My dear Mr. Gutrie:-

Mr. Hackett writes me that the proper procedure is for you, as the father of Augustus, to apply to the Surrogate's Court of Kings County to be appointed General Guardian for Augustus. You will then have to furnish a bond, but this can be avoided by appointing a bank or trust company to act with you.

If you are appointed General Guardian you would then have to apply (preferably through Henry T. Hackett) to the Surrogate's Court of Dutchess County asking for the appointment of an Administrator of Gus' estate. Furnishing an Administrator's bond can be avoided by having a bank or trust company appointed co-Administrator.

I hope you will let me know how things are getting on and what you and Augustus decide to have done.

Re: Estate of August A. Gennerich

I understand that the facts relating to the above estate are as follows:

August A. Gennerich died at Buenos Aires, Argentine on Dec. 1st, 1936, intestate, leaving him surviving as his only heir at law and next of kin, Augustus Cutrie, a nephew, aged nineteen, residing with his father Charles Cutrie at 375 State Street, Brooklyn, N. Y.

In this estate a General Guardian will have to be appointed as the nephew is under twenty-one years of age. The Surrogate's Court of King's County is the proper court to appoint the guardian as the nephew resides in that County. The General Guardian will have to furnish a bond, but, this can be avoided by appointing a bank or trust company to act with him.

After the General Guardian is appointed he can then apply to the Surrogate's Court of Dutchess County to be appointed Administrator of Gus' estate and can again avoid furnishing a bond by having a bank or trust company appointed Administrator with him.

I had in mind the Brooklyn Trust Company of 177 Montague Street, Brooklyn, N. Y., of which George V. McLaughlin, former Superintendent of Banks of New York State, is the President.

If any one insists upon obtaining possession of the money or other property of the decedent, he could be told that it would not be delivered until an Administrator had been appointed by a court of competent jurisdiction. I will be glad to go over this matter with you at any time you can see me.

Dear Augustus:-

Thank you for your letter. The boxes containing Gus' belongings from his room here have been sent to you and your father and you should get them very soon.

I do not think you need a lawyer in New York. If your father will apply to the Surrogate's Court in Brooklyn to have him and the trust company appointed as guardians for you, the order should then be sent to Mr. Mackett. He then applies to the Surrogate in Poughkeepsie for the letters of administration of your father and the trust company, and as soon as this is done the safe deposit box can be opened and your aunt's bank book, etc., delivered to her. This whole proceeding ought not to take more than a very few days. The trust company in Brooklyn can handle the Brooklyn end of it.

Re: Estate of August A. Gennerich

I believe that the place of residence of the decedent at the time of his death determines the place where his Will should be probated.

If he was actually a resident of Rhinebeck at the time of his death, his Will should be probated in the Surrogate's Court of Dutchess County.

As the Executor named therein is under twenty-one years of age, he is disqualified, and his General Guardian when he has been duly appointed can make the petition for probate.

In any event, it is important that the boy's father should know the amount of the decedent's personal property, so that he can give a proper bond as General Guardian.

If he would have a Trust Company appointed to act with him, he could save the annual premiums on the bond which will amount to quite a sum.

Enclosed herewith is a copy of a letter I am sending to the Lawyer for the boy's father so that you may know what I am saying to him.

Dear Franklin:

Englehardt notified the Trust Company and myself about a week ago that he intended to vacate Gus' place on or about Nov. 1st. I immediately wrote to Joseph Gaudino, Attorney for Charles Outrie, and asked him to let me know if he was in a position to do anything about protecting the property if Englehardt should leave. He has not answered me.

On Oct. 29th Englehardt notified us that he is leaving at seven A. M. Thursday, November 4th. I tried to reach Benson R. Frost, his Attorney, at Rhinebeck this morning and was informed he will be out of town until sometime tonight. I have seen the trust officer of the Trust Company and he will go up and see Englehardt Wednesday morning and try to make some arrangements with him to stay there for at least a week until we can do something about storing the personal property.

I have just been out to see George M. Briggs, the surveyor, and he will meet me at Wright's house on Violet Avenue tomorrow morning about ten o'clock to survey the land. I have had a man make a search of the records and find that there are four mortgages affecting this property, three held by the Trust Company and one by the estate of C. W. H. Arnold and also some unpaid taxes, all of which will have to be released or paid before title can be taken.
