99's Fly Now Award

Purpose:

The FLY NOW Award (formerly the New Pilot Award) is a progressive award given to Associate Members of the Ninety-Nines, Inc. who demonstrate a need for financial assistance to become licensed pilots. The Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship Fund has decided to expand the scope of this award to provide up to \$3000 toward completion of the Recreational Pilot, Sport Pilot, or Private Pilot certificate, or non-U.S. quivalent, in any aircraft. This award will be given progressively to winners AFTER they complete four milestones in their training.

Eligibility:

- 1. MEMBERSHIP: At the time of the applicant's submission deadline, the applicant must be an officially registered Associate Member of The Ninety-Nines, Inc. and if in a Section with Chapters, must be a Chapter Member.
- 2. FINANCIAL NEED: Applicant must demonstrate a need for financial assistance to progress toward completion of her primary (first ever) pilot certificate.
- 3. MENTOR: All applicants for a FLY NOW Award MUST have a MENTOR, who is a member of The 99s. The MENTOR must agree to communicate with the applicant at least once a month and support her as she passes through each stage of the AWARD.
- 4. FLIGHT TRAINING: Applicant must meet the following requirements at time of application:
 - a) TYPE OF TRAINING: Applicant must be pursuing her primary (first ever) pilot certificate or license, such as the Recreational Pilot certificate, Sport Pilot certificate, or Private Pilot certificate, or non-U.S. equivalent. This training may be in any aircraft type appropriate to the primary pilot certificate sought, such as airplane, glider, hot air balloon, etc.
 - b) MEDICAL CERTIFICATE: If required for the primary pilot certificate being sought, applicant must have a current, valid medical certificate or evidence of medical eligibility.
 - c) WRITTEN KNOWLEDGE TEST: Applicant does NOT need to have passed this test at the time of application.
 - d) FLIGHT HOURS: Applicant does NOT need to have soloed.

Charlie R. Hillard had the mark of a highly determined individual at a very young age. Born on March 22, 1938, Charlie was ten when he went to work for his dad "King Charlie Hillard" dusting cars on the family car lot for \$10 a week. Young Charlie had a plan. By his 16th birthday that plan was becoming a reality as he made his first solo flight that year. Then, as a freshman at Georgia Tech, Charlie purchased his first airplane, a Piper Cub. At 18, he mastered sky diving and again proving his fierce determination, earned a place on the U.S. Skydiving team just two years later in 1958. That summer, Charlie began building his list of "firsts" as he and partner Steve Snyder were the very first in the U.S. to pass a baton in a free-fall.

Charlie then began to concentrate solely on precision aerobatic flying and in turn, began to amaze audiences around the country. He won the National Championship in 1967 and represented the U.S. in four world championships. Charlie made America especially proud in 1972, as he was the first American to win the world aerobatic title. It was the year after he partnered with Gene Soucy and Tom Poberezny to form the Red Devil Aerobatic Team, a world-class aerobatic team that would take precision aerobatic flight to new and amazing heights. In 1979, the threesome made their debut as the Eagles Aerobatic Flight Team with Charlie as lead pilot. They flew together for more than 25 years and became synonymous around the world with precision aerobatic perfection. In 1996, with more than 15,000 flying hours to his credit, Charlie decided to embark on the next exciting phase of his amazing career as a solo aerobatic pilot in his Hawker Fury, a highperformance, fixed-wing monoplane.

Throughout his life Charlie was recognized many times for his aerobatic excellence including the International Council of Air Show's Wilkinson Sword of Excellence Award and induction into the International Aerobatics Hall of Fame. While Charlie was truly key to the advancement of precision aerobatics, he was also an enthusiastic contributor and volunteer in his community, particularly devoted to family and children's causes and organizations. To the people who knew and loved Charlie, this was no surprise, as it was well understood that at the very core of this remarkable man, who regularly soared to heights not often reached or even imagined by others, was his limitless love and dedication to home and his family.

Great lives often reflect great partnerships. When an adventurous pilot named Abby Wolf, married his wife Constance "Connie" Wolf, she provided the ultimate complement to their partnership. At one point much later in her life, she was one of only five women in the entire world to possess a valid airman's certificate longer than fifty years.

Abby taught Connie to fly on their honeymoon. She and Abby took their first balloon ride together in 1951 over Zurich, Switzerland. The thrill of that ride inspired a life-long passion for Connie, but an unusually subdued Abby found himself "huddling in the bottom of this miserable laundry basket." Consequently, while Connie went on to perform various and well-publicized balloon flights, Abby returned to pilot all manner of powered aircraft, never setting foot in a balloon again.

Connie abhorred hot air ballooning. It was "too hot, much too noisy, not what a person of character would fly". Her balloons were filled with hydrogen. Not helium, Connie would have only the best, and that was hydrogen. She suspended a fluffy feather from a wisp of thread to see if she was climbing or descending.

In 1959, Connie duplicated the first balloon flight in America, exactly repeating what Jean Pierre Blanchard had done in 1793. Earlier, in 1951, she spent a frigid 40 hours and 18 minutes setting 15 world records, including taking the women's endurance record away from two Russians.

In 1962, Connie was the first woman to cross the Alps in a balloon.

On the 200th anniversary of the Constitution, she flew a balloon shaped like the Liberty Bell over Philadelphia.

When Connie wasn't ballooning, she was flying with Abby.

It is said of this couple, "Abby liked airplanes with engines so you could GO somewhere. Connie preferred silent balloons, so you could BE somewhere".

Connie Wolf and her husband shared a life-long love of aviation, adventure, and public service.

After the war, James flew his Cessna 170B on business trips and personal trips that took him to 58 countries and every Caribbean island with a landing strip. He has also flown extensively in North America as a rancher, oil and gas explorer and real estate developer, logging more than 3,500 hours in single-pilot Citations over a 29-year period.

A note from Tom Davis, president of Crystal Aero Group:

I have always referred to John E. Kirk as a friend and a mentor, but never as a role model, as I felt it would be presumptuous of me to believe I could emulate to any great degree one of the most extraordinary, intelligent and gifted men I've ever known. It was my privilege to serve under his command during the Korean War, which was only a sliver of his distinguished career as naval officer, scholar, scientist, and most of all, a warm and caring human being.

Growing up in Oklahoma, John excelled in high school scholastically while taking state honors in tennis and wrestling. He later graduated from the United States Naval Academy, and was serving aboard a destroyer during the attack on Pearl Harbor. He later distinguished himself as a fighter team leader in World War II, in nuclear weapons research in Los Alamos, and as a squadron commander during the Korean War.

Knowing that higher ranks generally meant less (or no) flying, John resigned from active duty as a Commander. But his military days weren't over yet. He then became a consultant to the Department of Defense, dispatched to serve as science advisor to General Abrams during the Vietnam War. True to his nature he was always in the thick of things — although a civilian at the time, he frequently came under fire while flying with helicopter combat crews, serving his country the best he knew how.

John admired and encouraged excellence in others and felt that everyone should try to be the very best in some endeavor, be it sports, art, science, or his firstlove, flying. When he passed away in 1991, I felt there would be no memorial more fitting to this extraordinary patriot than to continue his encouragement of others with the John E. Kirk Aviation Scholarship. In 1993, the John E. Kirk Aviation Scholarship was created to help a Citrus County High School senior with a strong interest in aviation get a head start on their training.
