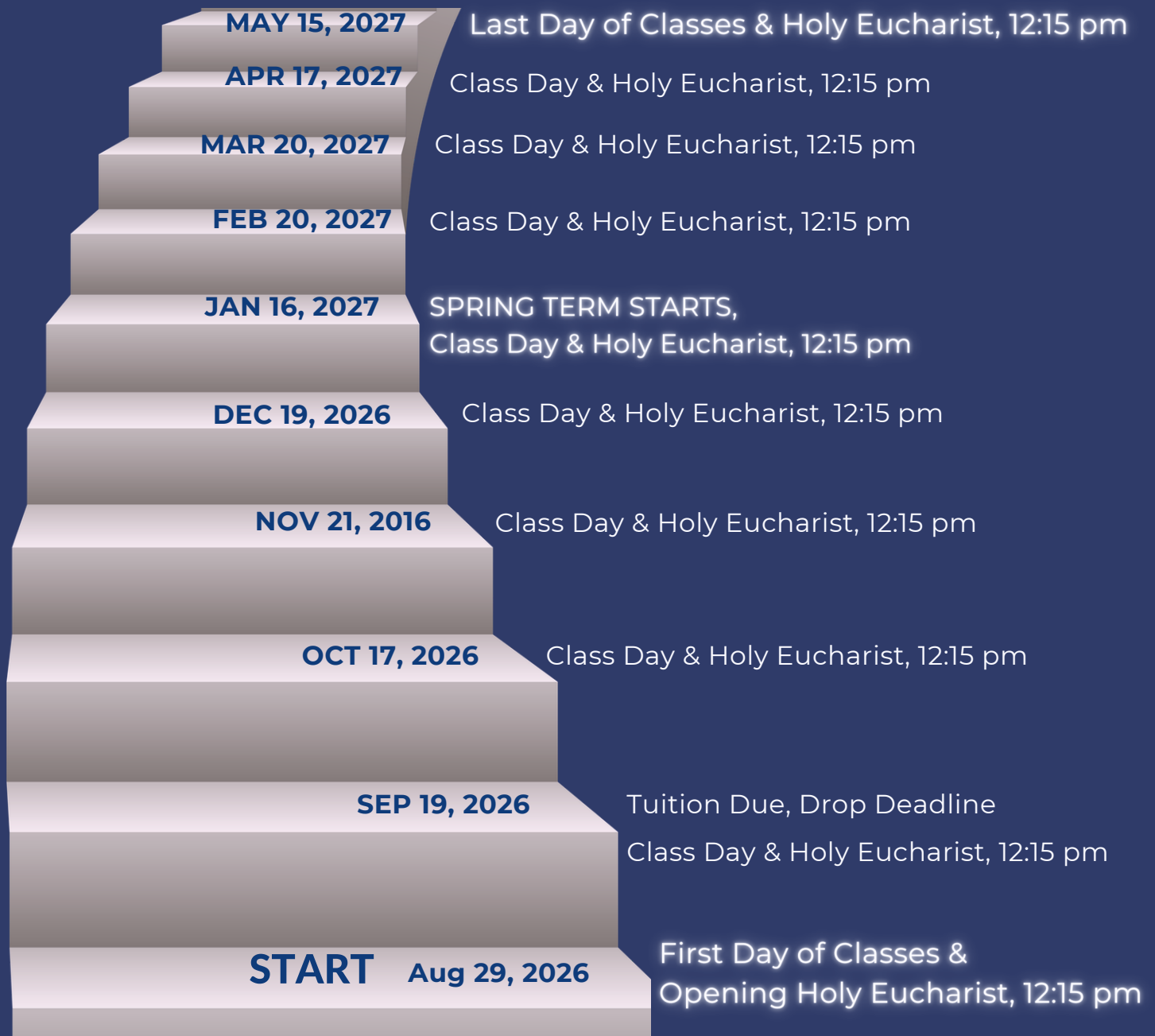

LAY LEADER DIPLOMAS

The Stanton Institute offers three lay diploma programs:

- Diploma in Spiritual Direction (three year program)
- Diploma in Christian Studies (two year program)
- Diploma in Christian Ministry (three year program)
 - Concentration in Evangelism
 - Concentration in Catechesis
 - Concentration in Pastoral Care

Each program includes foundational courses designed to deepen the individual's understanding of Scripture and specialized coursework to equip lay leaders for a particular area of ministry.

These programs meet the educational requirements for licensing by the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas in particular areas of ministry.

The licensing of Lay Ministers will be in accordance with Canon III. 4.1(a) of the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church. Completion of a Diploma does not guarantee licensing.

INSTRUCTOR TO BE ANNOUNCED

ETHICS (Spring Only)

An examination of the classic tradition of Christian moral theology in which the student assesses and evaluates a wide variety of moral questions in contemporary life. The course looks critically at the interaction between our faith and our actions. The perspective is that of the Anglican tradition.

HOMILETICS (Spring Only)

A study of liturgical preaching and homiletic skills. Instruction includes a reflection on the pastoral and liturgical place of the sermon. In addition to classroom homiletical exercises and critiques, students may preach during Stanton Institute services. (To be confirmed during the semester)

FACULTY & COURSE DESCRIPTIONS



The Rev. Mark Hall is Deacon for Pastoral Care at St. Matthew's Cathedral. He was ordained in 2014 and has served at the Cathedral since that time. He

has been a guest instructor in Diaconal Formation at Stanton Institute for many years and is actively involved in the diaconal discernment process in the Diocese, including serving as a member of the Commission on Ministry. In addition to coordinating pastoral care ministries at the Cathedral, Deacon Hall oversees the Cathedral's extensive Food Pantry Ministry, has assisted in Diocesan initiatives to partner with churches and ministries serving South Dallas, and is a member of the Diocese's Multicultural Ministry Commission.

HISTORY, ROLE AND MEANING OF THE DIACONATE

A study of the history and theology of the diaconate, its traditional purposes, and contemporary applications.

SACRAMENTAL LITURGY FOR DEACONS

This course covers the theological and practical role of the deacon in the liturgy. **Prerequisites:** History, Role and Meaning of the Diaconate, approval of class instructor.

THE REV. CANON CARRIE HEADINGTON

Deacon Carrie Boren Headington is the Canon Evangelist for the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, equipping

congregations to live out their call to share the good news of Jesus Christ in word and deed. Rev. Headington speaks nationally and internationally as an evangelist and apologist and is founder of the Good News Initiative. She is also an adjunct professor for evangelism at Fuller Theological Seminary.

EVANGELISM (Spring Only)

This course explores the mission of the church, nature of the Christian Gospel and how it has spread throughout history.

Students will be equipped to share the good news personally in daily life and to engage people's questions of faith in contemporary culture. Students will also be formed in parish evangelism and develop outreach plans for their particular congregational context.

THE REV. JACOB NICHOLS

Fr. Nichols is the Rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Denison. He has served as their Rector since 2024, building on 150 years of the parish's life and witness. Prior to being called to be the rector of St. Luke's, Fr. Nichols served as a curate at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Heath, and as a curate at St. James Episcopal Church in Dallas.

INTRO TO CHRISTIAN MINISTRY & THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER

This course assists the student in discerning a call to both lay and ordained ministry. It will include instruction in the nature and function of various ministry orders. In the second semester, students will develop working knowledge of the Book of Common Prayer.

In retirement she assists St. Peter’s in McKinney. In addition to parish work, Mother Marci is a certified spiritual director and served 11 years as the chaplain for the Palliative Care Program at Baylor University Hospital Dallas, specializing in end-of-life care and hospice. She helped to create the volunteer Doulas for the Dying program at Baylor hospitals. She is the author of *Palliare: Hard Edges and the Holy at the Edge of Life*. Mother Marci grew up in Kentucky, is married and has two adult children and one grandchild. She currently lives in McKinney.

Bishop Michael believes that learning and sharing in a community of learners is vital to growing in faith.

THE REV. KATE E. SMITH

Mother Kate is an Associate Priest at St. Matthew's Cathedral in Dallas and previously served as Associate Priest at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Prosper.

At St. Paul's, she provided spiritual direction and was actively involved in pastoral care, women's ministry, small groups, and youth ministry. Prior to St. Paul's, Rev. Kate was the Fellows Director at Church of the Incarnation in Dallas and previously ministered in Toronto, Canada, where she worked in pastoral care and high school and young adult Christian formation. She also serves as a spiritual director for postulants discerning a call to Holy Orders in the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas.

INTRODUCTION TO SPIRITUAL DIRECTION AS A VOCATION

An introduction to the basic elements of Anglican Spiritual Direction, elements of spiritual formation and the craft of supporting others as they mature in their Christian life. The course will include some lectures, a lot of sharing on the readings and sharing of reflections on readings and practices. Success is dependent on active participation, reading and writing. **Prerequisite:** Life in Christ

FACULTY & COURSE DESCRIPTIONS



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SPIRITUAL DIRECTION PRACTICUM

In year three of the Spiritual Direction program, the student will meet monthly with a peer group for supervision and teaching as the student begins to direct at least two people throughout the year. This two hour session will include review and discussion on ongoing direction as well as continued teaching and instruction in the art of spiritual direction. Students will work with seasoned directors and will continue their own direction as a part of their commitment to transformation. Students will determine their own study path and will be expected to share monthly with the group new insights and practices. **Prerequisites:** Life in Christ and Intro to Spiritual Direction as a Vocation.

THE RT. REV. JAMES M. STANTON

Consecrated the sixth bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas on March 6, 1993, Bishop Stanton's episcopacy

was well-known for his strong advocacy of biblical authority and his success in strengthening mission and evangelism ministries throughout the diocese. The Stanton Institute is honored to once again have the namesake of the school on faculty; a scholar whose life and ministry has reasserted traditional values of Christian faith, order, and morality.

NEW TESTAMENT

An exploration of the content, composition and theological emphases of the Synoptic Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, as well as the Gospel of John. Attention is given to major interpretive approaches and their presuppositions. Also highlighted are the Book of Acts, the letters of Paul, the Pastoral Epistles, Hebrews, and the Book of Revelation, emphasizing their historical context, structure and theological content.

OLD TESTAMENT

An in-depth exploration of the history, faith, and literature of the people of Israel, from the origins of Israel's oral tradition to the time of the Divided Kingdom. The course is also an exploration of the prophetic literature of the Hebrew Scriptures, Wisdom Literature, apocalyptic materials, and the Psalms. Classes focus on Old Testament theology and its application to the Christian faith.

THE REV. CHRISTOPHER STEPHEN

The Rev. Christopher Stephen was born and raised in Karachi, Pakistan. He was ordained as a Deacon in 2005 and to the

Priesthood in 2007 in the Church of Pakistan, Diocese of Karachi. He served at the faculty of St. Thomas Theological College, Karachi, Pakistan, from 2005 to 2013. He is married to Mahvish, and they have two boys, Ethan, 14, and Eliah, 5.

CHURCH HISTORY

An exploration of Christian thought from the institution of the Church through the Reformation to the contemporary schools. The course will emphasize Anglican history and theology in the second semester.

REGISTRATION

Registration is open for the 2026-2027 academic year and continues through August 28, 2026. A \$35 non-refundable registration fee is due with tuition. Confirmations for registration and tuition will be sent to students. Payment is due by the second class session, September 19, 2026. If a payment plan is needed, please contact Haley Dettra directly by email at hdettra@edod.org, or by phone at 214-826-8310 to discuss options.

After August 28, 2026, and by the second class session (September 19, 2026) students may complete late registration or add additional classes. A confirmation for registration and tuition will be sent to the student. A \$35 non-refundable registration fee is due with tuition. Registration fee and tuition are due by the second class session, September 19, 2026. Students are responsible for coordinating make up classwork from the August session directly with their instructors.

CREDIT/AUDIT

Students who are pursuing a diploma, certification, or ordination must take the required courses for credit. Students taking courses for credit must fulfill all requirements for attendance, class participation, study, and any course requirements such as research papers, exams, or field projects and will receive a letter grade for each course.

Students who choose to audit a class must complete the requirements for attendance, reading and class participation. No written assignments are required, and completed courses will be listed as "audit" on the student's transcript.

ATTENDANCE

Students may not miss more than two class sessions in a year-long class, or one class session in a half-year-long class. If a student misses more than the allowable absences, the course instructor and Dean of the Stanton Institute will review the student's eligibility to continue the course and apply a proscribed academic plan for completion if eligibility to continue is granted.

TUITION

Full- year course: \$400 (credit)/\$300 (audit)

Half- year course: \$200 (credit)/\$150 (audit)

Tuition and fees are payable via electronic payment link or check made payable to The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas and mailed to: Haley Dettra, The Stanton Institute, c/o The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, 5100 Ross Ave, Dallas, TX 75206 .

Students must pay tuition in full by the September class session, along with the requisite non-refundable registration fee. Grades/diplomas will not be issued to students who have not met their financial obligation. Students experiencing financial need should contact hdettra@edod.org, or stantoninstitute.org.

DROPPING A COURSE

Students may drop a course through the end of the second class session with no academic penalty. The course will not be entered on the student' s transcript. Course tuition will be refunded if dropped by September 19, 2026.

WITHDRAWAL

Students wishing to withdraw from The Stanton Institute after the second class session will receive a grade of " W." No tuition refund will be given. Students paying in installments must fulfill their full financial obligation to The Stanton Institute.

INDEPENDENT STUDY

Some courses may be taken as an Independent Study. Permission must be given by the Dean and the instructor teaching the course. Reasons for taking a course as an Independent Study will be considered on an individual basis.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

Assignments that are turned in after the assigned date will receive a grade that is one letter grade lower than the earned grade for each month they are late. This policy will apply unless the student has made arrangements with the instructor for an extension due to illness or emergency.

GRADING POLICIES

The Stanton Institute for Theological Education grants letter grades including pluses and minuses for completed courses. There is no D grade given. Anything below a C is considered failing. Letter grades indicate the following levels of achievement.

A: Superior

B: Good

C: Passing

P: Passing, no grade point given.

F: Failure to do minimal work; no credit given

W: Withdrawn from course

INC: Course not completed

Au: Audit; no grade assigned

APPEAL PROCESS FOR A COURSE GRADE

The student who wishes to appeal a course grade should schedule a conference with the instructor to discuss the grade. If the student wishes to appeal a course grade further, an appointment should be made with the Dean.

INCOMPLETE

Students may apply for a course grade of incomplete prior to the final class session by obtaining an Incomplete Grade Contract from the Director. Contracts must be approved by the course instructor and signed by the student, instructor, and Dean. Once an Incomplete Grade Contract is signed, all work must be turned in by the date indicated on the contract. If all work is not received, a grade of "F" will be entered on the student's transcript. Special circumstances which warrant an exception to this policy will be determined only through consultation with the Dean.

PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is defined as intentionally representing the words or ideas of another as one's own in any academic setting. Plagiarism will not be tolerated at The Stanton Institute and may be grounds for failing the course or dismissal from the school as determined by the Dean and course instructor. All students are required to sign a copy of The Stanton Institute Policy on Plagiarism prior to the first class session indicating their understanding and acceptance of the policy.

TRANSFER OF CREDITS

Credit for equivalent coursework from another institution may be given upon the receipt of an official transcript and with the approval of the Dean and appropriate instructor. Students should submit the course outline for the courses they would like to have considered for transfer credit in addition to the official transcript.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

All new students taking classes for credit must schedule an admissions appointment with The Stanton Institute Dean before registering for classes. It is also recommended that each returning student check in with the Director before registering for classes to make sure they are meeting the requirements for their program of study.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Students are responsible for meeting the requirements for a particular program as set forth in The Stanton Institute catalog at the time of their entrance to the school. Students who do not successfully complete any courses during a given academic year are considered "withdrawn" and become subject to the requirements of the catalog for the year of their re- entry.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ORDINATION

In all cases, admission to The Stanton Institute is separate from admission to the application process for ordination. Information regarding the application and discernment process for ordination is available from the Diocesan office, and it is the student's responsibility to obtain this information. Receiving a Licentiate in Diaconal Ministry or a Diploma in Christian Ministry from The Stanton Institute does not in any way guarantee eligibility for ordination. Students seeking ordination are responsible for communicating with the Diocesan office regarding any changes in the requirements for ordination, which may not correspond with the program requirements set forth in the catalog.
