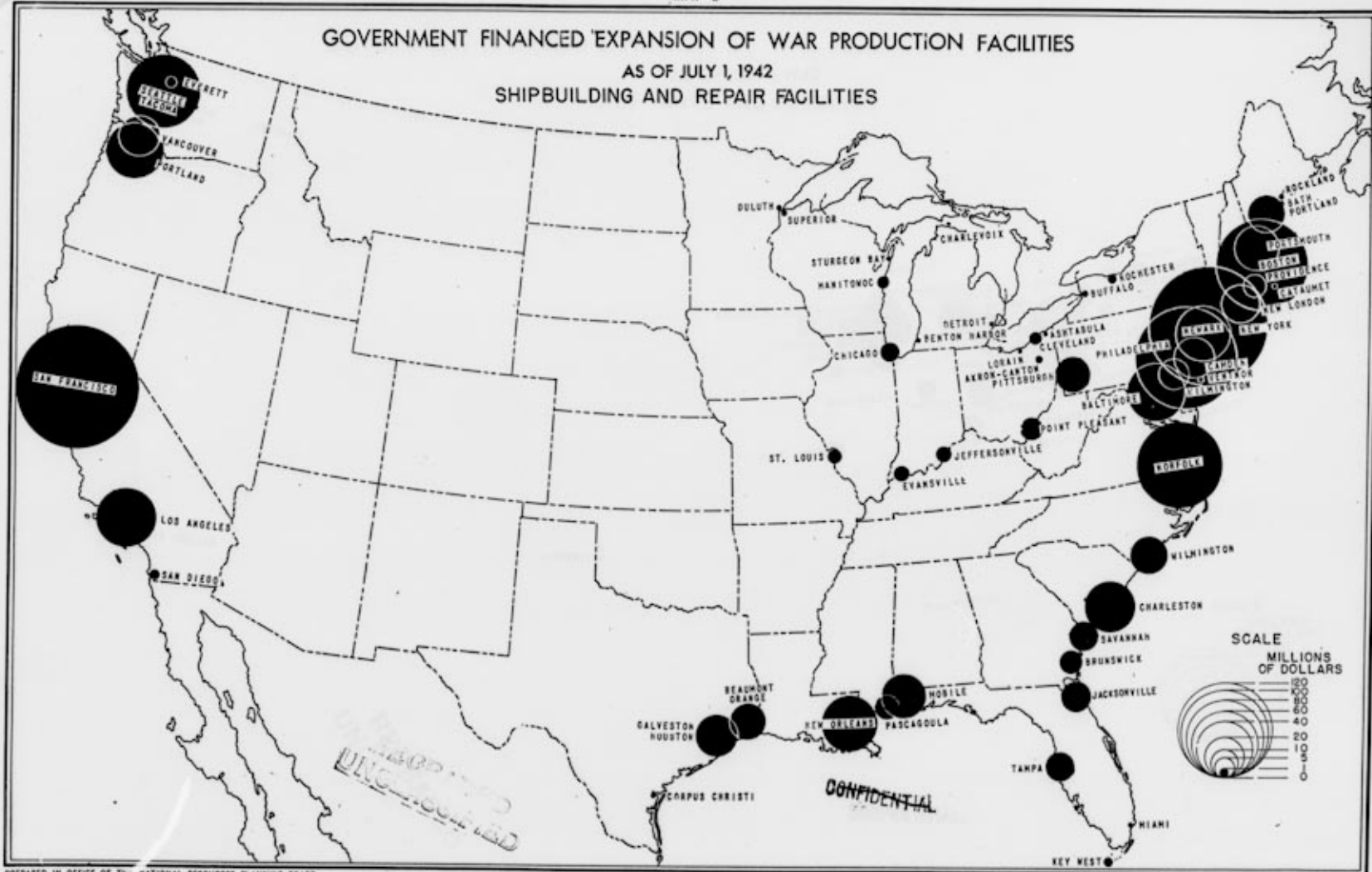

AIRCRAFT PARTS, EXCLUDING ENGINE PARTS



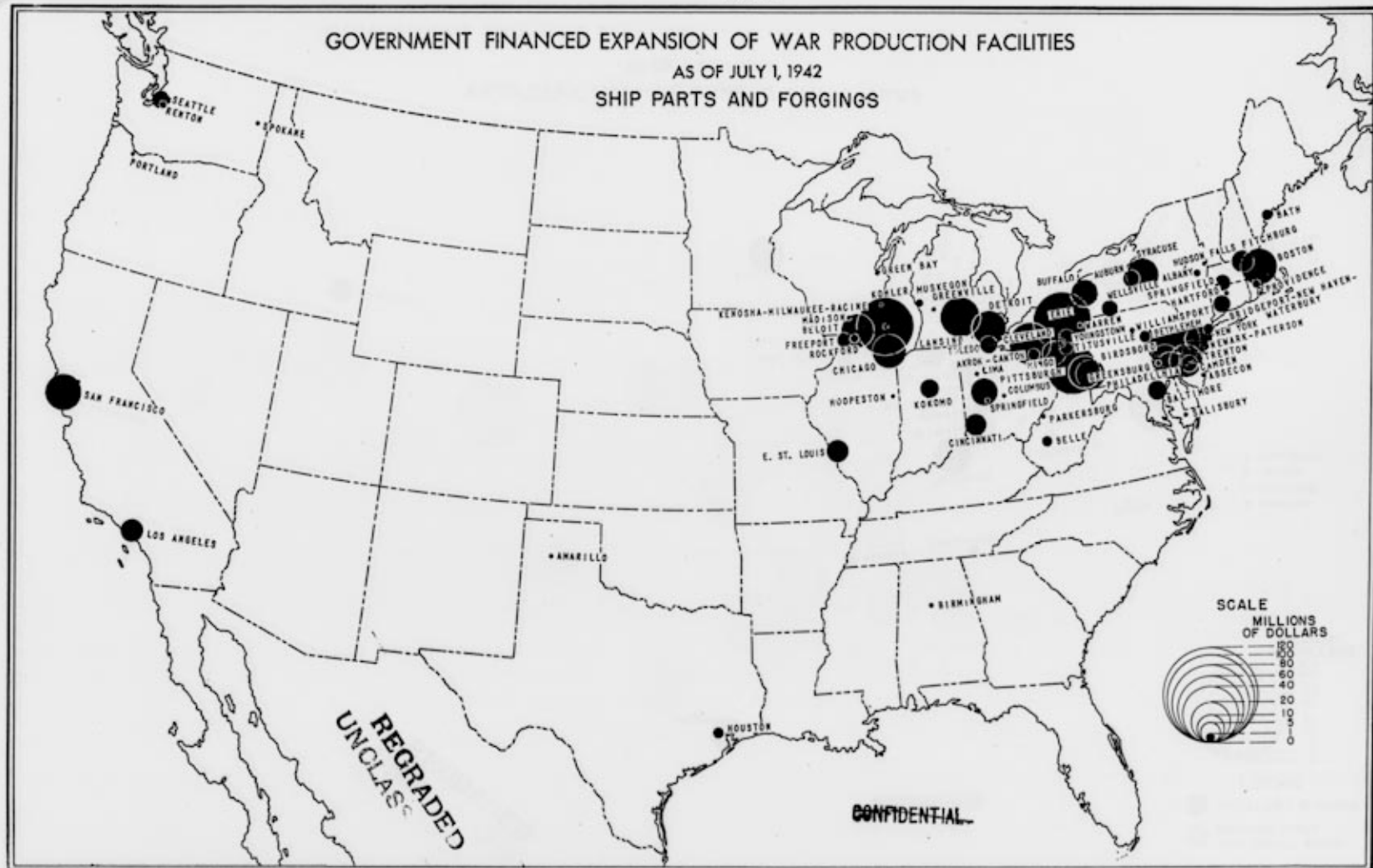

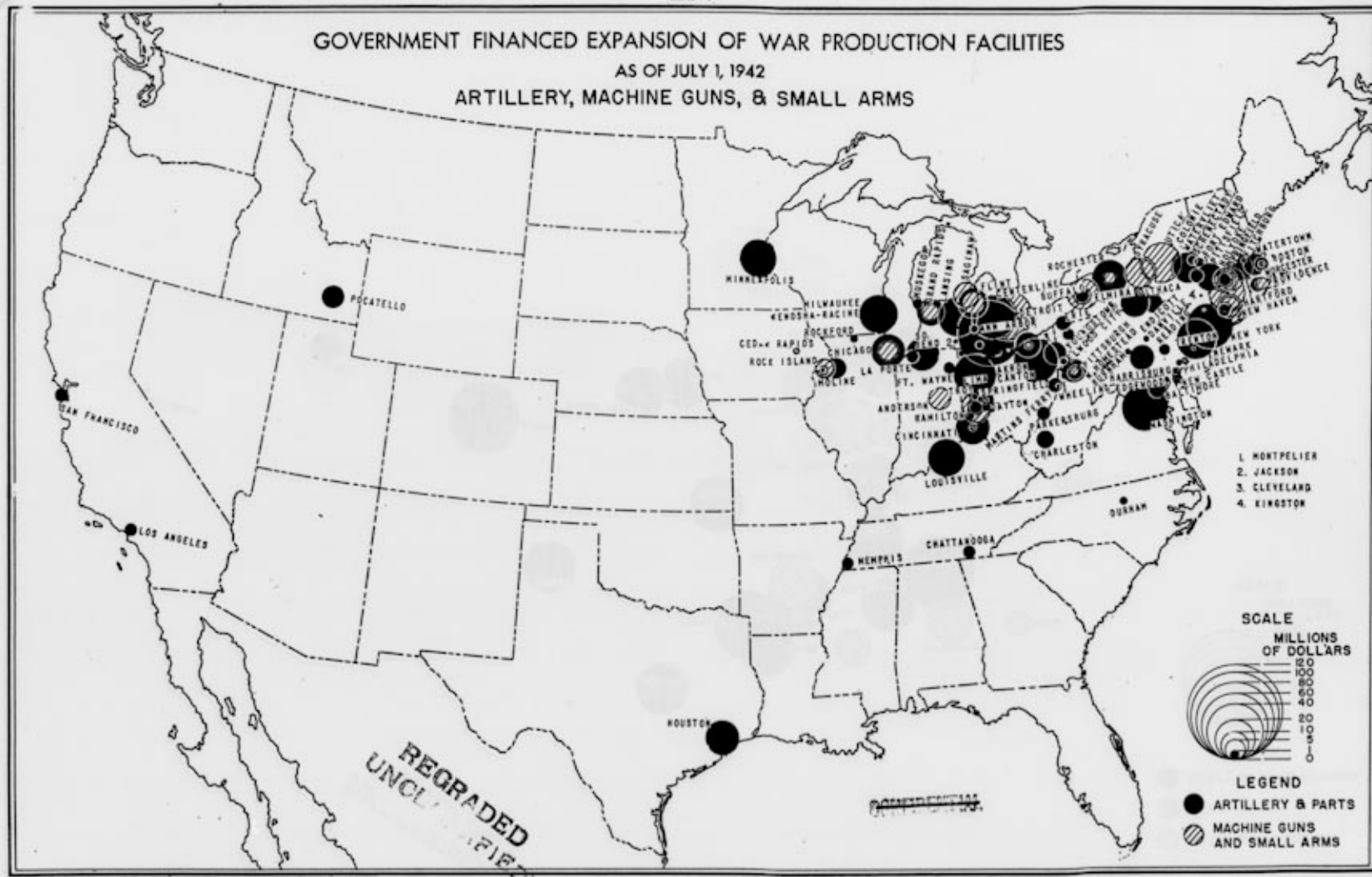

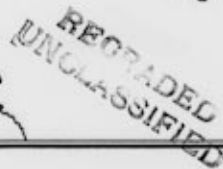

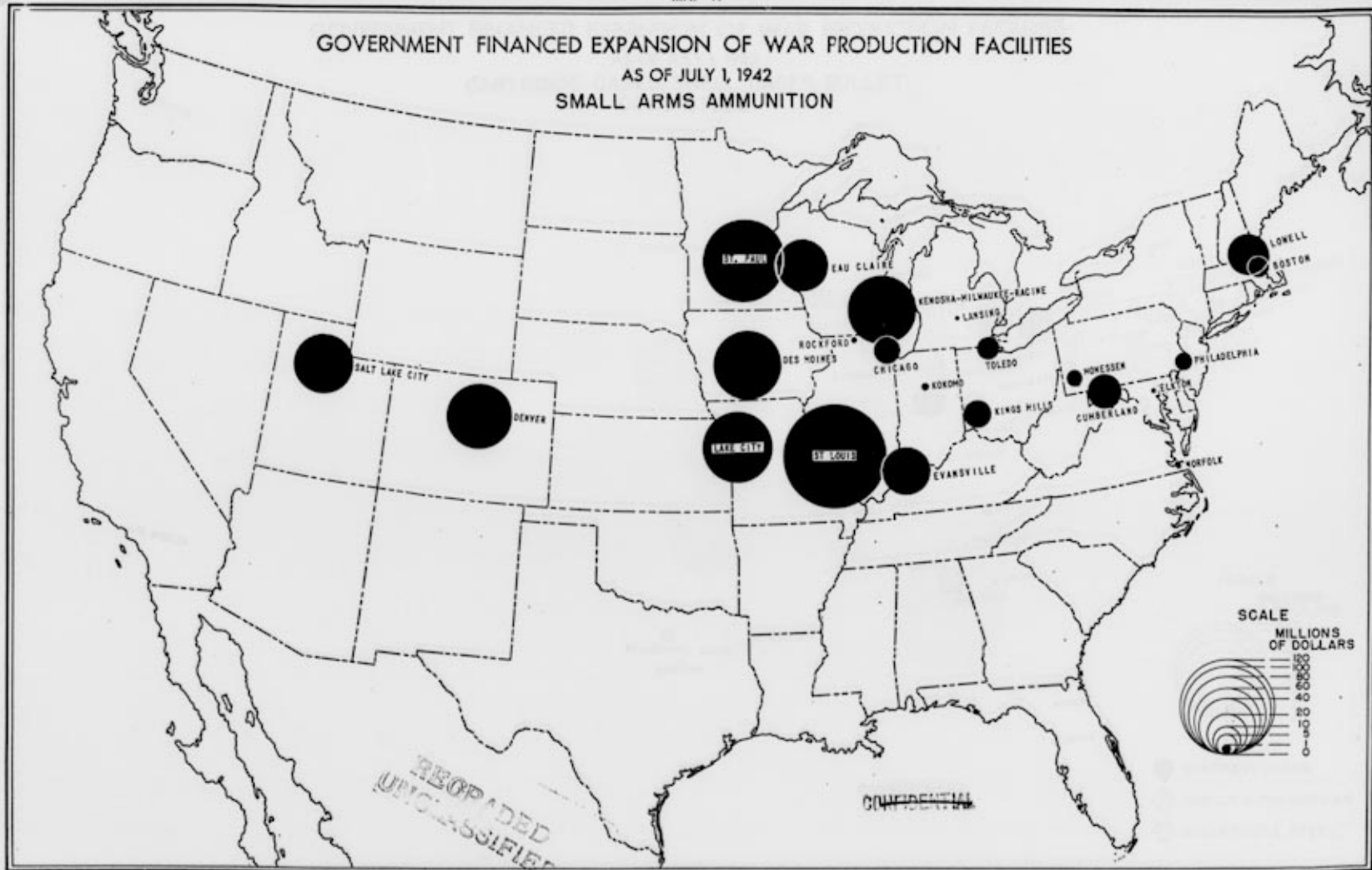
GOVERNMENT FINANCED EXPANSION OF WAR PRODUCTION FACILITIES

SMALL ARMS AMMUNITION



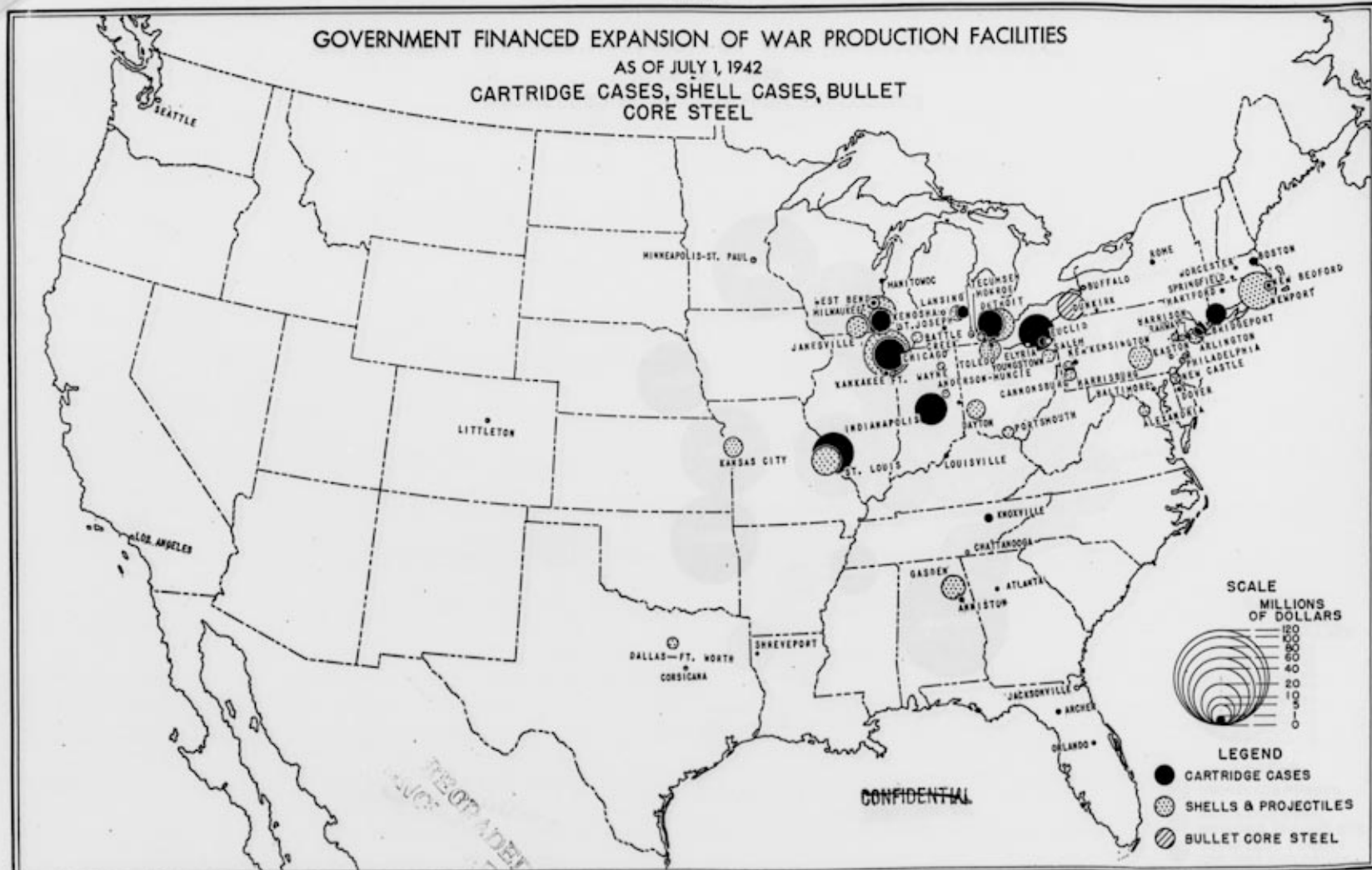

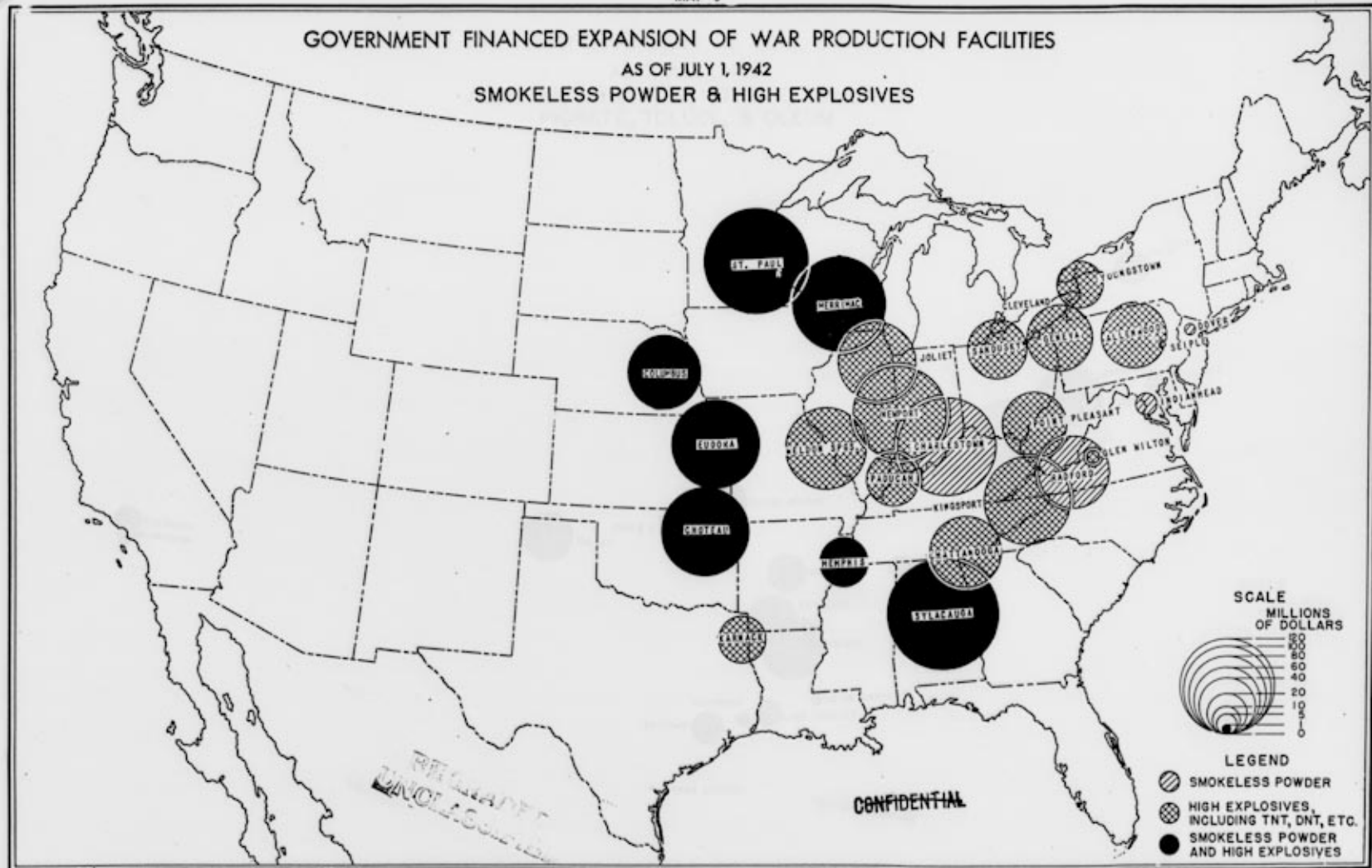
# GOVERNMENT FINANCED EXPANSION OF WAR PRODUCTION FACILITIES

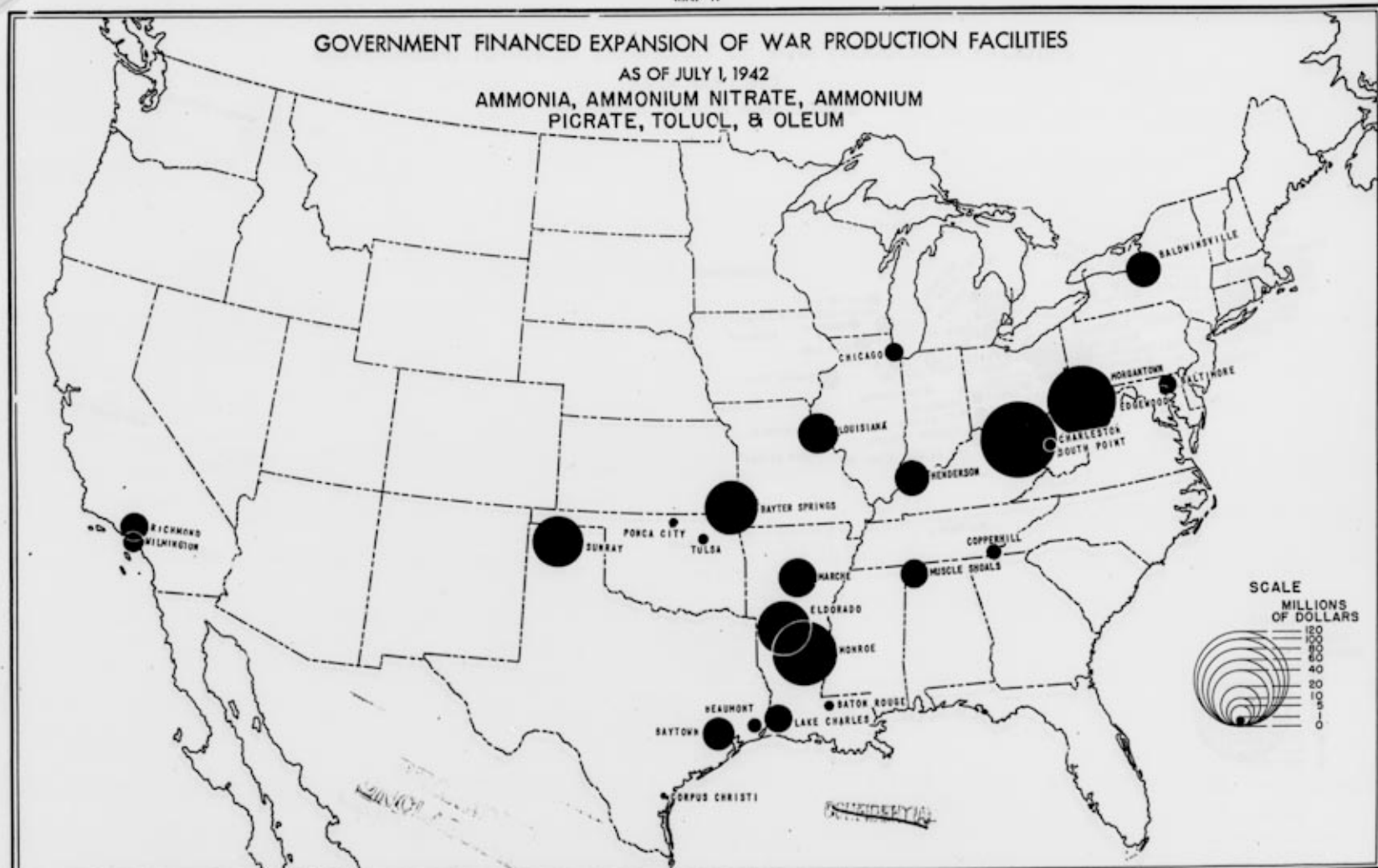

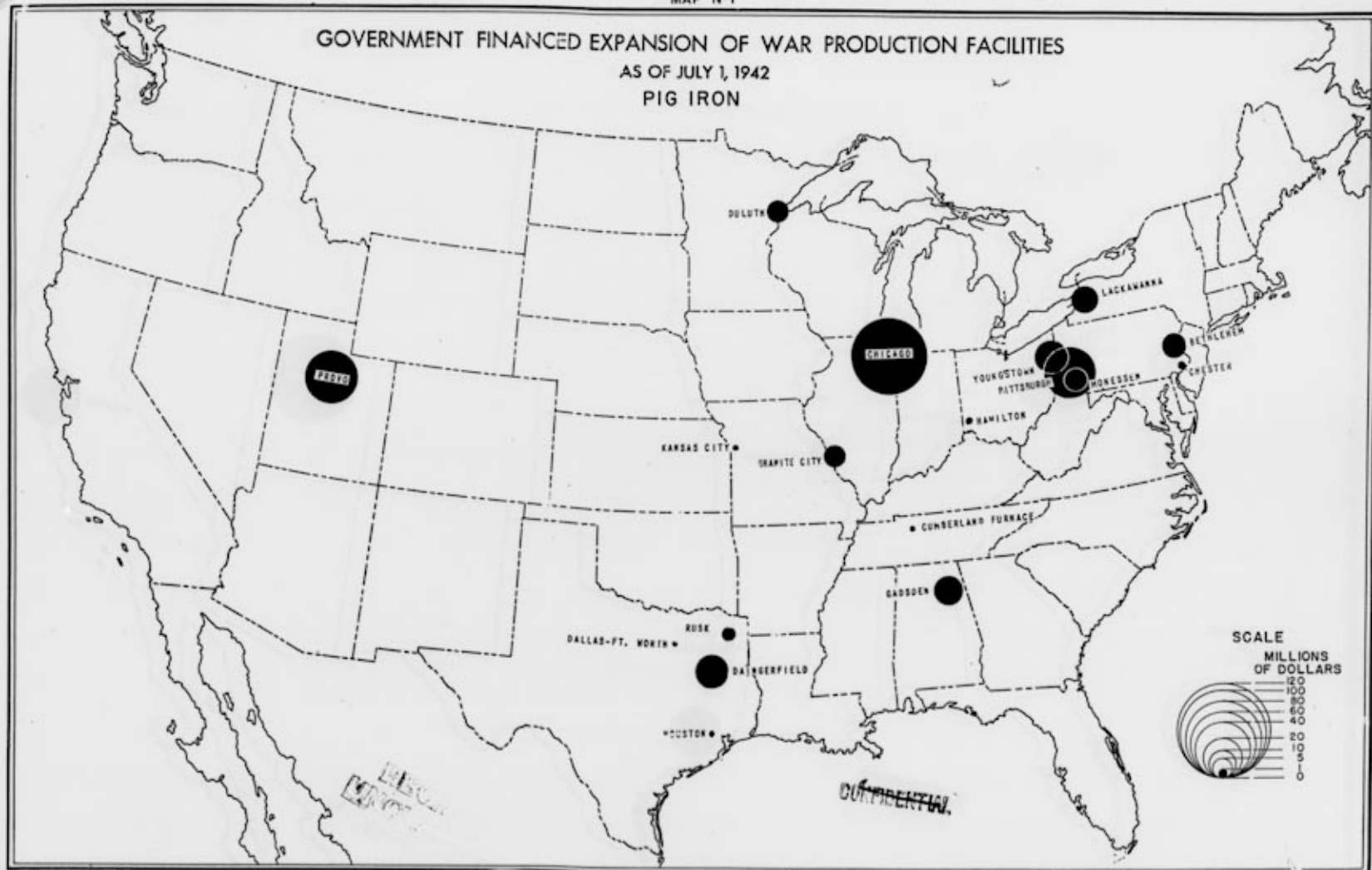


GOVERNMENT FINANCED EXPANSION OF WAR PRODUCTION FACILITIES

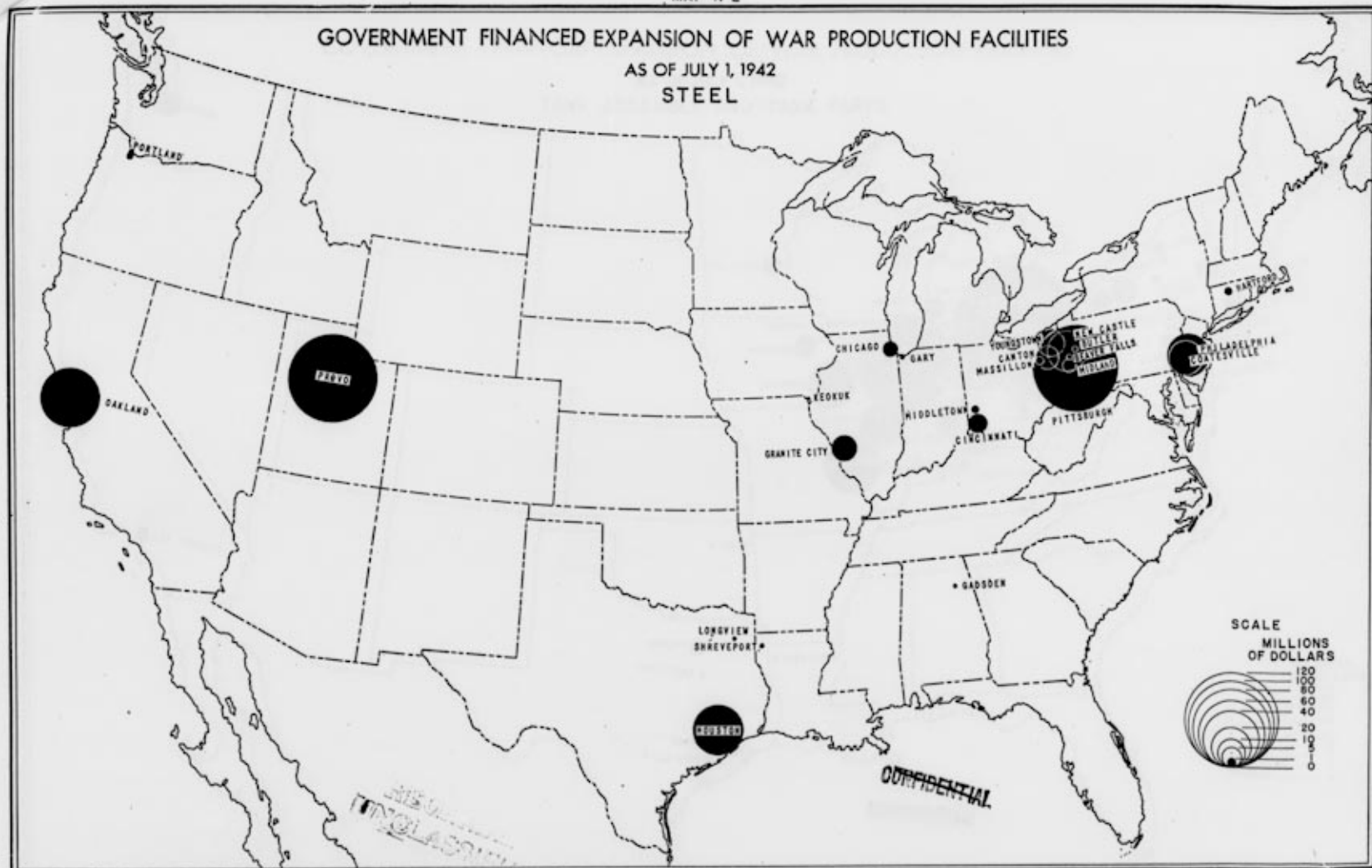
# GOVERNMENT FINANCED EXPANSION OF WAR PRODUCTION FACILITIES AS OF JULY 1, 1942 PIG IRON

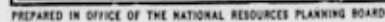

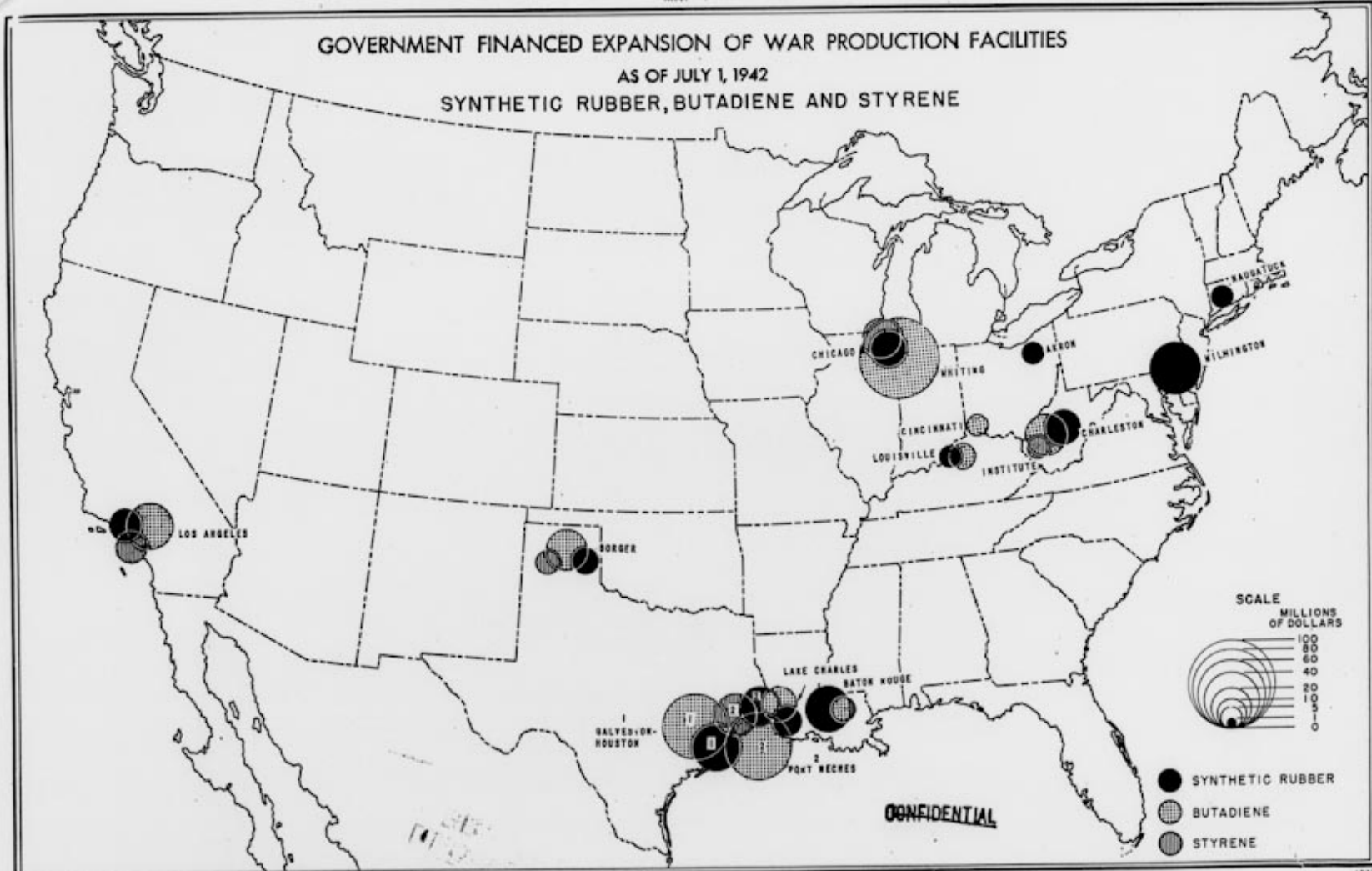

DRAFT OF SUGGESTED PRESS RELEASE  
ON LEND-LEASE OPERATIONS

Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., Administrator, Office of Lend-Lease Administration, has reported to the President on lend-lease operations up to June 30, 1942.

His monthly report shows:

1. Amount of lend-lease aid furnished in June to the United Nations, and other countries eligible under the Lend-Lease Act, was 708 million dollars. This is the highest monthly total in the sixteen months of lend-lease operations. Aid in May was 662 million dollars.

2. Total lend-lease aid from the beginning of the program, March 11, 1941 to June 30, 1942, was 5,205 million dollars. Of this total 59 per cent was goods transferred, 24 per cent articles in process, and 17 per cent various services performed here and abroad.

#### SUMMARY OF LEND-LEASE PROGRESS

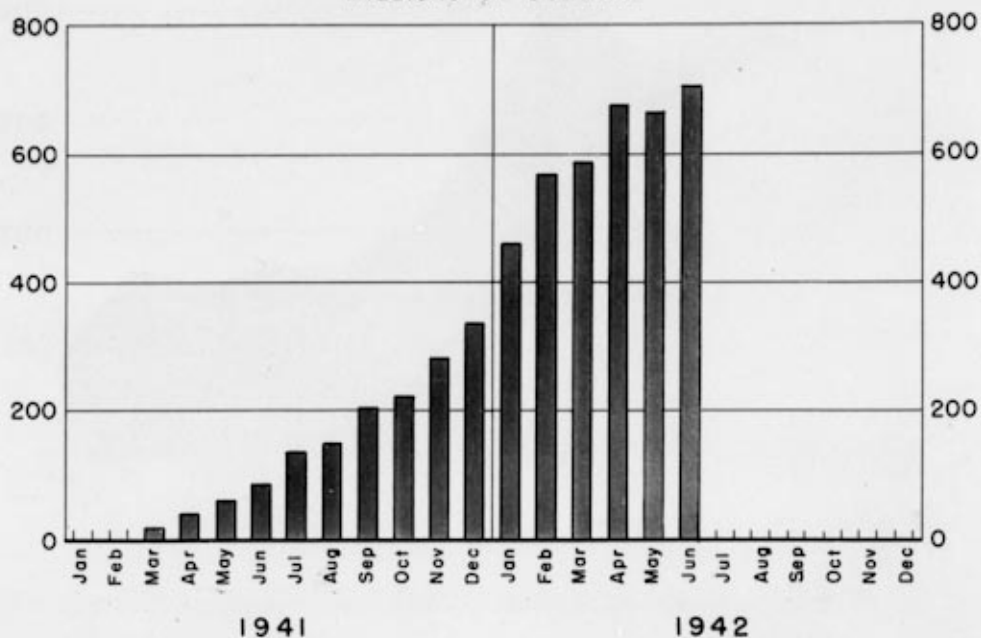
1. Lend-lease aid in June amounted to 708 million dollars, exceeding that of any previous month.
2. Lend-lease aid, in goods and services, to the end of June amounted to 5,205 million dollars.
3. In the last three months 42 per cent of lend-lease goods exported went to the United Kingdom, 31 per cent to Russia and 27 per cent to all other countries.
4. Lend-lease exports currently account for nearly three-fourths of total exports.
5. We have exported under lend-lease 4,125 planes, 3,800 tanks and 101,000 motor vehicles.

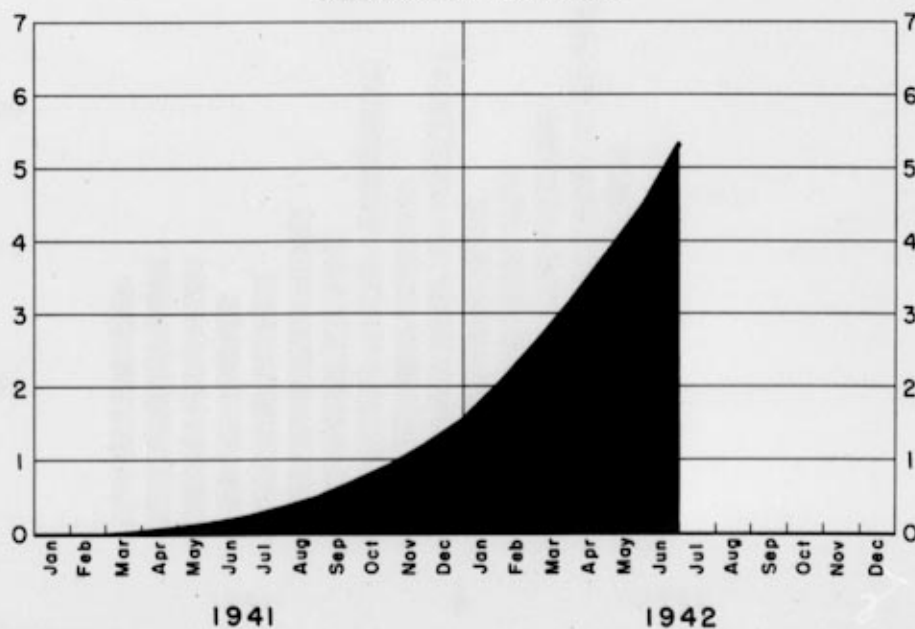
## LEND-LEASE AID - MONTHLY

## LEND-LEASE AID - CUMULATIVE

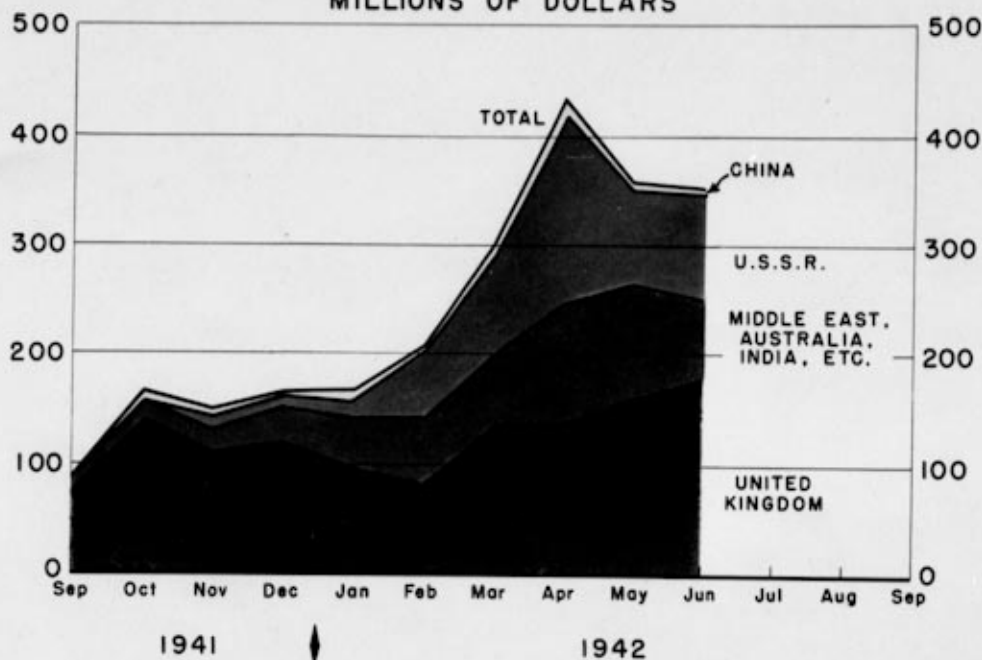

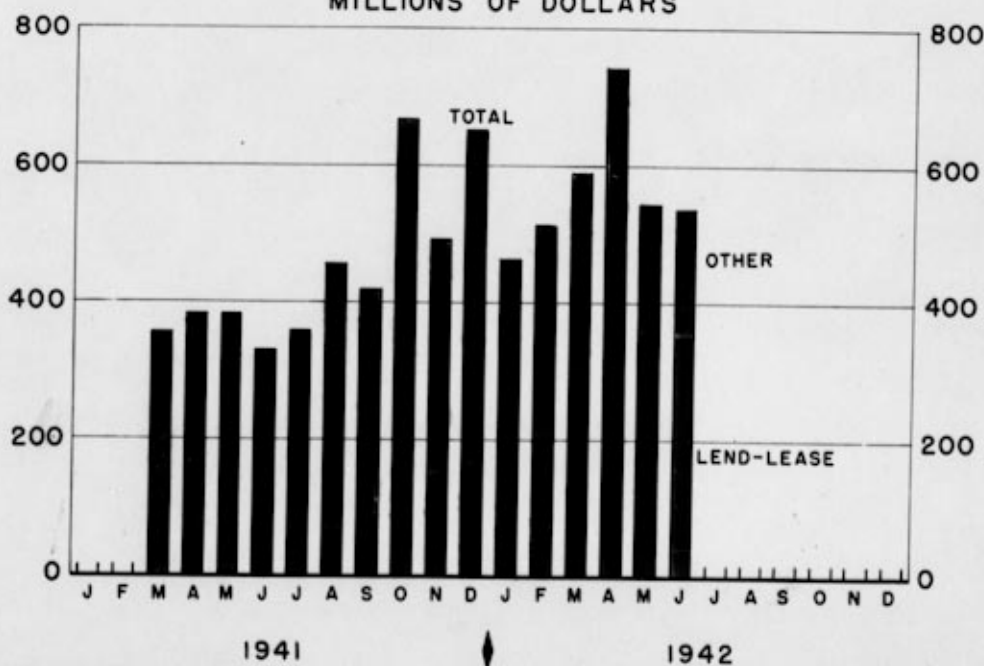
## LEND-LEASE EXPORTS — MONTHLY

Dear Mr. President,

In compliance with your letter of March 17, 1942, requesting that you be kept advised as to the status of the Soviet Aid Program, we are transmitting herewith the report as of June 30, 1942.

This report is particularly significant since it contains the record of performance for the full period covered by the first Moscow Protocol. The protocol committed the United States to make available goods estimated at a value of \$750,000,000 (originally overestimated at \$1,015,000,000).

By the end of the protocol period, approximately 80 per cent of the original commitment had been made available. In addition, enough non-protocol items had been made available to bring the total value of items to more than 100 per cent of the value of the original protocol commitment.

Exports during the period, of both protocol and non-protocol items, were equivalent to 87 per cent of the dollar value of protocol commitments.

Aid to the Soviet Union is continuing under the terms of the second protocol, extending from July 1, 1942 to June 30, 1943. As you know, however, great difficulties are being encountered with regard to deliveries to Russia, due to the convoy situation.

## PROTOCOL PERFORMANCE

The Moscow Protocol of October 1, 1941 terminated on June 30, 1942. According to its terms the United States agreed to make available at U.S. centers of production amounts of goods as specified in the Protocol. Although aid in shipping was promised, no commitments were made for the export of protocol items.

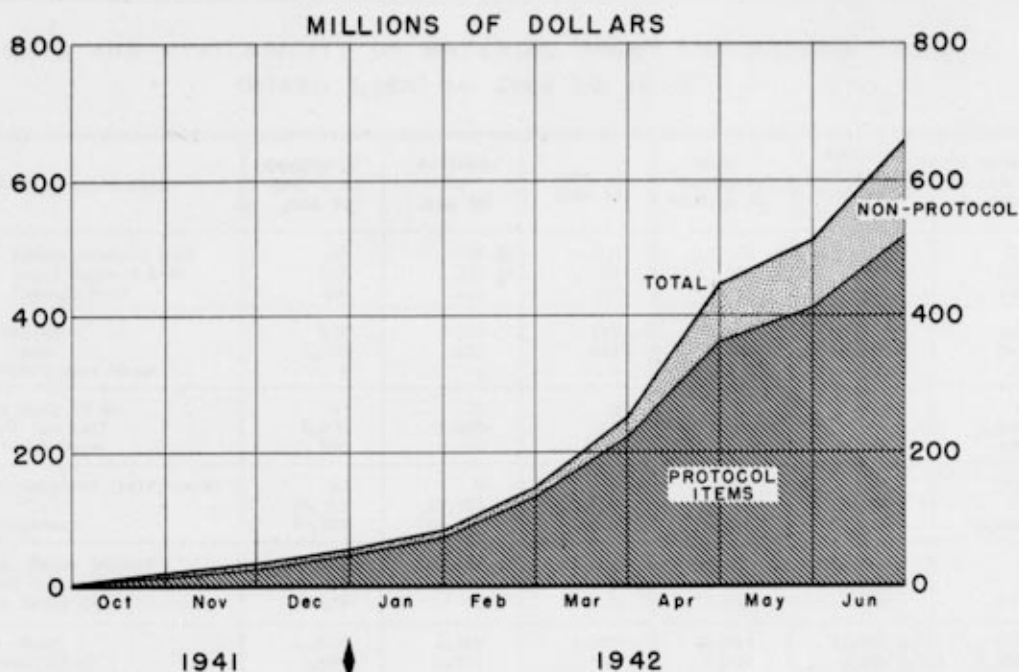
Progress, which was limited in the early months, became more rapid following the President's directive of March 17, 1942, setting protocol obligations above other programs. By the end of the protocol period the United States had made available approximately 80% of the estimated dollar value of the original commitments. The value of non-protocol items made available more than compensated for the deficiencies in protocol items.

Exports to the U.S.S.R. increased slowly from October through February and then rose sharply to a peak in April. Convoy difficulties subsequently resulted in a serious curtailment of shipping and also in the unloading in the United Kingdom of certain vessels en route to the U.S.S.R. Exports during the protocol period, of both protocol and non-protocol items, were equivalent to about 87 per cent of the dollar value of commitments.

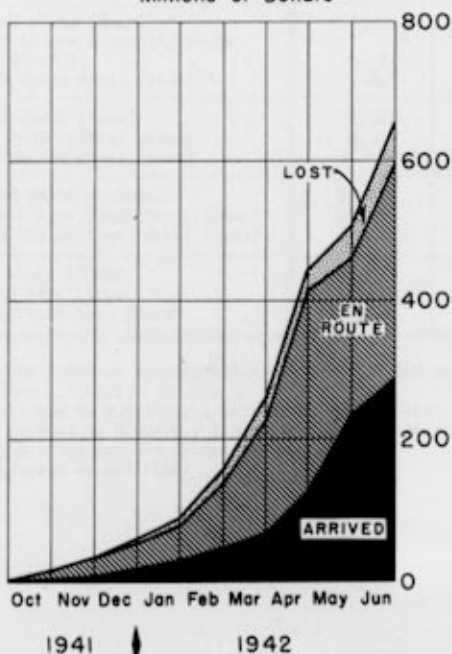
Aid to the Soviet Union is continuing under the terms of a second protocol extending from July 1, 1942 to June 30, 1943.

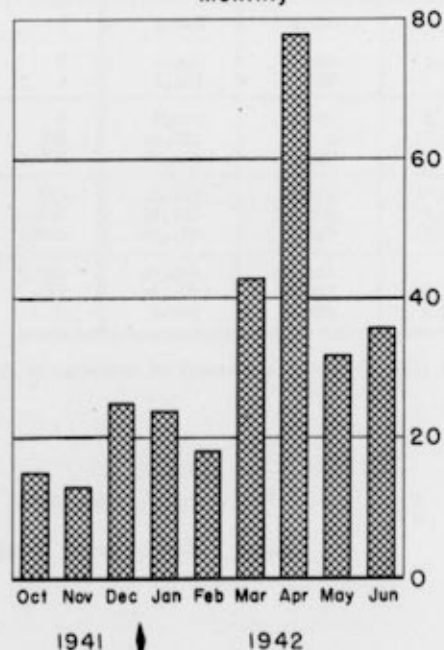
# VALUE OF EXPORTS TO U.S.S.R. - CUMULATIVE

Of the 284 ships which sailed from October 1 to June 30, 78 were Russian (57 from the West Coast and 21 from the East Coast), 14 were British, 1 Swedish, and 191 American. In addition to the 284 sailings, there were 27 ships carrying cargoes primarily for other countries which carried partial cargoes for Russia. The 284 sailings were made by 256 ships, 25 ships having sailed twice and 3 three times. The 23 vessels listed above as lost were sunk while carrying full cargoes to the U.S.S.R. In addition 3 ships were lost on their return voyages.

As noted above, 19 ships have been discharged en route, with portions of their cargoes forwarded in other vessels, portions restowed in a smaller number of American vessels, and the remainder placed in storage for forwarding in the future.

According to an agreement with U.S.S.R. representatives, 18 ships allocated for the month of June will carry cargoes applicable to the protocol of October 1, 1941. These vessels which were available as of June 30 but have not yet sailed are summarized as follows: for North Russia, 6; for Persian Gulf, 4; and for Soviet Arctic, 8.

During the protocol period 57 Soviet vessels sailed 78 times from U.S. ports. Repairs and services furnished these ships since November 7, 1941 have been provided under the Lend-Lease Act at a cost exceeding \$13,300,000. In addition, more than \$71,297,000 has been expended for the rental of U.S. merchant vessels and the ferrying of aircraft.

Repair of vessels has often been of major character and included installation of engines, conversion of a vessel into a troopship, and extensive work in preparing vessels for Arctic voyages. In many instances Soviet vessels have been armed and degaussed to an extent exceeding the requirements of the protocol.

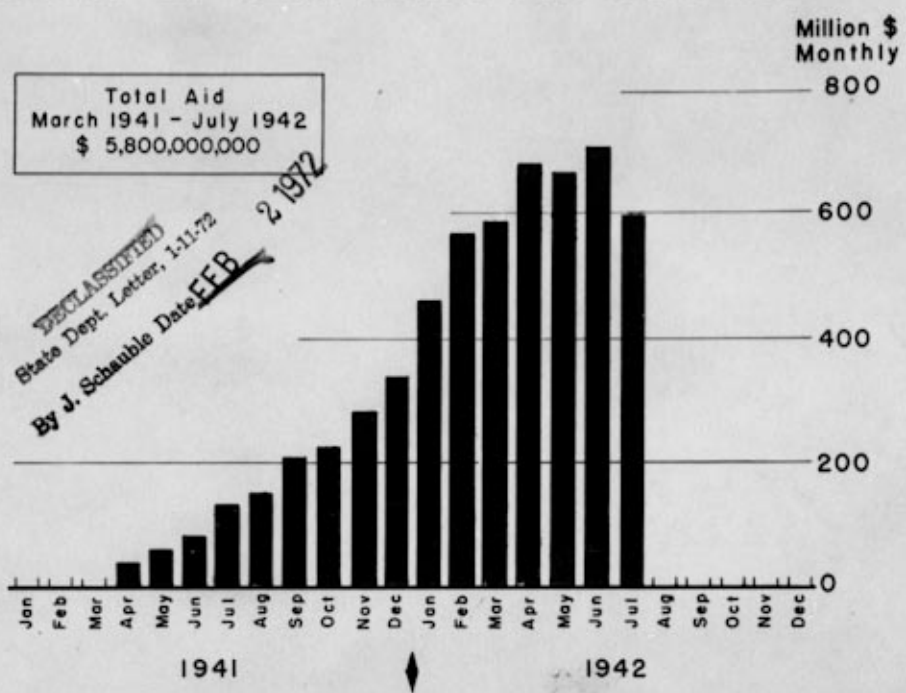

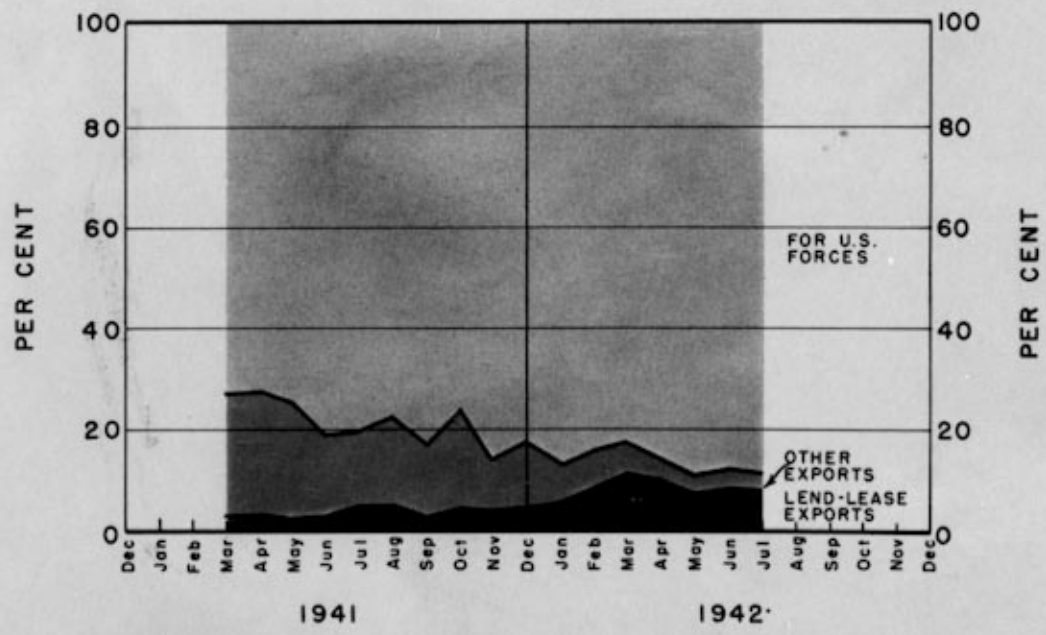
1. Total lend-lease aid to the end of July--including articles transferred, articles awaiting transfer or which will be transferred shortly, and services--amounted to \$5,800,000,000.
2. Lend-lease aid in the month of July amounted to \$595,000,000, a drop of \$112,000,000 from June.
3. The decline in lend-lease aid was due entirely to a falling off in the value of goods in process of manufacture. Articles transferred, accounting for 85 per cent of total aid, rose to a new high of \$504,000,000 in July.
4. The proportion of our total production of munitions which we have sent to United Nations has been declining. Lend-lease exports of munitions have increased but not enough to offset the decline in direct purchase munitions exports. (See lower section of chart on next page.)
5. Lend-lease goods transferred to China during July amounted to only \$6,500,000. Total transfers to China to date account for only 3 per cent of all transfers of lend-lease goods.

I was delighted to have direct word from you by means of the letter which Ambassador Caffery was kind enough to bring with him to Washington.

First of all, let me tell you how happy I was to learn that you are once again up and moving around. I am sure that within a short time you will have fully regained your strength and will be as healthy and perhaps more rested than at the time of your unfortunate accident.

I was very deeply moved by the confidence which you expressed in the courage and determination of the people of the United States to take whatever steps are required, no matter what the sacrifice might be, to put to an end the gravest threat which has ever confronted freedom-loving peoples. This gigantic effort which is now beginning to show results in the shape of more planes, more tanks, and more ships would not have been possible except for the cooperation extended without stint by peoples all over the world who also cherish their freedom and independence. Foremost among them are the people of your great and growing republic who, largely on account of your own personal efforts, have a keen perception of the issues at stake in the present conflict. No country has given more wholehearted cooperation than Brazil; no country has accepted the inconveniences and sacrifices in better spirit and with better understanding.

I am shocked and grieved by the news of the sinking of the five Brazilian merchant vessels. The Axis destroyed these ships not because they were carrying on any operations contrary to international law but in the utterly mistaken belief that the people and Government of

Brazil could be intimidated from continuing their collaboration in defense of the hemisphere. The destruction of these ships is positive proof that the Axis will stop at no crime in pursuit of its ill-fated efforts at world domination.

You of course appreciate that the demand for naval vessels far outstrips the number available. Naval operations in the Pacific such as those connected with the recent victory in the Solomon Islands, patrol operations in the seven seas, and convoy operations to such distant points as Russia and Australia require more escort vessels than our shipyards have yet been able to produce.

Immediate steps must be taken, however, to cope with the growing menace to shipping off the Brazilian coast. You have been informed by your Ambassador, I feel certain, of the arrangements made whereby Admiral Ingram has been provided with sufficient escort vessels to provide convoys between Trinidad and the principal Brazilian ports. I have now given instructions that there immediately be turned over to your country two of the submarine chasers which you desire and that others be made available at the very first opportunity, which I hope will not be long deferred.

In appreciation of your magnificent cooperation and as a further evidence of my desire to take whatever steps are open to me to maintain the Brazilian economy during this period of disrupted markets, I have authorized Ambassador Caffery, upon his return, to conclude the arrangements under discussion with your Government for the purchase of unexportable surpluses of coffee, of cacao, and of Brazil nuts. I am hopeful that the purchase of these commodities will help to solve the very difficult situation that confronted producers who had no prospect of a market for goods in which they had invested their capital. Mr. Caffery also carries instructions at the same time to conclude the pending negotiations with regard to cargo ships along the lines suggested by our good friend Oswaldo Aranha prior to Mr. Caffery's departure for Washington.

In your letter to me you expressed satisfaction at the arrangement under contemplation to send a commission

of technicians

of technicians to Brazil to advise on the best means of developing the production of articles heretofore imported with a view to conserving tonnage in shipping bound from the United States for Brazil. As you may already have learned through your able representative in Washington, my good friend Ambassador Martins, Mr. Caffery is carrying with him a statement outlining the possibilities of industrial adaptation and conversion as we see them in Washington. This commission will be sent immediately if these proposals meet with your approval. Your idea of appointing a commission of Brazilian specialists to work along with the commission from the United States appeals to me as eminently desirable and practicable.

Ambassador Caffery has also informed me of your willingness to make available for our use certain passenger vessels. I am very deeply appreciative of this further demonstration of cooperation on the part of Brazil. Passenger vessels for the transportation of troops are very greatly needed and any vessels which can be made available by Brazil will go far toward alleviating a difficult situation. Mr. Caffery has my authority to conclude a mutually satisfactory arrangement with regard to these passenger ships.

Ambassador Caffery has brought to our attention the serious situation of the newspapers of Brazil arising out of the difficulties surrounding the acquisition of newsprint. I am happy to say that during the Ambassador's visit it has been possible to work out arrangements for the continued delivery, subject only to the exigencies of the war upon the broad shipping situation, of added amounts of newsprint at the existing shipping freight rates to the newspapers.

I am, of course, grateful for the words of praise and confidence which you had for Ambassador Caffery. I cannot add to what you have said about him except to say that he enjoys my full confidence.

Mrs. Roosevelt joins me in sending kind regards to you and to Senhora de Vargas.

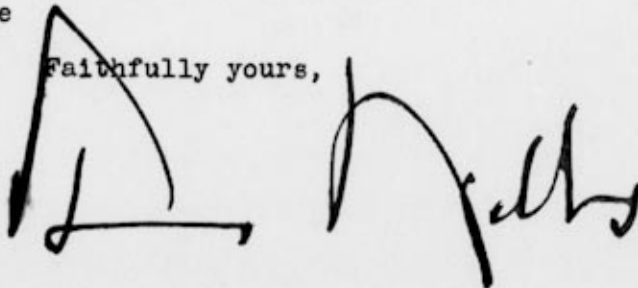

My dear President:

I have received your affectionate letter. I wish to thank you for all the interest you have shown in my health during the months I have been unable to move. Fortunately, I am well again, completely cured and once more slowly beginning to walk. I am trusting that in a short time my muscles will regain their elasticity, which they have lost during my prolonged rest.

I take this opportunity also to express to you my gratitude for everything your Government has done and intends to do for Brazil, helping to solve our great problems and meeting requests we are obliged to make under pressure of necessity. Please believe that this will not be forgotten by my Country.

I am following, with great sympathy, and all Brazil with me, the calm courage of the American  
people

people faced with the gravity of the moment as well as the extraordinary and successful effort they are making to transform their peace-time industry into war industry to produce what is necessary for their own defense and for the indispensable aid to their allies. I see in the organization of this effort, which has been accomplished with prodigious rapidity, your touch, your continued and vigilant leadership. On our part, we have not spared anything to aid the efforts of the United States and to cooperate in all that looks to the victory of our common cause.

We are suffering, at the moment, the consequences of a hard and cruel submarine warfare. With the torpedoing, a few days ago, of the vessel "Tamandaré", the Brazilian Merchant Marine has lost, in a brief period, eleven ships which include some of its largest and best. This, naturally, causes us anxiety and we desire to conclude, under satisfactory conditions, the agreement for the leasing of vessels to your Government, in the conviction that in this manner we will obtain greater security for the maritime communications between our two countries. I am convinced that only

the organization of convoys along the entire route will afford positive results. The means at our disposal at the present time for such a task are few or practically nil. We were counting on the delivery of from eight to ten torpedo launches and submarine chasers, ordered on the occasion of the visit of Minister Souza Costa, in order to assure the protection of the ships along our coast or even slightly beyond it. Unfortunately, the American authorities have not yet been able to meet these requests which I have made through the intermediary of the Brazilian Embassy in Washington. I wish, therefore, to make an appeal in this matter to your personal interest, which I have always found to be helpful and watchful in favor of Brazil.

It gave me great pleasure to learn, through Ambassador Carlos Martins, that Mr. Milo Perkins, the director of the Board of Economic Warfare, intends to appoint a commission of technicians to come to Brazil to study industrial conditions and the best means of developing the production of articles hitherto imported with a view to reducing the problem of transportation.

transportation. Machinery which is now lying idle in the United States could be utilized for this purpose. I today replied accepting the offer - which I consider to be yet another demonstration of your care and sympathy for us - and stating that I am planning immediately to appoint a commission of Brazilian specialists to work with the commission coming from the United States. As a matter of fact, when Minister Souza Costa went to America, the same idea occurred to me and I suggested to him to mention it in conversation with you. But there was no occasion for this. Our desires, however, coincide.

Ambassador Jefferson Caffery, through whose courtesy I am sending you this letter, is preparing to depart on a visit to his country. It is with the greatest satisfaction, Mr. President, that I express to you my highest praise of the achievements of this illustrious diplomat. Wise, friendly, composed, Ambassador Caffery practices diplomacy as it should be practiced: with the sole idea of uniting, bringing closer together and increasing the friendship of the people in whose midst he lives for the people  
whose

whose Government he represents.

My wife sends her kind regards to Your Excellency and asks to be remembered to Mrs. Roosevelt, to whom I present my respectful compliments.

Encheu-me de alegria a notícia, transmitida pelo Embaixador Carlos Martins, de que o Senhor Milo Perkins, diretor do Board of Economic Warfare, pretende designar uma comissão de técnicos para vir ao Brasil estudar-lhe as condições industriais e os melhores metodos de desenvolver a produção de artigos de importa

ção, com o fito de reduzir os transportes. Seriam empregados para tal fim maquinismos presentemente sem aplicação nos Estados Unidos. Hoje respondi aceitando a oferta - na qual percebo mais uma demonstração do seu cuidado e simpatia por nós - e informando que cogito, desde já, em organizar a comissão de especialistas brasileiros para trabalhar com a que daí vier. Aliás, quando foi à America o Ministro Souza Costa, ocorreu-me a ideia e nela lhe falei para a sugerir em conversa consigo. Mas não houve vagar para tanto. Os nossos desejos encontram-se, portanto.

Está de partida, em visita à Pátria, o Senhor Embaixador Jefferson Caffery, que me faz o favor de ser portador desta carta. E' com a maior satisfação que lhe exprimo, Senhor Presidente, os meus melhores louvores à ação dêsse ilustre diplomata. Ponderado, amigo, sereno, o Embaixador Caffery pratica a diplomacia como deve ser praticada: com a preocupação única de unir, de aproximar, de aumentar a amizade do povo em cujo meio vive pelo povo cujo governo representa.

## STATUS OF THE SOVIET AID PROGRAM

### PROGRESS DURING JULY, 1942

The substantial schedule of Atlantic sailings planned for July was interrupted midway in the month by the discontinuance of northern convoys. The subsequent decision to resume convoy protection was not adopted in time to avoid delay in sailings.

Enemy action has resulted in heavy losses on the northern convoy route and in increased sinkings on the route to the Persian Gulf via the Caribbean.

The number of sailings of Soviet flag vessels has recently increased markedly and has included 22 ships destined for Siberian Arctic ports, carrying supplies for the coming winter.

Because of limited convoy space, a total of 24 vessels have been unloaded in the United Kingdom to date.

Included in this report are data on goods carried on these vessels which have been transferred to the U. S. Army or the United Kingdom, or are being held in storage for later shipment to the Soviet Union.

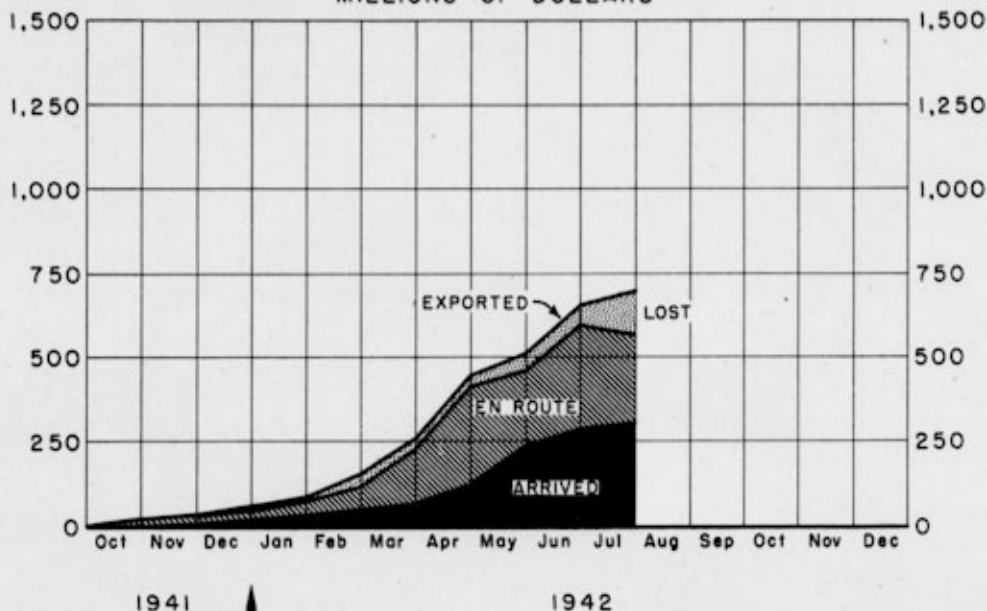

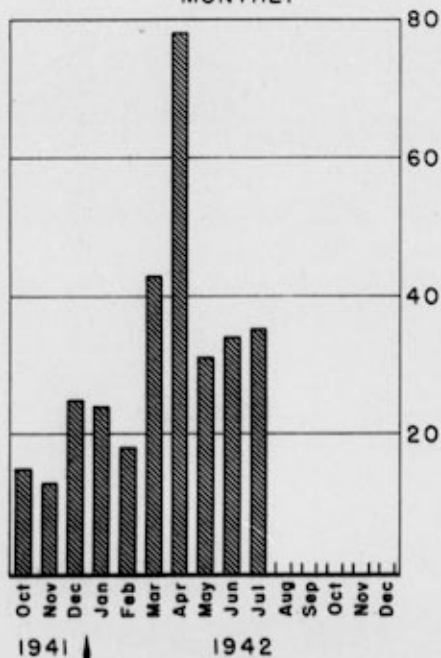
# VALUE OF EXPORTS TO U.S.S.R.

CUMULATIVE SINCE OCTOBER 1, 1941

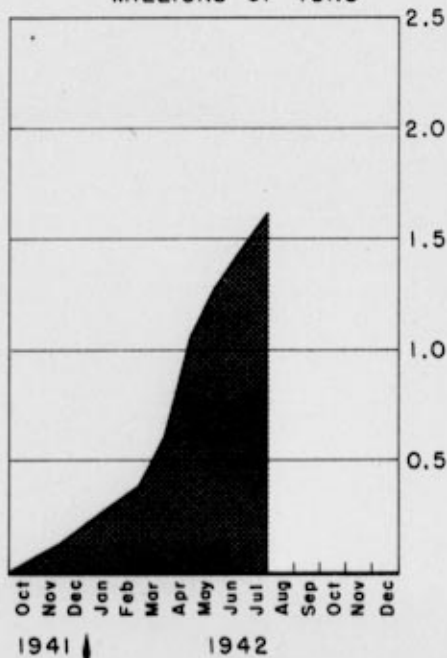
MILLIONS OF DOLLARS

## TONNAGE OF MATERIALS EXPORTED TO U.S.S.R. — CUMULATIVE MILLIONS OF TONS

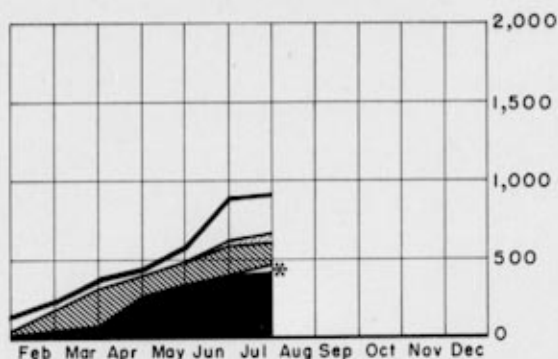

Of the 317 sailings made from October 1 to July 31, 105 were made by Soviet vessels, 14 by British, 1 by a Swedish, and 197 by American ships. In addition to the 317 sailings, there were 40 ships carrying goods destined primarily for other countries which carried a total of more than 40,000 tons of goods for the U.S.S.R. The 317 sailings were made by 267 ships, 36 having sailed twice and 7 three times. The 42 vessels listed as lost were carrying full cargoes for the U.S.S.R. In addition, a few of the vessels carrying partial cargoes have also been lost, and several ships have been sunk on their homeward voyage.

There were 18 ships allocated for June which had not sailed before June 30; their cargoes are applicable to the Protocol of October 1, 1941. By July 31, 15 of these vessels had sailed, and the remaining three sailed in August.

On above date the President wrote to Dr. Kung, which letter is to be transmitted by Mr. Lauchlin Currie on his second visit to China. The President's letter is in reply to Dr. Kung's letter of greeting to him of Jan. 14, 1942. (Dr. Kung's letter is attached; it was transmitted to the President by the Secretary of the Treasury, 2/12/42, who stated that on his return to this country, Mr. A. Manuel Fox brought this letter). The President refers to the heroic struggle of China in this War; he also refers to the death of Mr. Fox. He indicates his confidence in the ability of Mr. Currie to bring back a picture of the important economic side of the collaboration between our two Governments and the Governments associated with us.--Attached to this file is copy of President's letter of 7/4/42, also transmitted by Mr. Currie to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, Chungking, China, in reply to the latter's letter to him of 1/12/42 (attached) in which he expresses his gratification that the President has recommended Mr. Lattimore as Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's political adviser. The President refers to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's suggestion regarding Hon. Harry H. Hopkins; also refers to his confidence in Mr. Currie. President refers, at length, to lend-lease situation in regard to China, and to Japanese activities.

## SUMMARY OF LEND-LEASE PROGRESS

1. Lend-lease aid to the end of August was as follows:

2. Military items have accounted for a steadily increasing proportion of lend-lease goods transferred. A year ago the proportion was 10%; last month it was 58%.
3. Although China has received only 4% of total lend-lease aid to date, she has gotten one-eighth of all the pursuit planes and one-eighth of all the heavy trucks which have been lend-leased.
4. We have exported 17.9% of the total value of our munitions production (excluding ships) since March 1941, 8.4% under lend-lease and 9.5% under direct purchase contracts.
5. In the month of August lend-lease exports of 2-engine bombers were equivalent to 35% of production; for medium tanks the ratio was 30% and for light tanks it was 60%.

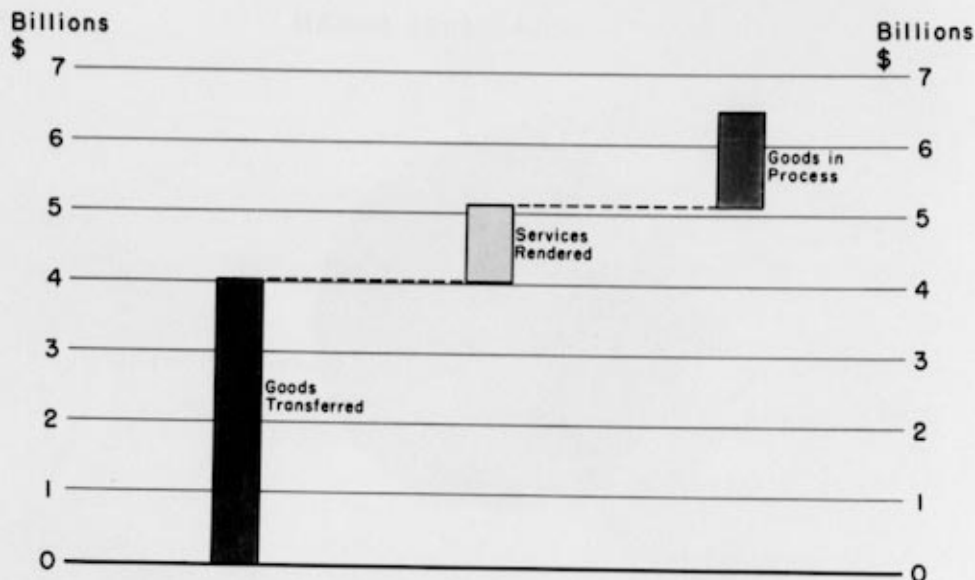

CUMULATIVE TO AUGUST 31, 1942

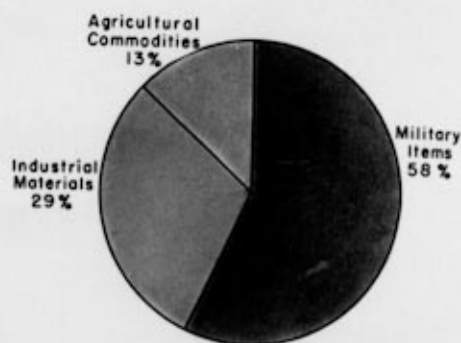


## COMPOSITION OF GOODS TRANSFERRED

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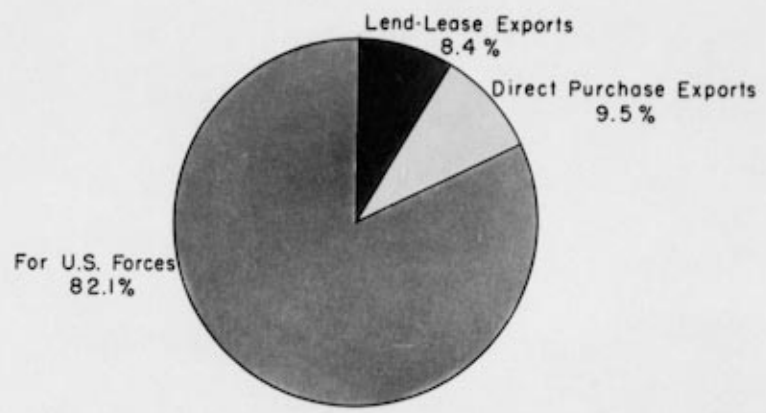

# EXPORTS OF MILITARY ITEMS IN RELATION TO TOTAL MUNITIONS PRODUCTION

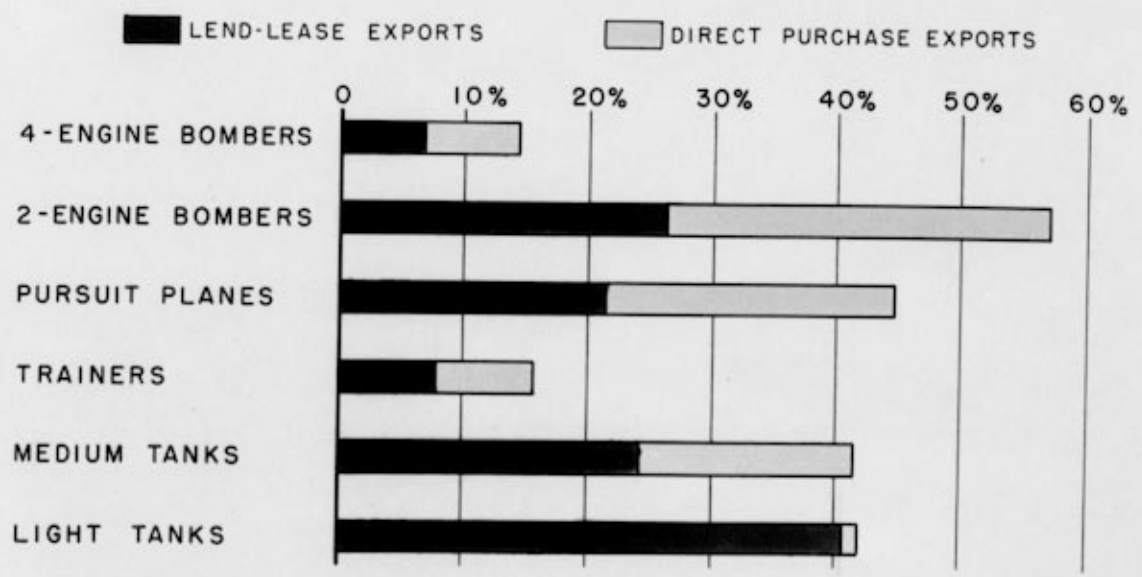
MARCH 1941 - AUGUST 1942

# STATUS OF THE SOVIET AID PROGRAM

## Developments During August 1942

1. During August no convoys were dispatched from the U. K. and Iceland to north Russia and convoy protection was instituted on a portion of the southern route. These factors were responsible for the small number of arrivals and losses.
2. Substantial quantities of non-ferrous metals, chemicals and machinery, which had formerly been shipped from the East Coast, were carried from the West Coast in Soviet ships.
3. Plans have been completed for the delivery via Alaska of all types of aircraft called for by the Second Protocol. In early September 41 planes were at Fairbanks ready for delivery. No deliveries had been made from Alaska according to latest information.

## Change in Information Contained in Report

A change is now being made in the form of reporting the availability and exports of materials to conform with the Second U.S.S.R. Protocol. Information on this basis is not yet available, and statistics on selected military items only are shown herein. Details on all items will be submitted next month.

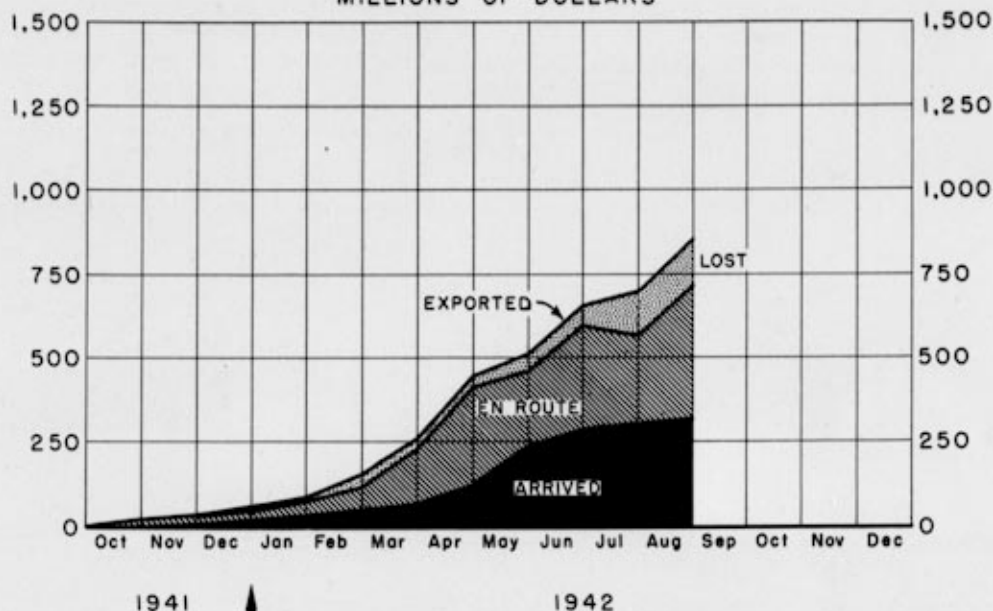

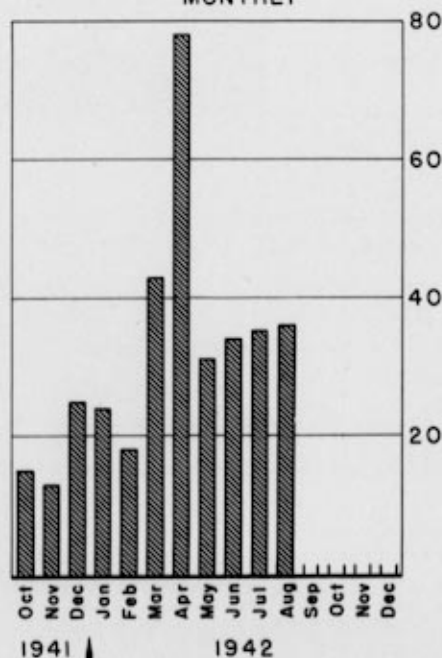
# VALUE OF EXPORTS TO U.S.S.R.

CUMULATIVE SINCE OCTOBER 1, 1941

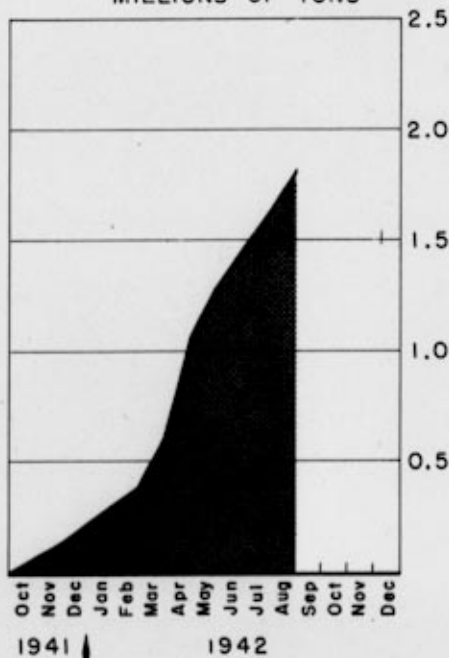
MILLIONS OF DOLLARS

## TONNAGE OF MATERIALS EXPORTED TO U.S.S.R. — CUMULATIVE MILLIONS OF TONS

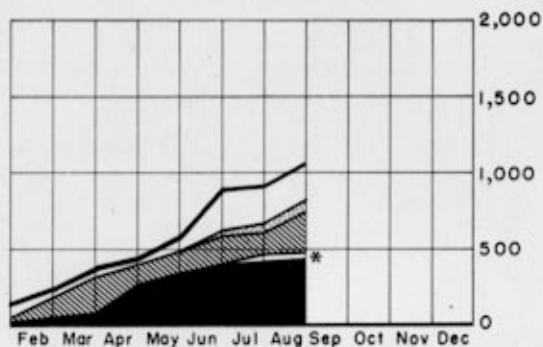

Of the 353 sailings made from October 1 to August 31, 125 were made by Soviet vessels, 14 by British, 1 by Swedish, and 213 by American ships. In addition to the 353 sailings, there were 52 ships carrying goods destined primarily for other countries which carried a total of more than 60,000 tons of goods for U.S.S.R. The 353 sailings were made by 297 ships, 35 having sailed twice, 9 three times and 1 four times. The 43 vessels listed as lost were carrying full cargoes for the U.S.S.R. In addition, a few of the vessels carrying partial cargoes have also been lost, and several ships have been sunk on their homeward voyage.
