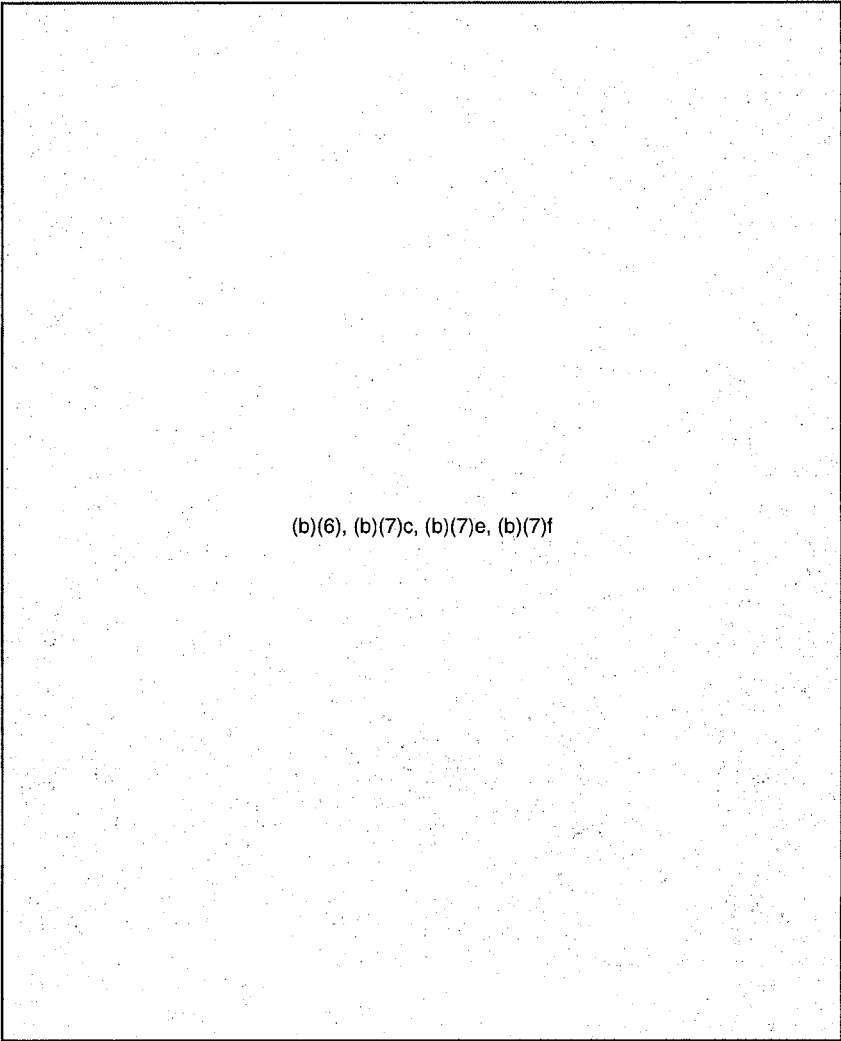

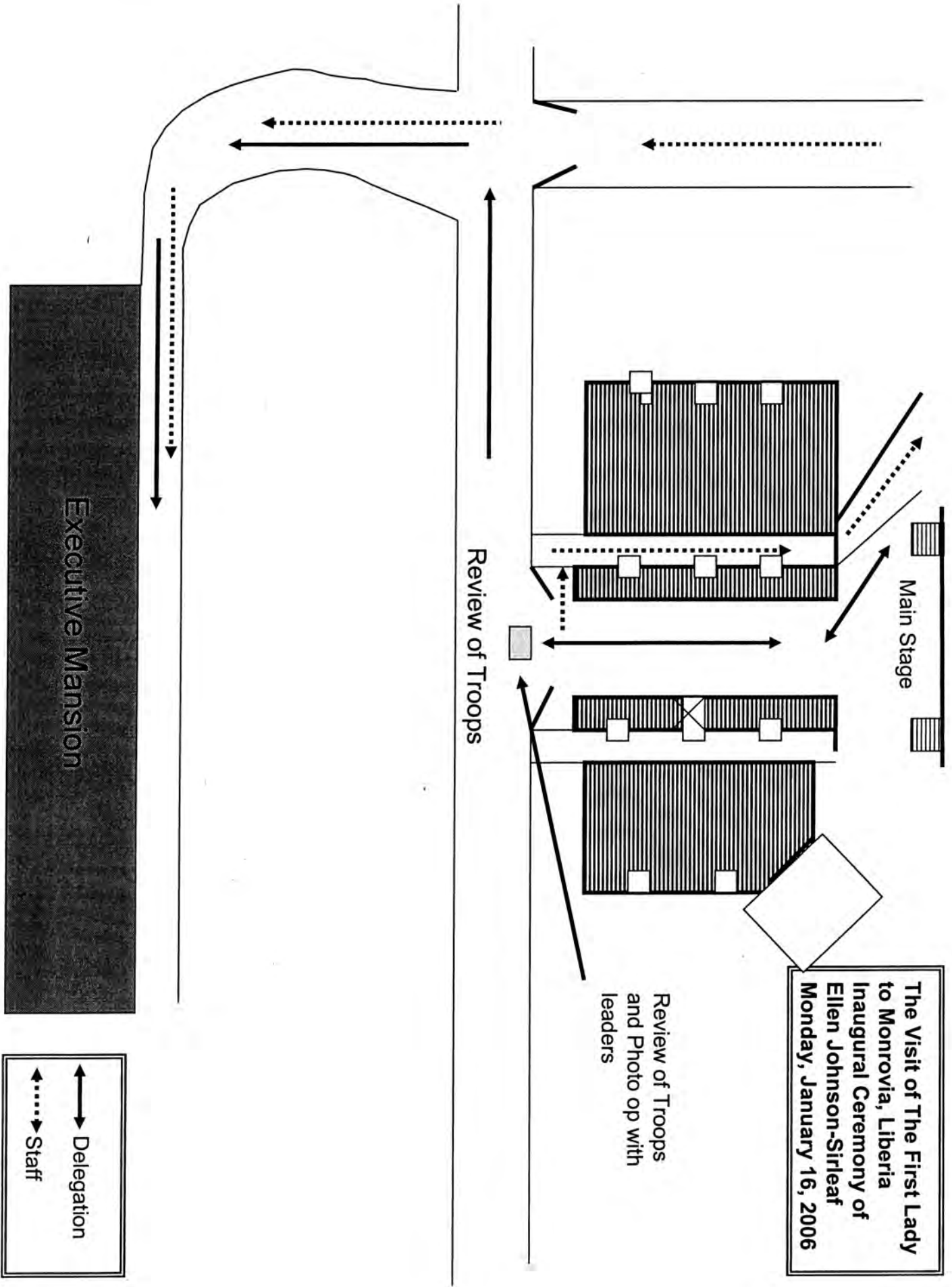

Background on Peace Corps 45th Anniversary January 10, 2006

Dr. Kwame Nkrumah, the first President of Ghana, requested Peace Corps Volunteers to join in the new nation's post-colonial development. When fifty-two Volunteers arrived in Accra on August 31, 1961, Ghana became the first country in the world to receive Volunteers.

Beginning March 1, 2006, in honor of all current and returned Volunteers, the Peace Corps will celebrate 45 years of service promoting development, peace, and friendship throughout the world.

In creating the Peace Corps in 1961, President John F. Kennedy asked Americans to journey abroad—not as tourists, but as global citizens. He envisioned that Volunteers would become members of foreign communities and show people of different nations that Americans were committed to cultural exchange, to the advancement of people everywhere, and to freedom for all people. Today, 45 years later, we celebrate the more than 182,000 Peace Corps Volunteers who have lived that vision and created a legacy of service at home and abroad in 138 countries around the world.

The 125 Volunteers currently serving in Ghana are part of a rich legacy of partnership, person-to-person development, peace, and friendship. Today, thousands of Ghanaians fondly remember the Peace Corps Volunteers who touched their lives. For forty-five years, across the nation, Volunteers have made lasting contributions in every region, in cities and towns, and in rural villages and communities. The Volunteers have been changed forever. We hold dear our commitment to Ghana and her people.

Volunteers are currently working in eco-tourism, HIV/AIDS education and prevention, guinea worm eradication, water and sanitation, agroforestry, secondary math, science and ICT education, and visual art education at schools for the deaf.

Today, in the new millennium, the Peace Corps' mission is more vital than ever. Volunteers are providing expertise and development assistance to countries around the world, finding common ways to address global challenges, such as the HIV/AIDS pandemic, and building unbending bonds of friendship across an ever-shrinking world.

She is currently the HIV/AIDS Volunteer Coordinator for Peace Corps Ghana and lives in Accra.
2. Cibeles is a native of Brownsville, Texas. She holds a BSc. In Engineering from the University of Michigan. She has varied experiences from working with the Environmental Protection Agency to be an Engineering Program Officer at the University of Michigan. She is also the author of a scholarship book in Spanish, Fuentes de Financiamiento Para Estudios en el Extranjero. Cibeles is currently teaching Mathematics in Amanten Senior Secondary in the Brong-Ahafo Region of Ghana.
3. Mary "Liz" Kah was born in Corpus Christi, Texas, and grew up in Coppell. Liz graduated from New York University with a major in Philosophy and intends to pursue medicine as a career. She has been in Ghana since September 2005 and lives in Koforidua, in the Eastern Region. Liz works with people living with HIV/AIDS and children orphaned by AIDS. She also works on education and outreach programs.
4. Ryan Lavoie comes from Athens, Texas and he graduated from the University of Texas, Arlington with a BA in Interdisciplinary Studies (focused on Journalism, Art and Business). He is a first-year Health/Water and Sanitation Volunteer at Sankpala in the Northern Region of Ghana. His assignment involves working in collaboration with other organizations to eradicate the Guinea Worm disease.
5. Allison O'Sullivan is a native of San Antonio, Texas. She is a graduate of Stanford University, CA and she holds a BA in Anthropological Sciences. Allison joined Peace Corps Ghana in September 2005 as an Environment Volunteer. She is working with the Savannah Resource Management Project in the Upper East Region of Ghana. She is developing alternative livelihood projects for communities along the Ghana-Burkina Faso border.

Ghana's political environment is stable despite instability in some parts of West Africa. The December 7, 2004 presidential and parliamentary elections received international praise for their success as free, fair, transparent and without any irregularities. This was an historic election because it marked the longest multi-party democratic period in Ghana's post-colonial history. The administration promotes a private-sector-led development approach heralded as the "Golden Age of Business."

The government remains committed to extending and strengthening democratic institutions. Civil society organizations are emerging as active participants in framing the policy agenda. Parliament's prominence is growing. The press is free and vibrant with more than 100 FM radio stations. In 2004 Ghana was selected for funding through the Millennium Challenge Account.

The economic environment has stabilized with reduced inflation, lower interest rates, and a relatively stable currency. In 2004 real GDP grew at 5.8 percent. Average inflation declined from 26.7 percent in 2003 to 12.6 percent in 2004.

Economic growth has not been accompanied by improved health statistics as would normally be expected. Modest gains have been made in primary school enrollment. There continues to be a deficit of teachers in mathematics, science, and computer technology, particularly in rural areas. Deterioration of the environment, from deforestation and drought, also has had a negative impact on social and economic demographics. The HIV/AIDS infection rate is 3.6%. Access to clean water remains a problem. Half of all Guinea Worm Disease cases worldwide are in Ghana.

Program Focus

Since 1961, when Ghana became the first country to welcome Peace Corps Volunteers, nearly 4,000 Volunteers have served there. The government regards Volunteers' work as a significant contribution to community and national development. It has been estimated that one quarter of current senior level government officials and industry leaders were taught by Peace Corps Volunteer teachers in the 1960s and 1970s.

The Peace Corps' programming is consistent with the Ghana Poverty Reduction Strategy of 2002. Peace Corps participates in Ghana's economic recovery, and the protection and promotion of its human and natural resources. All Volunteers promote HIV/AIDS awareness. Ghana's transitional economy demonstrates an increased demand for small enterprise development opportunities. Information Communication Technology is a quickly expanding sector.

Volunteer Focus**Business Development**

Volunteers provide training in eco-tourism, small business and micro-business development, financial management, marketing, product quality, client servicing, standards, and credit availability for small entrepreneurs. They work with international and local nongovernmental

agencies, local governments, and private sector associations, in both urban and rural areas. Volunteers have won several Ghana government awards in ecotourism. They also organize youth clubs to build self-esteem, organize income-generating projects with People Living with HIV/AIDS, and teach HIV/AIDS awareness seminars to youth and adults. Two Volunteers are developing tourism destinations and products focused on the cultural and historical value of kente weaving and bead making.

Education

Volunteers teach science, math, information and computer technologies, and visual arts to 7,600 students in rural public senior and junior secondary schools and schools for the deaf. With Ghanaian teachers, Volunteers develop teaching resource manuals, establish science resource centers, laboratories, and art studios, and help identify and acquire computer and library resources for schools. They also help strengthen parent-school and school-community relationships of support.

One Volunteer assigned to a nurse training college obtained a donation of 23 computers and established a computer training center with a special focus on computing skills that enhance the delivery and management of health services.

A Volunteer led a group of deaf and visually impaired students to an African Youth Alliance workshop. Topics included: building healthy relationships, decision-making, leadership skills, career planning, sexual reproductive health and HIV/AIDS. He participated with local health and social workers to undertake primary health care programs on child health care and welfare, communicable diseases, disposal of waste and general hygiene. Together with other teachers in his school, they designed visual aids and other teaching materials to enhance their delivery in the classroom.

Environment

Volunteers reduce environmental degradation through partnerships with governmental and nongovernmental agencies. Persistent issues are: deforestation, diminished soil fertility, erosion, and disappearance of naturally occurring bodies of water. As agro-forestry managers, Volunteers facilitate the planting and sale of over five hundred thousand seedlings each year at community schools, clinics, churches, community forest reserves, and woodlots. They develop community environmental groups in over 50 communities each year. They transfer management skills for natural resource-based income generating projects. About ten Volunteers develop environmental education projects at 25 junior secondary schools with over six hundred students.

Health and HIV/AIDS

Volunteers promote behavior change to reduce water and sanitation related diseases and to create HIV/AIDS awareness and prevention. In 2005, 26 Volunteers assisted more than 65 communities to acquire, operate and manage water and sanitation facilities. Volunteers work with non-governmental organizations to extend piped water. They extend school-based health knowledge to homes through the School Health Education Program. They assist clinic staff with hygiene, sexual reproductive health, sexually transmitted infections and nutritional education. In 2005, all the Health Volunteers created HIV/AIDS awareness training for men, women, and children. Three Health Volunteers work directly with local groups of People Living with AIDS and engage them in their educational outreach programs as well as supporting the groups with income generating activities. One-half of health Volunteers are working to eradicate the debilitating Guinea Worm Disease.

Presidential African Education Initiative: The Textbooks and Learning Materials Program

USAID announced the implementers for the Africa Education Initiative's Textbooks and Learning Material Program (TLMP), a component of AEI specifically focused on challenges relating to lack of textbooks and learning materials in sub-Saharan Africa. The objective of the program is to develop and produce textbooks and educational materials for grades K through 8 in the subject areas of mathematics, science, language arts, and reading.

The Textbooks and Learning Materials Program (TLMP) will begin writing and producing new textbooks and other learning materials in Africa. The program will be implemented through collaborative partnership between USAID, U.S. minority-serving universities and African education institutions. The Textbooks and Learning Materials Program (TLMP) goal is to enhance access of girls and boys to learning opportunities by providing 15 million copies of quality, cost-effective textbooks and learning materials for use in African primary schools. By 2010 these appropriate, quality, gender-sensitive and culturally relevant materials will be put into classrooms and into the hands of learners.

The six US TLMP implementing partners are:

Elizabeth City State University (North Carolina) partnering with Senegal
Alabama A&M University (Alabama) partnering with Ethiopia
South Carolina State University (South Carolina) partnering with Tanzania

Mississippi Consortium for International Development partnering with Zambia

Accra Teachers Training College

Accra Teacher Training College is a three-year certificate, granting teacher training college located in East Legon, just outside of Accra. It currently has approximately 547 students on campus (Year 1 and Year 2 students) and another 265 students in training placements at primary school. The student body make up is approximately 60% men and 40% women. All "on campus" students live at the College.

The College has approximately 90 staff of whom 48 are teaching faculty. Classes average 40 students each. Subjects include Math, English, Science, Agricultural Science, Physical Education, Education Studies and Professional Development, Religion and Morals, Sociology and the Environment, and Pre-vocational Studies (which includes art, cooking sewing).

Education in Ghana

During the past ten years there have been modest improvements in overall rates of achievement in basic education in Ghana. Enrollment increased significantly over the past few years from 72.8 in 1998 to 86.3 in 2004. Education participation rates, however, continue to be especially low for girls in northern Ghana (20% lower than the national average) and for the poor. Another critical development challenge in Ghana is the low quality of education. Out of every 100 Ghanaian school-age children, 90 enter Grade One (P1), 67 complete Grade Six (P6), and only seven school-age children are able to read with understanding at the P6 level.

Issues of education quality arise from inadequate resources for basic education, coupled with curriculum deficiencies, weak management and a lack of performance accountability and commitment to decentralize. The spread of HIV infection further threatens to exacerbate these challenges and further deepens the low level of educational quality if efforts are not made to curtail HIV/AIDS in the sector.

FUNDING

The Africa Education Initiative (AEI) has committed \$18 million over 3 years for the textbook program starting in 2003.

The 25,000 books are being donated primarily by the MacMillan Company (\$33/per book) = \$825,000 @ 25,000 books. The shipment of the books to Africa is made possible by AEI.

NOTES

- Only one of the six presidents from the U.S. Universities is unable to attend the event. Because of the vacancy of the presidency at Alabama A&M University, USAID invited Dr. Mary Spor, *Professor of*

Literacy, Ph.D. Program Coordinator-Reading/Literacy and program manager for the Textbooks and Learning Materials Program, to attend this event. Alabama A&M University is teamed with Ethiopia.

FACT SHEET

Africa Education Initiative

Primary school enrollment in African countries are among the lowest in the world, with 36% of children in Africa not in school. Education in most of Africa is adversely affected by limited funds and lack of adequate numbers of teachers, classrooms, and learning materials. In June 2002, President Bush announced the Africa Education Initiative (AEI), which focuses on increasing access to quality basic education opportunities in Africa through scholarships, textbooks, and teacher training programs. It is implemented by USAID.

In June 2005, President Bush announced increased funding under AEI and an expansion of efforts to improve access to education and training for marginalized students and teachers; out-of-school youth, orphans, and other vulnerable children; and access to productivity-increasing job skills training and development for youth and their families. The total initiative is \$600 million during the period Fiscal Year 2002 through Fiscal Year 2010.

Ambassadors Girls' Scholarship Program. In Africa, girls account for 60 percent of the approximately 42 million children who are not enrolled in school. AEI is working to bridge this gender gap by providing 550,000 scholarships by 2010, mostly to African girls at the primary and secondary levels, so that they can grow up to assume positive roles in the education, political, and economic sectors of their countries. Support may include tuition, books, uniforms, and other essentials needed to ensure continued access to education opportunities. Scholarship recipients also benefit from mentoring activities that promote self-development and provide positive role models for the girls.

Textbooks and Other Learning Materials. The AEI, in partnership with African institutions and American minority serving institutions, will develop 15 million textbooks and related learning and teaching materials and distribute them in Africa. This partnership emphasizes relevant content, institutional capacity building, and the long-term sustainability of the partnerships between the African institutions and their American counterparts.

Teacher Training. The pursuit of universal access to education places enormous stress on already burdened education systems in Africa. Recruiting, training, and supporting enough teachers to provide quality learning can be particularly challenging. To meet this challenge, AEI is developing, promoting and expanding innovative methods for training more than 920,000 teachers and administrators to improve the quality of learning for millions of African children.

AEI provides support to strengthen the focus on HIV/AIDS mitigation and prevention. AEI increases the capacity of African education systems to manage the impacts of HIV/AIDS on teachers, students, and the quality of education. Many of the scholarship and teacher training programs include HIV/AIDS prevention and Life Skills curricula.

The initiative also increases parent and community involvement in children's education through such activities as sponsoring reading programs and strengthening parent associations. This will help schools and school systems become more transparent and responsive to the needs of civil society.

Beginning in Fiscal Year 2007, new components of AEI will begin including outreach to marginalized

populations such as orphans and vulnerable children, out-of-school youth, and Muslims; rehabilitation of schools; and the use of technologies.

Recognizing that the education of African children is vital to Africa's future economic growth and lasting democracy, AEI is designed to improve education opportunities for Africa's children so that they and their families can enjoy the benefits of literacy and learning.

As of December 2005:

- AEI has provided 120,000 scholarships in 40 countries.
- Over 2.1 million textbooks and other learning materials have been distributed.
- Nearly 60,000 new and over 250,000 current teachers in 15 countries have been trained.

I. BACKGROUND

In June 2002, U.S. President George W. Bush announced his commitment to improve Africa's education through the Africa Education Initiative (AEI). President Bush pledged \$200 million over five years to address the needs of sub-Saharan Africa. The Africa Education Initiative focuses on three primary activities: (1) girls' scholarships,

(2) teacher training, and (3) textbook and learning materials development.

Resources for AEI are managed by the United States Agency for International Development's (USAID) Africa Bureau located in Washington DC. USAID Missions located in African countries collaborate with USAID Washington to implement the AEI, integrating its resources to the extent possible into basic education programs that USAID supports on the ground in Africa.

Recognizing that African children are the future of the continent, the President espoused the idea that education is the key to future economic growth and lasting democracy and will ultimately lead to greater stability and improved standards of living. Currently, much of sub-Saharan Africa is challenged by limited funds and a shortage of teachers, textbooks and other educational resource materials. The "Textbooks and Learning Materials Program (TLMP) is one component of AEI, specifically focused on challenges relating to lack of textbooks and other learning materials. Its objective is to develop and produce textbooks and educational materials for grades K - 8 in mathematics, science, language arts and reading for selected sub-Saharan African countries.

In an effort to foster collaboration and consultation while meeting a vital element of need, President Bush announced that the TLMP activity would work through Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) in the United States, partnering with African countries, to develop 4.5 million textbooks and educational resource materials. The intent of TLMP is to develop and produce these textbooks and learning materials in collaborative partnerships between an MSI in the United States and selected institutions in sub-Saharan countries in Africa. Each of these collaborative partnerships is being called a TLMP Partnership. The current focus is on six sub-Saharan nations for three years, from 2005-2008. The total amount of the grant to date, beginning on January 20, 2003, covering the six countries and including all costs related to book production as well as technical assistance and administration of the activity, is \$30,000,000.00. There are currently six TLMP implementing partners:

II. PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of the overall Textbooks and Learning Materials Program (TLMP) activity is twofold:

1. MSIs will work closely with USAID for technical direction and with African partner country curriculum developers and educationalists to write, publish, and distribute a minimum of 3.6 million high quality and low-cost textbooks (based on partner country national curricula) to students in target schools.
2. Each MSI will establish collaborative partnerships with relevant educational institutions in the partner country through technical assistance that will result in the design of

textbooks and other learning materials in keeping with the national curriculum of the partner country.

Chicago State University (CSU) was selected as the MSI to work with Ghana under the TLMP activity. Terms of this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) thus apply to the activity as it is implemented in Ghana. This MOU does not constitute a formal obligation of funds by the United States Government nor does it constitute a legally binding commitment by any Party.

III. IMPLEMENTATION

To achieve the purpose of this MOU, the Parties, individually and subject to the availability of funds and a stable environment, will jointly cooperate to produce learning materials that are based on the priorities and curricula of Ghana and are culturally and socially acceptable. Collaboration, the process of Ghanaian and American partners working jointly to make more learning materials available to learners, is integral to the success of this program.

Subject joint efforts of the Parties will include:

- Mutual exchange of information and data on specific sectoral activities;
- Support for the adoption of materials to improve school quality;
- Coordination of technical assistance and other activities to ensure that the Ghana TLMP activity compliments and adds value to the USAID/Ghana bilateral education program wherever possible;
- Meeting periodically at the request of the Parties to share experiences and lessons learned, and facilitate the transmission of best practices;
- Testing and implementation of verification and certification systems to monitor and measure the impact, effectiveness and sustainability of activities;
- Sharing information on opportunities that may arise for collaboration with other organizations that may leverage resources invested by the Parties.

The end result of these joint efforts will be the creation of a Textbooks and Learning Materials Program in Ghana that is acceptable to all of the Parties.
