My dear Governor:

It will give Mrs. Roosevelt and me great pleasure if you (and Mrs. ---) can attend the Inaugural ceremonies on March 4th.

It is my thought that we should all cooperate toward every possible saving in government expenditures and that therefore no State should send any of its National Guard or Naval Militia to take part in the Inaugural parade.

I understand from Rear Admiral Grayson, the Chairman of the Inaugural Committee in Washington, that an automobile will be provided in the parade for each Governor and one or two members of his Personal Staff and that each car will carry the State Flag.

I shall be happy, of course, if any of the citizens of your State will come to the Inauguration and will march in the parade, if they care to do so. The arrangements for this should be taken up with Rear Admiral Cary T. Grayson, who lives in Washington.

I hope that after the Inaugural ceremonies at the Capitol you (and Mrs. ---) will come immediately to the White House to an informal luncheon. The parade starts immediately thereafter.

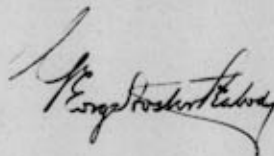
Dear Governor:

WORLD TO HEAR INAUGURATION
OVER ELABORATE NBC HOOK-UP

Fifteen microphone positions, five mobile short-wave transmitters in the air and on the ground, thirty-two engineers, ten announcers and twelve observers will be utilized by the National Broadcasting Company to cover the inauguration of President-elect Roosevelt, according to plans announced following a survey just completed by NBC executives and engineers.

The broadcast, the most elaborate of its kind ever attempted, will give a complete picture of the colorful ceremonies, from the time the President-elect leaves his hotel until he returns to the White House as President of the United States. Networks and short-wave will take the broadcast all over the world.

Plans as now drawn up call for use of two air positions, one in the dirigible Akron and one in the Army's radio laboratory plane, although final approval by the Army and Navy Departments is still pending.

In addition to the short-wave transmitters in the air, the NBC short-wave car will follow Gov. Roosevelt in the parade, and two announcers equipped with "pack" transmitters, strapped to their backs, will mingle with the crowds on the streets and in the corridors of the Capitol. The "air" will be switched back and forth from one position to another as the occasion demands.

This degree of mobility will enable the announcers to report every phase of the inaugural, no matter where it may occur. Huge parabolic microphones along the line of march also will pick up the music of the bands and the cheering of the great throng which is certain to crowd Washington.

The broadcast will begin shortly before Governor Roosevelt, according to time-honored precedent, leaves his hotel and proceeds to the White House to meet President Hoover. The short-wave transmitter car will follow him. At the White House announcers with short-wave "pack" transmitters will take up the story. The president and the President-elect drive together to the Capitol, and again their progress will be reported to the world by radio.

So on, through the inauguration of the Vice President in the Senate Chamber, and the Presidential inauguration before the Capitol, the departure of the two principal figures and the parade, the various microphones will pick up for the entire world the story of the event which the people of every country are watching with interest.

Both nation-wide NBC networks will carry the broadcast, and half a dozen powerful short-wave stations will send it to other continents.

My dear Mr. President-elect:

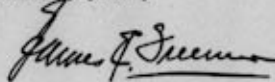
I shall be glad when the qualifying phrase in the above is eliminated!

I had a talk with our mutual friend, Admiral Grayson, this morning and I realize very fully that the time between the inauguration and the parade would be all too brief to permit you to come to the Cathedral for the little service that I suggested. I do want to say that we are going to obviate the step question by making a new entrance to the Cathedral by the west side. This will only involve three steps instead of a long flight now at the South Transept. I have been made Chairman of a Committee of the Clergy of the city in connection with the inauguration, and after talking with Cary Grayson and some of my clerical brethren, I am planning a great patriotic service at the Cathedral at 4 P.M., on Sunday, March 5, to signalize the inauguration of a new president. I am going to send invitations to all the visiting governors, members of the new cabinet and outstanding leaders in the House and Senate, and I am also inviting the Clergy of all the Churches in the city to march in the procession. I earnestly hope that you may find it possible, together with the Vice-President, to attend this service. I think such a service as this will be most fitting and will not be involved in the crowded day of your inauguration. I am going to ask two of the clergy of communions other than our own to read the lessons, thus making the service in a very real sense a community service. The Great Choir and portion of the North Transept will accommodate approximately two thousand, affording larger accommodations than any other Church in Washington for the great crowd of people who will want to be present. I feel very deeply, as you do, that we need at this time to emphasize the spiritual element in what I hope and pray is to be a notable administration. I want you to feel at all times that your new Bishop is ready

to serve you in any way within his power.

My dear Governor -----;

Because so many Governors will be in Washington on March 4th I want to take that opportunity of holding a conference in relation to a number of matters in which the Federal Government and the State Governments are mutually interested. For that reason I want to invite you to come to the White House on Monday, March 6th, at 11 a.m. to attend an informal conference.

It is my thought that we should discuss for our mutual benefit certain subjects such as:

- (a) Conflicting taxation by Federal and State Governments;
- (b) Federal aid for unemployment relief;
- (c) Mortgage foreclosures, especially on farm lands, and
- (d) Better land use by afforestation, elimination of marginal agricultural land, flood prevention, etc.
- (e) Reorganization and consolidation of local government to

It is possible that other subjects will occur to the Governors or to me as being essential for discussion. decrease tax costs.

I do not believe that more than one day will be required for this informal meeting. But it will give me the opportunity of having the pleasure of meeting many of the Chief Executives of the States. I hope much that you will be able not only to come to the Inauguration but also to stay over through Monday for this meeting at the

The procedure which you indicate in your letter of February 20th is entirely satisfactory. The question has been raised as to whether it would be better for me to repeat the oath after the Chief Justice instead of answering "I do". Will you be good enough to talk this over with the Chief Justice and tell him I have no particular preference in the matter, and will abide by his judgment.

I will swear to the oath of office, and I think it is best that my three names be used.

I expect to bring with me from here our old family Bible in Dutch on which I have twice taken the oath as Governor of New York. This book is a very large and heavy folio. If you would be good enough to stop at the Mayflower Hotel on Friday March 3d, I will deliver it into your keeping and mark the passage.

My dear Governor Roosevelt:

I have been directed by the Chief Justice to ascertain your wishes respecting certain details incident to the ceremony of administering to you the oath of office as President of the United States on March 4th next.

In view of the wide publicity which attends the ceremony, it is distinctly desirable to have the details settled in advance that there may be no confusion at the moment.

I am, therefore, taking the liberty of following the precedent pursuant to which the Clerk of this Court makes inquiry of the President-elect respecting those details which I will enumerate.

Under the procedure which has obtained in recent times, the President-elect, immediately upon his arrival upon the Inaugural platform proceeds to a position beside the reading stand - facing south. The Chief Justice assumes a position opposite to him and the bible, opened at the passage designated by the President-elect, is held between them by the Clerk of the Supreme Court. The Chief Justice and the President-elect raise their right hands and the oath is read by the Chief Justice. At the

conclusion of the reading the President-elect responds, "I do", and the bible is then proffered to the President who kisses the page thereof at the passage he has selected.

May I respectfully inquire if this procedure is agreeable to you and to be followed at your inauguration, or if it is your preference to have it altered in any respect?

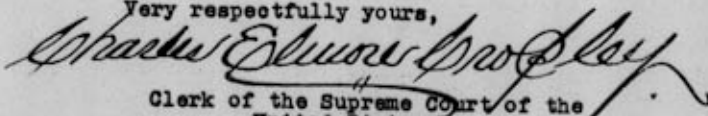
In advance of the date of Inauguration it has been the practice of the President-elect to give into the custody of the Clerk of this Court the bible which he desires to be used with an indication of the passage therein at which it shall be opened. If you have no objection to following this course, the bible will be safely kept, and the identification of the passage selected held in confidence, by the Clerk. The bible will be restored to you immediately following your inauguration.

In addition to the foregoing may I be informed (1) if you will swear or affirm to the oath of office and (2) in the administration of the oath shall your three names be used or the initial only of your middle name?

My dear Mr. President-elect:

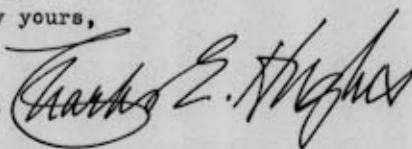

I cordially reciprocate the sentiments of friendship which you so kindly express, and I especially prize the opportunity of being associated with you in our great American enterprise.

THE POLITICAL SITUATION IN *Frederic William Hale*
WASHINGTON TONIGHT. Saturday, March 4, 1933.

Uncle Sam swapped horses today. Tonight he is astride a vigorous, ambitious and determined mount named "the New Deal." One Hundred and Fifty Thousand persons assembled on the historic East Front of the Capitol at Washington were eye-witnesses of the change. Uncountable millions of other Americans had the evidence of their ears by radio that the steed on which a nation's hopes are pinned is headed for a goal which the country fondly trusts is called Recovery and Prosperity.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt is President of the United States. Barring alone George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, few Chief Magistrates of the Republic ever entered upon that office amid the cravings and the prayers that accompany tonight's incumbent of the White House.

With an audacity that sugurs well for a courageous and resourceful administration, President Roosevelt asked boldly for sweeping powers to take the steps necessary to pull the American people out of the mire of economic distress.

He believes the country is tired unto death of talk and needs action. If Congress cannot or will not act, he intends asking it for what he terms "the one remaining instrument to meet the crisis-- broad executive power to wage a war against the emergency."

In the next breath Franklin Roosevelt tells what he means by "broad executive power." He wants power as great as that which would be given to him-- these are his own words-- "if we were in fact invaded by a foreign foe."

This broadcaster very much misses his guess and sorely mistakes the present temper of the country if this man unafraid does not ring the bell from ocean to ocean, from border to border, with this unabashed, redblooded appeal to national common-sense.

President Roosevelt sounds the alarm. He says our house is on fire. He volunteers to lead before the house burns down, and then, with the nation's support and faith, to rebuild the house on a safer, fairer foundation.

Above all, the Roosevelt Inaugural is a "Do It Now!", an action utterance. It is a devastating indictment of our governmental system for not having done it before. Congress may not like having read to it the "riot act" implicit between the lines of the President's address, but I venture a confident belief that the people like it and will valiantly hold up Franklin Roosevelt's hands whenever he chooses to beat his brave words unto deeds.

Next to his inspiring demand to stop fiddling at Washington, the keynote of President Roosevelt's maiden message to the Republic is his playing of high finance.

The Theodore Roosevelt in him seemed to me to flame out when he assailed "the money changers" who "have fled from their high seats in the temple of our civilization."

There was more of his strenuous kinsman, I thought, when the new President thundered "that there must be an end to a conduct in banking and in business which too often has given to a sacred trust the likeness of callous and selfish wrongdoing."

There can be little doubt that in thus condemning the elements which Theodore Roosevelt denounced as "predatory and wealthy malefactors," Franklin Roosevelt today was lashing out at those crooked banking leaders whose incredible misdeeds have just been exposed at Washington.

The heaviest round of applause to greet the President's entire address came when he called for "an end to speculation with other people's money," adding that there must be provision "for an adequate but sound currency."

Just before he ~~thundered~~ thundered that, Mr. Roosevelt declared "there must be a strict supervision of all banking and credits and investments."

His phrase about "adequate but sound currency" may arouse differences of opinion, as well as applause. To those who believe our currency system is sound as it is, there may be an ominous ring to the qualification about making it "adequate."

The words suggest that President Roosevelt considers our currency inadequate, and that it can only be rendered sufficient by some form of inflation. He did not mention inflation or directly hint at it. But it is common knowledge in Washington for some weeks that certain of his political supporters are urging upon the President so-called "controlled" or partial inflation.

Many authorities are disappointed that the Inaugural Address failed categorically to condemn inflation and to pledge the business world that it is not in the Roosevelt program.

We shall not long remain in doubt on ~~this~~ this score. Every syllable that fell from his lips today, every intonation of his fine, strong voice, the stress he laid upon every salient point in his remarks, indicated that Franklin Roosevelt does not intend to allow an unnecessary blade of grass to grow under his feet before presenting his scheme for national regeneration and urging its adoption.

And there was still another note which Franklin Roosevelt struck with emphatic effect. He bids this people of ours to banish its fear.

He urges us to remember that though down, America is not out. He invokes the spirit of the founding fathers, the Valley Forge ideals from which victory in the Revolution eventually sprang.

There was no more stirring passage in an address which bristled with stimulation than the expression of President Roosevelt's simple confidence-- I am quoting his language-- that "this great nation will endure as it has endured, will revive, and will prosper."

The captious critic, the chronic cynic, will tell you that these are precious but empty words; that we have heard them before; that Herbert Hoover used them more than once during these ~~years~~ "years of the Locust."

But for all that, Franklin Roosevelt proved himself a master psychologist this day when, as it were, he grabbed every man, woman and child in the United States by the shoulders and whispered into their joint and several ears-- "Chins up, Americans, be of stout heart!"

That is exactly the kind of medicine we need in the present frazzled state of our nerves. It should cause every jittering bank depositor in the land to pull himself together and ponder over his individual responsibility at this critical hour.

It may be objected that President Roosevelt's preachment to the perplexed and the anxious is vague; that it diagnoses conditions but prescribes no remedies, or at least does not specify what these are to be.

Inaugural addresses seldom are very concrete except in the laying down of broad general principles. Brass tacks are usually left to take the form of legislative recommendations to Congress.

There is no reason to fear that Franklin Roosevelt will not grapple with vital necessities in chapter and verse fashion in his impending messages to the special session of Congress he presently will call.

Hitherto it was supposed he would wait until mid-April to summon in emergency session the Seventy-third Congress which took office with him today. But with the growing gravity of the banking crisis all over the country, it is now thought that President Roosevelt may convene Congress before the end of March, if not immediately.

Whenever Congress is "on his hands," as another Democratic President-- I forget whether it was Grover Cleveland or Woodrow Wilson-- once put it, the new House and Senate know from what it heard from his lips this Fourth of March that Franklin Roosevelt will not brook delay, but will seek to bring about action at his own hands-- indubitably, I am convinced, with the people's backing.

Fate intruded suddenly and tragically this week into the Roosevelt cabinet, when death came to Senator Thomas J. Walsh, of Montana, attorney-general-designate.

His untimely going, a loss not only to the President but the Nation, cast a shadow of gloom over Inauguration Day.

~~Walsh~~ Walsh was the keystone in the Roosevelt cabinet arch. He was the greatest constitutional lawyer in Congress. He was an intrepid prosecutor, grim, almost ruthless, in the pursuit of what he believed to be demonstrated wrongdoing, especially in places of high trust.

His friends consider it certain that one of Walsh's first acts as attorney-general would have been to reach out with the strong arm of the Federal law at those idols of big business who have fallen so ignominiously, if not criminally, from the pedestals of public confidence on which they so long were perched.

A good man, a fine legal mind, has been named temporarily by President Roosevelt to be his first attorney-general in the departed statesman's place. Homer Cummings of Connecticut, Democratic national chairman in 1920 and potent "original Roosevelt man" in New England in 1932, will fill the portfolio until further notice.

Mr. Cummings had already been designated by President Roosevelt to become Governor General of the Philippines, displacing young Theodore Roosevelt. But until certain political equations can be worked out, Mr. Cummings will head the Department of Justice.

Selection of Senator Walsh gave the attorney generalship to the progressive west and to one supposedly inclined to deal sternly with the so-called power interests.

Progressives of the Norris-LaFollette-clan rallied eagerly to the Roosevelt standards last year largely because of the President's reputedly radical ideas on the power issue.

The theory prevails in Washington that these elements in the political coalition now supporting the President and already strongly represented in his cabinet may clamor for an attorney-general of the Progressive Walsh western type rather than one of the Conservative Eastern Cummings quality. There is talk of former governor Phil LaFollette of Wisconsin.

Huston Thompson of Colorado, former president of the Federal Trade Commission and an assistant attorney general during the Wilson administration, is also honorably mentioned. So is brilliant Professor Felix Frankfurter of the Harvard Law School, who, despite the ~~new~~ classically conservative background of Cambridge, is looked upon as an orthodox Liberal.

Henry T. Rainey of Illinois will be the next Speaker of the House of Representatives. He has received a substantial majority of the vote in the Democratic caucus held for the purpose of nominating a Democratic candidate to succeed Vice President Garner.

Mr. Rainey's nearest rival, Representative Byrns of Tennessee, will become Democratic floor leader in the new House, apparently as a result of a combination in the caucus from which Rainey emerged with the Speakership prize.

Representative McDuffie of Alabama, who ranked as Mr. Rainey's principal antagonist, proved incapable of thwarting the white-haired Illinois Congressman's cause.

As Speaker, Mr. Rainey will adorn that responsible post. He has been in Congress many years. He looks the part. He claims innumerable friendships among both parties. He is a skilful parliamentarian. He knows the game.

He has signalized his impending arrival as master of the gavel by ~~announcing~~ announcing that the Speakership is to be shorn of its semi-autocratic power over legislation. Authority in future will be wielded by a Democratic steering committee composed of geographical units certain of assuring fair play for every section of the country, in so far as the legislative program is concerned.

So the New Deal is on its way. What a mighty and magnificent thing it is that this great country of ours can effect literally a revolutionary change in its government, as it ~~effect~~ ^{did} today, without jolting from its place a single, solitary rivet in the Ship of State!

That, as I remember saying in my first broadcast after the November elections, is "the American System." We may be proud of it, proud and grateful that in the face of almost irresistible temptations to swerve from its fundamental course, the old ship has kept on steering in the direction which the fathers charted.

To that inflexible resolution upon the part of her crew, the American ~~we~~ people, Franklin Roosevelt today paid merited tribute. In saying good night, I would like to join my own humble voice to the appeal with which he so feelingly closed his Inaugural Address.

God bless the United States! God bless Franklin Roosevelt and grant him capacity and courage to carry out the herculean task upon which he this night embarks.

To-day the Democratic Party almost ties its score with its political antagonists. In the course of our history we have had thirty-seven quadrennial presidential elections, thirty-seven quadrennial presidential inaugurations.

Nineteen times the Presidents thus inaugurated have been Federalists, or Whigs, or Republicans. Seventeen times they have been Democrats. Seventeen times -- till to-day. To-day makes it eighteen times.

In a few moments then the score will stand: Nineteen, eighteen.

The Federalists, the Whigs, the Republicans: they have been of a certain tradition. The Democrats: they have been of a certain other tradition. The two traditions have now inter-mingled themselves almost exactly equally into our national history and our national destiny. To them both we have owed the ^{chagiant} ~~recent~~ of our past. To them both we doubtless shall continue to owe the accumulating power of our unfolding future. We are a people of two philosophies -- and of one fate.

^{this day} ~~today~~ nevertheless, in a sense, brings us a novelty -- or, at any rate, the recurrence of a novelty. Four times in our history

the Democratic Party has most especially addressed itself to a renovation of our political and economic order. Four times , at the national polls, it has most peculiarly emphatically overthrown the pride of power existing. Four times it has proceeded from the national polls to the national offices as the triumphant herald of a new -- a new -- political and economic dispensation.

Each such occasion , in the past, has given us a name indelible in American memory. In 1801 -- and forever: Thomas Jefferson. In 1829 -- and forever: Andrew Jackson. In 1913 -- and forever: Woodrow Wilson.

Jefferson, the champion of new liberties for the common man. Jackson, the champion of new opportunities for the common man. Wilson, the champion of the New Freedom.

It is not only to the Democratic tradition, it is to the Jefferson-Jackson-Wilson strain in the Democratic tradition, that to-day's Democratic President succeeds. In that strain he announced the innovating principles that carried him to nomination and to election. We cannot know now that in that strain his name also will become indelible. We only know that to-day in that strain

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he starts writing his name on the scroll of our national time and eternity. We only know that to-day, as the fourth in the series of Democratic Presidents dedicated most particularly to newness, there is inaugurated Franklin Delano Roosevelt, champion of the New Deal.

To some there is terror in the word new. To many of the opponents of Jefferson, of Jackson, of Wilson, there was panicky terror in it. Those opponents misunderstood and misinterpreted America. They misinterpreted, indeed, the very prophets of the new. They thought them hostile and destructive to all of the old. History found them to be in fact tenaciously retentive of the essential vital substance of the old.

In the presidential office they at once proclaimed the totality and the indivisibility of American life. There could be no better prologue to what Mr. Roosevelt will presently say than a recollection of what was said before him by Mr. Wilson, by General Jackson, by Mr. Jefferson, when they took the oath, the consecrating oath, which now he is about to take.

Mr. Wilson, on March 4, ~~1898~~ 1913, said:

"At last a vision has been vouchsafed us of our life as a whole.

We see the debased and decadent along with the sound. Our duty is to correct the evil without impairing the good. It is to humanize every process of our common life without weakening it. It is to square every process with the standards we have always carried at our hearts. It is inconceivable that we should do this as partisans. It is inconceivable that we should do it in blind haste. We shall not destroy. Our work is a work of restoration."

And General Jackson. Enemy -- it was charged, in the course of his presidential candidacy -- to all money. Friend -- it was charged -- to any mob. General Jackson, on March 4, 1829, said:

"The spirit of equity, caution, and compromise in which the Constitution is formed requires that the great interests of agriculture, of commerce, and of manufactures should be equally favored."

But, above all, Mr. Jefferson. In the language of his day he was not a Democrat. Democrats then were still called Republicans. The reason ^{is} to-day ~~is~~ worth ~~remembering~~ remembering. They were called Republicans because of their distrust of monarchy, of autocracy,

and because of their faith in republican institutions, in institutions of free popular discussion and decision, of free and full popular control. Mr. Jefferson, on March 4, 1801, addressed an immortal rebuke to all doubters of the stability of democracy. He did not wish by law to restrain the doubters. His confidence in the stability of democracy was such that he almost even welcomed the doubters as prospective proofs of ~~the~~ ^{the} vanity of their ~~efforts~~ ^{efforts}.

He inaugurated his administration by saying, in words as shining as any inscribed upon our historical records:

"If there be any among us who would wish to dissolve this Union or to ~~change~~ ^{change} its form, let them stand undisturbed as monuments of the safety with which error of opinion may be tolerated where reason is left free to combat it."

And he had already, in a preceding sentence, said to both political parties listening to him:

"We are all Republicans now; we are all Federalists."

Ladies and gentlemen,
~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ to-day, at the inauguration of a President, of any President, as he undertakes his new national duties for us all, we are of course all Republicans, we are all Democrats. We

are all Americans.

It happens that Mr. Roosevelt becomes President in troubled times. We have known troubled times -- often -- before. It is now ~~XXXXXXXX~~ one hundred and forty-four years since the inauguration of George Washington. More than forty of them have been years of troubles, of economic adversities, of profound agricultural and industrial and financial distresses. We have survived them. We have emerged from them into new adjustments, new prosperities, new and better valuations and uses -- spiritual and material -- of our American heritage.

It has been always an expanding heritage. It has been always, in that sense, new. Mr. Roosevelt now proposes to make it newer.

Well!

Perhaps he believes that the only abiding Americanism is the Americanism that moves. It is the Americanism that was dissatisfied with the things of Europe and that ^{crossed the ocean} ~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ to our colonial coasts. It is the Americanism that found our eastern seaboard not enough and that crossed the Alleghenies and crossed the Rockies and

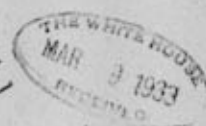
persevered to the Golden Gate. It is the Americanism that has transcended political and social and economic difficulties as readily as it has traversed territorial obstacles and has ever sought new Golden Gates of change, of change from restriction to enlargement, of change from the good, gone by, to the better, yet to come.

That is the Americanism that persists while all other Americanisms transitorily appear and fleetingly vanish. The one Americanism that remains with us ~~XXX~~ is the Americanism that made America: the Americanism that ceaselessly seeks security in unintimidated adventure.

Let us rejoice, then, if to that new-old Americanism we can imagine Mr. Roosevelt pledging himself ^{now} as he also pledges himself to the Constitution and becomes President of the United States of America. And to whatever he has of that Americanism, of that courage, of that confidence, of that fearlessness of the future, let us, in this emergency, in help of him, add -- all of us -- ours.

Some sixty hours have passed since Franklin D. Roosevelt laid his right hand on the ancient Dutch Bible of his forefathers and took his oath, in resolute and ringing voice, to support and defend the Constitution of the United States. That voice, with its supreme confidence and courage, still resounds in my ears. Never in my life have I heard and witnessed a drama so fraught with momentous significance. The echoes and the episodes of that thrilling hour on the Inaugural Platform so completely fill my mind that I would like, to-night, to relive it, to bring it back for a few minutes, to throw into high relief the chief figures of a mighty drama and some of the incidents which, in the tense-ness of the speeding moments, may have escaped the reporters of the press and the air. It was my privilege to be the only reporter on the Inaugural Platform, to be closer, with eye and ear, to the new President in his moment of supreme dedication, than any other observer of press or radio. And looking back to that platform and that exalted moment, I can say with absolute conviction, that the impression which came to me most strongly, and which indelibly remains, is that the new President is a strong and determined man, of greater strength and greater determination than I had ever judged him to be before I saw him face the great Chief Justice of the United States and expose his very soul to the eye of America. That was the inspiring, heartening, thrilling fact--that this man Roosevelt, taking command in one of the

darkest hours the Nation has seen for more than seventy years, seized the helm of the leaking, drifting ship of State with a hand that revealed no slightest trace of indecision or of uncertainty, but with the most buoyant confidence in himself, first of all; and then in the strength of our fundamental law, the Constitution; and then, and most important of all, in the American people, in their innate loyalty and patriotism and willingness to follow a leader who would lead! That was the note which sent an electric thrill, not only through the heart of this observer, who watched within a scant ten feet, the play of every emotion on the President's face. A leader who would lead! That was the electric thrill which went out in a great wave to the one hundred and fifty-thousand people massed in the plaza at the East front of the Capitol. In their faces and in their bearing you could see how that thrill penetrated to their worried and doubtful souls. You could see the instant reaction. You could see a hundred and fifty thousand heads go up in new courage and fresh hope. You could see a hundred and fifty thousand ^{pairs of} shoulders thrown back with new spirit and new determination to play the game as citizens. Never in my life have I heard a more galvanic, electrifying, kindling response to the summons of a leader than vibrated in the voice of the people when the President ended his great speech with these resolute words: "They have asked for discipline and direction under leadership. They have made me the present instrument of their wishes. In the spirit of the gift I take it." That was a great moment in American history, a moment to fire the blood and revive the spirit of every man and woman

with an ounce of courage and a throb of love for country. Such a call to the legions of loyalty has not been heard in the United States in many a long year. No wonder that grown men, accustomed to veil their feelings and conceal the ancient and primitive emotions, let tears toll down their cheeks, unregarded and unashamed. Down in front of the Inaugural Platform, sat hundreds of distinguished men and women looking upward at the transfigured countenance of the new President, and, among many others, John W. Davis and Josephus Daniels, the one a leader of his party nine years ago, the other the veteran North Carolina editor who was for eight years the Secretary of the Navy. Perhaps it was the bitter northwest wind, that blasted across the plaza and swept through the open stands, that brought the tears to the eyes of Mr. Davis and Mr. Daniels. But I think not. I think it was something deep within their own hearts, within the very souls of these elderly gentlemen, who were moved beyond their power to conceal, by those inspiring and animating words from the man who was assuming his terrific burden with such magnificent confidence, and in such an exalted mood. The tenseness of the inaugural ceremony was vastly increased by the considerable delay of the President-elect in reaching the platform. It was a delay caused by the congestion of people, immediately after the ceremony in the Senate Chamber of swearing in Vice President **Carnér**. The approach to the Inaugural Stand, from the corridors of the Capitol, was a bottle-neck exit giving directly upon a runway, or ramp, which had been built from the East doors of the Capitol to the stand itself. When the Senate ceremony was done

with, there was a tremendous rush toward that exit. Hundreds of people filled every chink of space at the entrance to the runway, completely blocking it. For perhaps an hour the police and the military were helpless to break the jam. The very first persons to appear on the stand were Vice President Garner and Ex-Vice President Curtis. They arrived before the congestion had formed. Mr. Garner came to his seat, next to mine, in the south west corner of the stand. Attired only in formal morning clothes, he suffered keenly from the bitter wind, from the chill that went straight to the bone. On the other side of the stand, Mr. Curtis sank into the depths of his fur coat, steadily looking at the floor, completely lost, probably, in the memories of forty years in Congress and of the career which he must abandon. And then the jam at the entrance to the runway piled up like logs caught in inextricable confusion at the mouth of a narrow stream. And from time to time some indignant personage who had been held up and who had forced his way, by hard won inches through the press, came bursting down the runway and upon the stand. Two or three members of the new Cabinet, half a dozen Senators, and finally Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and her tall sons and the President's happy mother, her face transfigured with joy, and then the members of the inaugural committee escorting Mr. Hoover and Mrs. Hoover. And then another long wait and then the Chief Justice, Charles Evans Hughes, in his long, black silk robes and his black silk skull cap. The Chief Justice took his stand with his back to the great crowd in the plaza beyond the platform, and watched

with keen gaze the close-packed crowd at the entrance to the platform, the crowd from which the President-elect must appear. He, too, shivered in the cold blast as he stood there very erect, his white beard stirred by the unfriendly wind and his black silk robe fluttering about his legs. Mr. Hoover, the President, so soon to depart from office, sat motionless in a leather-upholstered arm chair to the left of the metal lectern which Mr. Roosevelt was to use in delivering his speech. His face was set. Not for one moment throughout the whole ceremony was the grimness of his expression relieved by a single smile. The face of Herbert Hoover was the face of a sad and disappointed man. Perhaps there was resentfulness in it, resentfulness born of the feeling that fate had been bitterly harsh and unkind -- that he had not been given the chance to lead the country out of the troubles which he had not been responsible for. And then an attendant of the Supreme Court appeared, carrying with some effort the ancient Bible of the Roosevelt family, the Bible that has recorded the Roosevelt births and marriages and deaths for 263 years, a ponderous tome, thinned in cover and yellowed by time. And all at once there was a vast stir in the crowd which swelled back from near the front of the Capitol toward the Congressional Library-- acres and acres of people, all on their feet, heads bared, a hundred and fifty thousand pairs of eyes concentrated on the entrance to the stand. And then Mr. Roosevelt appeared, making his way slowly, on the arm of his eldest son, James. That in itself was an unforgettable picture, the President-elect entering the stand, approaching the Presidency upon legs still weak and

infirm, legs to which his indomitable determination have slowly given the strength to support his six feet of height and his stalwart body in a ~~dopperately~~ hard battle of eleven years. And the thought came to me, sitting there in a corner of the stand, and watching the crowd, and the set face of Herbert Hoover, and the elation upon the faces of the new men who are to be close to the new President, that if this man Roosevelt had the courage and the resolution to lift himself by the sheer power of his spirit from the bed of invalidism, had the determination and the ~~in-~~cred-ible patience to make himself walk again among men, to fight the battle for health and strength and win it, as he has done, that man must have in him the true qualities of leadership. It took character to win that battle. It took patience such as few men, I believe, are heir to. It took hope and confidence. And those are indispensable qualities of leadership. Slowly, I say, he came down the slanting runway upon the arm of his tall son, James, and if I ever saw upon a human face a look of exaltation, that look was strong and bright upon the face of Franklin D. Roosevelt. If ever I saw a reflection of the spirit upon the face of a human being I saw upon the face of Franklin D. Roosevelt the reflection of a spirit that is indomitable and confident, a spirit that laughs at defeat and challenges with gay intrepidity every flaunt and fling of the gods of misfortune. He was extremely pale, the President-elect, as he crossed the stand and took his place beside the Chief Justice at the lectern. But it was the paleness of intense emotion, of enormous resolution. And suddenly over that white, transfigured face broke a marvelous

smile as he grasped the hand of the Chief Justice, and the Marine Band in its scarlet jackets and blue trousers finished the last bars of "Hail to the Chief". Down in front, from their places in the yellow pine benches immediately under and directly in front of where the President-elect and the Chief Justice were standing in full view of the multitude, men and women gave way to the deep emotion of the moment, stirred by the tremendous thrill of the tableau. Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, whose husband Mr. Roosevelt had served so ably, waved a handkerchief. Bernard M. Baruch jumped upon a bench and swung his silk hat. Josephus Daniels pounded vigorously with his cane. And all at once Nature matched the smile of the President-elect with a brief burst of sunshine that broke through the gray mantle of clouds and revealed the blue of the heavens above and came to rest, like a friendly hand, upon the bared head of the man who was about to take the great oath. And then, without further delay, the Chief Justice began the reading of the oath, and the President-elect placed his right hand upon the open Book. His sun-browned fingers rested upon the beginning of the thirteenth chapter of St. Paul's first epistle to the Corinthians. That chapter which begins with these striking words: "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal....And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing"--- A strangely appropriate selection of Scripture to accompany the oath of office: "For now we see through a glass darkly"....And

suddenly the fine voice of Chief Justice Hughes, his sonorous tones spread far and wide over the acres of people, was reading the Presidential oath, as few Chief Justices have ever read it before, with power and dignity and marvelous dramatic effect. And when he came to the end with the words "So help me, God", the Chief Justice looked straight into the face of the President-elect expecting him, as did all the rest of us who witnessed the momentous scene, to say the two words, "I do", as other Presidents have said them. But Mr. Roosevelt was not content with the mere affirmation, with the simple words of acceptance of trust and responsibility. Instantly, as Justice Hughes started slightly, possibly in surprise, the new President, with his head thrown back, his shoulders squared, his eyes blazing with purpose, repeated the entire oath from beginning to end, and when he came to the final vow he put into it such fervor as I have never heard: "So help me, God!" It was all the more impressive, I think, because the people knew that only a little while before he had got down upon his knees in St. John's Episcopal Church and made his own compact with the Almighty, dedicating himself as a Christian gentleman to the service of the people of his country.. The first man to grasp the hand of the new President was Chief Justice Hughes, and then there was a flurry of handshaking and congratulations and good wishes, and presently the Inaugural Stand was bare and deserted and from the distance, borne by the wind, came the high, clear notes of the cavalry bugles as the horsemen wheeled into line around the motor car of the thirty-first President of the United States. The ceremony was over and done

with, but even in that chill and bitter wind, the people lingered in the plaza. They remained rooted to the spot, more than one hundred thousand of them, remained gazing at the empty stand from which, a few minutes before, had soared the resolute vow and challenge of their new President, as if hypnotized by something almost too great for easy comprehension. But I noted, this, that when they did go they went with smiles and gay talk. Something had happened to this cross-section of the American people within the hour, something that had given them new confidence, new fortitude, to face the problems and troubles of the hour. For they had looked upon and they had heard the voice of a man ~~whose~~ for whom they had been waiting a long time. The spirit of born leadership. And no one who sat on the Inaugural Platform, in such intimate contact with the spiritual significance and power of that ceremony, could fail to catch it. This man will lead. His direction may not always be right. But he will lead. And I think that nothing is more significant than this story: Only a day or two ago a close friend went to Mr. Roosevelt to caution him about an attitude he had assumed regarding a powerful section of our citizenship--an attitude he regarded as fair and just to the people even though it might be disagreeable to that one section. And his friend said: "Mr. President, don't you think you had better go slow in that matter?" Roosevelt replied: "Why should I go slow?" His friend said: "Because if you go through with that idea it might prevent your renomination and reelection"--- And Franklin D. Roosevelt made this reply: "What in the name

of Almighty God has my renomination and reelection got to do with
my doing the right thing?"

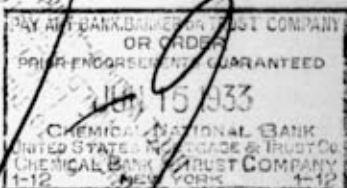

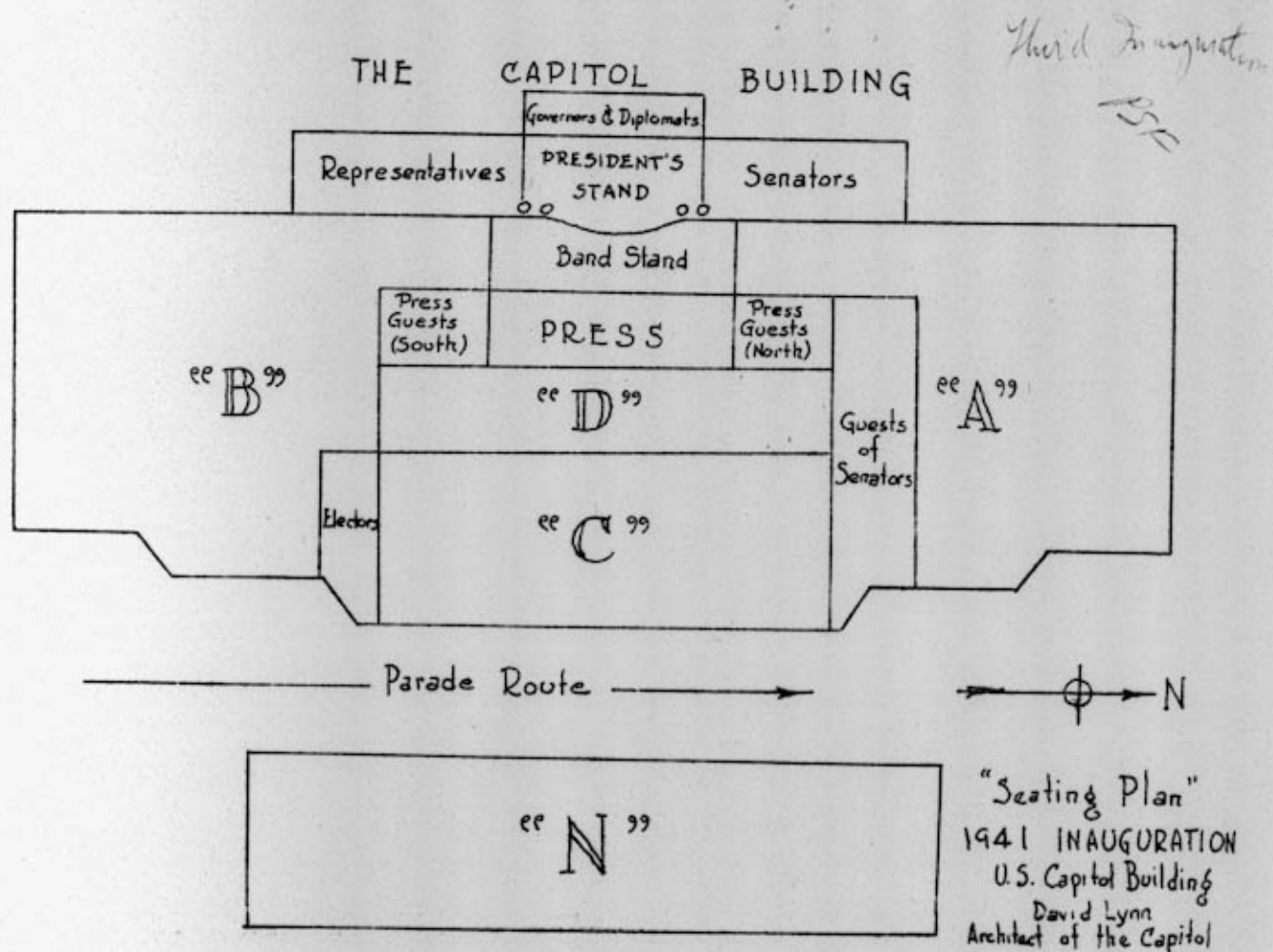

MEMORANDUM FOR MRS. ROOSEVELT:

Colonel Halsey, and possibly Mr. Lind¹, the Architect of the Capitol, will come tomorrow morning, Friday, at eleven o'clock, to discuss with you matters concerning the inauguration.

I talked with Colonel Halsey again on the telephone and he said that he would like to discuss in general terms--not specifically unless you can give them that much time, the procedure to be followed at the inauguration. Then, if possible, they would like to see the President for a few minutes to see if he will confirm whatever may have been agreed upon so that they may take it back to the Committee and get their view or approval on the matter.

Colonel Halsey suggests that some one person--not just an Army officer or someone like that--but someone who has had charge of general activities like Colonel Starling, be put in charge who can talk to Senators, Supreme Court Justices, et al., because if this is not done we will find that we will run into a lot of things that will be uncomfortable.

STATEMENT OF THE JOINT CONGRESSIONAL INAUGURAL COMMITTEE
Senator Harry F. Byrd, Chairman

The President of the United States, with the privilege of choosing where the Inaugural Ceremonies may be held, has informed the Joint Congressional Inaugural Committee that he desires to be inducted into office on the South Portico of the White House. This ceremony will, of course, include the inauguration of the Vice President at the same time. This message from the President has been conveyed to the Committee through two of the Capitol officials, Edwin A. Halsey, Secretary of the Senate and Secretary to the Committee, and David Lynn, Architect of the Capitol, whom the Committee had designated to call upon the President to ascertain his wishes in this matter.

The choice of the South Portico of the White House eliminates the customary expenditure for Inaugural Stands at the Capitol. This choice has been made by the President in view of the war conditions which necessitate the abandonment of normal ceremonial activities, the restriction of travel, scarcity of hotel accommodations, shortage of critical materials, the economies involved, the comfort of the guests, and the convenience of the main participants. It is understood that the President desires that the Congress, the Cabinet, the Court (Supreme), the Diplomatic Corps, and other distinguished guests, and the wives of those included, be invited to witness the ceremony.

STANDS FOR THE 1945 INAUGURATION

SCHEME A

Low bidder: Skinker & Garrett - \$43,750.

Scheme A duplicates the 1941 Inaugural Stands, with the exception that the seating accommodations for guests of Members of Congress are reduced from 15,000 to 5,020 seats, and the 240 seats on the section of the central portico occupied by guests of the Clerk of the House of Representatives and the Sergeant at Arms of the Senate are entirely eliminated.

The accommodations include the following:

President's stand 17'-0" x 39'-6" at portico level; benches at portico level for 784 Members of Congress and distinguished guests; benches and tables for 624 members of the Press; benches for 460 guests of the Press; benches for 5,020 guests of Members of Congress.

Bandstand; wood floors with guard rails on cheek blocks of Senate and House steps; seven photographers' stands; four radio booths; one toilet shed; wood screen in rotunda; automobile and pedestrian ramps at Law Library entrance.

SCHEME C (Modification of Scheme A)

Low bidder: Skinker & Garrett - \$26,750.

Scheme C is the same as Scheme A, with the exception that it eliminates the entire portion of the stands containing the 5,020 seats for guests of Members of Congress, 460 seats for guests of the Press provided for under Scheme A, and reduces the number of photographers' stands from seven to five.

SCHEME B

Low bidder: Walter B. Avery - \$14,800.

Scheme B duplicates the 1921 Inaugural Stand. This is a small stand and makes no provision, at all, for guests of Members of Congress or for guests of the Press.

It provides crowded accommodations for the President, the Congress, the Judiciary, and the various other officials usually occupying the President's stand proper and the stands immediately adjoining the President's stand. The accommodations include:

President's stand 17'-0" x 27'-0" at portico level, providing seats for about 60 persons; stand, without seats, at portico level, for Members of Congress and distinguished guests, providing standing room for about 550 persons; accommodations for radio, press, and photographers.
