Small Business Supports Health Care Transparency

Last session, the governor signed legislation creating a health insurance **All-Payer Claims Database (APCD)**, but it **won't work in its current form**. The data was limited to PEBB and Medicaid, and no one insurance carrier can be the source of more than 25% of the data in a report. You simply **cannot generate statistically valid reports** given these restrictions.

NFIB worked with a broad coalition over the interim to craft legislation that will fix the problem. These changes were negotiated with Premera and Regence, who support this solution. This proposal:

- Is **fiscally responsible**. The APCD will be established with federal grant money already awarded to the state. **This proposal will fix the database, protecting the taxpayers' investment**. Failure to act will squander these dollars on another inoperable system.
- Includes all payers. Premera and Regence have agreed to a requirement for all health insurers to provide claims data, as did Group Health Cooperative, UnitedHealth Group and Aetna, who helped develop the coalition's proposal. Large self-insured employers and Taft-Hartley trusts may voluntarily opt-in and provide their claims data.
- Real transparency. The APCD is the foundation for consumers, employers, policymakers, and health care providers to gain access to real cost and quality data that will lead to better informed health care purchasing decisions.
- Saves money. Providing information enables free-market solutions to address ever-increasing health care costs. In fact, a 2014 WestHealth Policy Center report estimates the U.S. could reduce health care spending by \$61 billion through increased transparency.
- Protects patient and financial data. The proposal has strict data access and use limitations to protect patients' personal health information and carriers' financial data.
- Has broad support. It is a priority bill for NFIB, the Washington Health Alliance and other members of the Coalition for Health Care Cost Transparency, which includes The Everett Clinic, Washington State Medical Association, Washington State Hospital Association, Washington State Pharmacy Association, Group Health, King County, Pfizer, Providence Health & Services, and the Healthy Washington Coalition.

Small business owners and the **families** they support are now **required to purchase health insurance**. They **deserve access to meaningful cost and quality information** to make informed health care decisions. The **APCD** is the **foundation** for better information and lower costs.
