Summer Camp at All Saints is a time for young people and the adults who care about them to grow in their knowledge of and relationship with Christ, through experiencing Christ as they explore his creation and the love he has for all of us shared through new friends made at camp.

Our Mission at All Saints: To provide an environment that secures the physical, emotional, and spiritual safety of all participants, where youth from all backgrounds encounter and grow in a personal relationship with Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior, celebrating the diversity of God's family while appreciating the beauty of His creation.

All Saints takes place on the campgrounds of the Texas Elks Camp on Texoma. All Saints rents the property for our Summer Camp program. Therefore, in addition to the All Saints Waiver, all campers must have a current TECOT Waiver on file before the beginning of camp.

REGISTERING FOR SUMMER CAMP

Children and youth will register for sessions via the FunJoin app.

This is a site designed to work best on cell phones.

\$500 per camper is the cost of a session of camp at All Saints.

Each session begins on a Sunday afternoon and ends the following Saturday morning before lunch.

All Saints is a coed camp, and each session has specific age ranges.

Session 1 - June 7-13 - is for coed campers in grades 3 - 7 (ages 8-12).

Session 2 - June 14-20 - is made up of coed campers in grades 3 - 12 (ages 8-17).

Session 3 (Teen Week) - June 21-27 - is made up of coed campers of rising 8th-12th graders (ages 13-17 years).

HOUSING

All Saints has 6 cabins; 4 are used specifically for campers - 2, 3, 4, and 5.

Cabin 1 houses our volunteers and spiritual leaders.

Cabin 6 houses our summer staff who are not assigned to camper cabins. For example, our lifeguards, our worship leader, our waterfront director, etc. are housed in Cabin 6.

For each session, the following cabin structure is utilized:

Cabins 2 and 3 house girls; cabins 4 and 5 house boys.

Cabins 2 and 5 house the youngest campers; cabins 3 and 4 house the older campers (respective of the week's age range)

Each cabin has an A and B side.

Each side contains a camper room with 6 bunk beds (12 camper beds) and 3 chests of drawers with 6 drawers for camper use. Campers have their own shower/restroom area with 3 toilet stalls, 3 showers, and a vanity with 4 sinks.

Counselors assigned to this group of girls/boys have their own separate suite with 2 twin beds and their own private shower/restroom area. **CAMPERS AND COUNSELORS DO NOT SHARE SHOWER, RESTROOM, OR CHANGING AREAS.**

Each cabin (A/B) has a front porch area with a picnic table.

Each cabin has a "common space" used for small group activities when programming isn't going on.

Snacks are not allowed in the cabin areas and will be kept in designated tubs in the "common room."

Session 1 - June 7-13 - is for coed campers in grades 3 - 7 (ages 8-12).

During this session, cabins 2 and 5 and possibly cabins 3 and 4 will be utilized - depending on registration numbers. Cabins 3 and 4 are only used if the number of campers registered indicates the need for that additional space.

Session 2 - June 14-20 - is made up of coed campers in grades 3 - 12 (ages 8-17).

During this session, all camper cabins will be utilized.

Session 3 (Teen Week) - June 21-27 - is made up of coed campers of rising 8th-12th graders (ages 13-17 years).

During this session, cabins 2 and 5 and possibly cabins 3 and 4 will be utilized - depending on registration numbers.

How are cabin assignments made?

The camp management takes responsibility for the assignment of campers to their cabins. We will try to honor up to one request for a bunkmate of the same age, gender, and grade range (i.e. elementary, junior high, senior high) when indicated on the registration form.

If your camper has a cabin mate request, please complete the 2026 Cabin Mate Request form in FunJoin.

IMPORTANT HEALTH INFORMATION

Camper Health History (HW.1)

Our highest priority is your child's health, safety, and well-being. You must read this information and follow all policies. Failure to follow policies or submit information could impact your child's care. At the point of registration, parents/guardians are required to complete the following forms in FunJoin. This is to ensure All Saints Summer Camp has a comprehensive health and wellness picture of each camper. This includes physical, medical, social/emotional, dietary, and allergies.

1. Camper Immunization Record
2. Camper Information Form
3. Camper Dietary Restrictions
4. Camper Medical Information, which includes camper Allergy information – environmental and ingested
 - a. Current OTC and RX medications
 - b. Any current injuries that might affect camper participation
 - c. Any chronic health conditions: physical or social/emotional
 - d. Any camp activities that the camper should be exempt from.

If you foresee an issue completing forms June 1, please email cassummercampdirector@gmail.com as soon as possible.

If your child had a medical need or situation in prior summers that are no longer a concern, please update their CAMPER MEDICAL HISTORY FORM accordingly so our medical staff knows it is no longer a relevant issue.

Our medical staff does not use the same form from year to year. Please include all information, and do not assume our medical staff will remember information from prior summers.

Please advise the camp of any contact with a contagious disease after June 1 or any fevers within the week leading up to camp.

Vitamins, Supplements, & Medications at Camp

All Saints takes great care in assuring the safety of our campers and staff. Along these lines, we take the following steps to ensure all medications - RX and OTC - are kept under lock and key and distributed in the following manner.

- All medications are received by the All Saints Summer Camp nurse at camper check-in. All medications per camper are kept in individual baggies labeled with the camper's name and cabin assignment.
- All prescription medications must be in the original prescription bottle with the camper's name, date of RX, and dosage. Prescription medications not provided in this manner will not be administered, and the parent/guardian will be asked to provide us with the medication's original packaging with this information.
- OTC medications will be administered according to label dosage unless otherwise specified by the parent/legal guardian in writing.
- All medications are stored in the designated locked room of the Health Lodge, and only accessible to the Summer Camp nurse and designated medical assistants.
- All medications at camp are dispensed at meal times or before bedtime as prescribed on the original prescription bottle/container.
- Medications will only be dispensed at a different time of day if medically necessary. These might include inhalers or EPI-Pens, and a specific time is written on the prescription. If you foresee an EpiPen or inhaler needing to stay with your camper, please send two so that one can stay in the Health Center and one can stay with your camper.
- Please plan to inform the camp nurse at the time of check-in of any anticipated changes.
- In the event of illness or injury, our Health Lodge is stocked with common OTC medications such as topical antibiotics, pain relievers, upset stomach meds, and antihistamines.
- The Camper Information Form requires your consent for our nurse to administer any of these OTC medications.

A note regarding medication at camp: Any medication that has been working for your child, particularly involving ADD or ADHD, should continue at the same dosage and frequency during the camp season. While camp is more active than school, it does not require less attention or impulse control. Campers are living in a shared environment and keeping to a camp schedule. We, along with the American Academy of Pediatrics, recommend

that kids who take medication to support their school success continue with this medication while at camp. The only exceptions are a rescue inhaler and/or EpiPen if they are prescribed.

Summer Camp Health Care Center

At All Saints, we have a wonderful healthcare center for campers, staff, and volunteers. We call it the HEALTH LODGE. The Health Lodge is located just to the east of the chapel and at the top of the cabin circle. It is well placed centrally for all camping activities, with the exception of the high ropes course, which is at the edge of the campus. But a golf cart can easily get to that site quickly if needed.

The Health Lodge is equipped with:

1. Lodging quarters for our Summer Camp Nurse to reside in during camp, so they are present on-site 24/7 during summer camp.
2. A restroom for Health Lodge patients;
3. 2 private patient rooms with beds, sinks, and storage space;
4. A refrigerator for Health Lodge and summer staff limited use. It is not for camper use.
5. Washer/dryer for both Health Lodge and camper emergency needs;
6. A locked closet for medication storage. All medications received by the camp nurse at check-in are stored in this locked room.

Health Center Visits at Camp

All Health Center visits are treated by our Summer Camp Nurse.

When our nurse determines that a child should see the doctor, needs to be seen at a local Urgent Care Clinic, or needs a prescription, the nurse contacts our All Saints Summer Camp On-Call Physician.

We will call you under the following circumstances:

- The Nurse determines your child should stay overnight in our Health Lodge;
- If our doctor prescribes a written prescription medication;
- Before your child sees any outside medical professional;
- We will not call you about minor issues (bruises, scrapes, fatigue, and the like) unless
 - it involves the camper's face, nor will we call you if your child is seen by the camp nurse for normal camp ailments (sore throat or negative strep test, stomachache, etc.) or a routine follow-up visit.

Dealing with homesickness

Parents who are worried about their camper having a successful week at camp may wish to consider several strategies to help their camper succeed. These might include strategies such as pre-packing some self-addressed, stamped letters for home. Sending your camper to camp with a favorite book. Plan several “short” overnight experiences with friends before coming to camp. See if there is a friend who can attend camp with them.

These are just a few ideas to help your camper succeed. Please do not promise your camper they can come home early if they are still homesick later in the week. Often this becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy.

Our Summer Camp staff are well prepared for camper homesickness.

Staff are trained on how to be compassionate with homesick campers, and leadership staff are made aware of campers experiencing homesickness so they can add extra support to campers and staff.

It is not our policy at ALL SAINTS that campers experiencing homesickness can call home. This often exacerbates the situation. If a camper seems to be really struggling and our efforts are not proving fruitful, the camp nurse, Assistant Director, or Director will call the parents/guardians to discuss the situation.

Allergies

- Campers with severe allergies should bring a EpiPen and should be instructed in its use. It is of the utmost importance that any severe allergies are clearly noted on the CAMPER MEDICAL INFORMATION form.
- If your camper has a severe allergy condition, All Saints requests that you have your child’s physician provide an Allergy Action plan.
- If applicable, we encourage you to send two EpiPens so that one can stay in the Health Lodge and one can stay with your camper.
- Glasses and Contacts: Please send a second pair of glasses or contacts for those who are dependent on them.

Immunizations

All Saints complies with state vaccine recommendations for Texas Youth camps to follow state vaccine recommendations and require immunization records.

- Key Recommended/Required Immunizations
 - [Measles, Mumps, & Rubella \(MMR\)](#): Crucial for camp environments, with two doses recommended to prevent measles outbreaks.

- [Tetanus](#) (Tdap/Td): A booster is strongly recommended (often within the last 10 years), particularly for outdoor activities.
- [Varicella](#) (Chickenpox): Required by most camps.
- [DTaP/Tdap](#): Diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis.
- [Polio](#) (IPV).
- [Hepatitis B & A](#).
- [Meningococcal](#) (MCV4): Frequently required for teenagers and overnight camps.

Insurance

- All normal in-camp medical needs for your child are covered by the camp. If, however, a special medication is needed for your child, we will have the prescription filled at the local pharmacy using the insurance information you have provided.
- In the event outside medical attention is required, we will expect you or your insurance to pay the bills. We will provide whatever information is needed by your insurance company to verify medical care.

PARENT NOTIFICATION (HW. 8)

Parents will be notified immediately (upon stabilization) in the case of camper's serious medical injury or illness; those injuries that cannot be managed by Summer Camp medical professionals and may require a higher level of care.

Any injury that does not require a higher level of care, but can be managed and treated by the Summer Camp Nurse, will be documented in the camper's medical chart on FunJoin.

Parents will be notified if there is a question about the level of care needed due to injury or illness.

Parents may be contacted to obtain additional information if campers experience an episode or event that is out of the scope of what has been reported at the time of registration and Summer Camp check-in.

If a camper requires non-emergency transportation to a health care facility, the parent will be contacted to explain the situation and determine who should transport the camper – the parent or the Summer Camp Nurse/Asst Director/Director.

If a camper requires emergency medical care, the parent will be notified as soon as possible once the camper is stabilized or is on their way to urgent health care via emergency transportation.

MISC MEDICAL ISSUES:

- Before Departing for Camp:
- Check for head lice
- Take care of podiatric work if necessary: ingrown toenails, plantar warts, etc.
- Please notify us if your child has had a fever the week before departing for camp
- or comes in contact with a contagious disease after June 1.
- If applicable, go over with your son/daughter what medications they take, what they look like, at what time of day they are taken, and for what purpose.

POLICIES:

Valuables at Camp

All Saints is not responsible for personal property brought to camp by campers. This includes electronics of any kind, sports equipment, music instruments, etc...Therefore, we encourage campers to leave their personal belongings at home.

****Because music is such a valued part of our camp culture, we invite campers to bring musical instruments to camp with the intent of being a part of this culture and offering their gifts to God. For safety, these can be stored in the Church office when not in use. They will need to be specifically checked in with our Music Director at the time of check-in.**

Electronics

A note to parents about cell phones: Cell phones are not permitted at camp.

Camp is a time for our children and youth to “unplug” and “disconnect” from the surrounding culture that drags them down. Camp is where our campers learn to connect with God and each other in real relationships, which can only happen face-to-face. Camp is a gift from God to learn how to reconnect with others without using “screens.” The restriction on screens is also to help our campers and staff relax and disconnect from the stress and anxieties our cell phones create.

When is it OK to have a cell phone?

It is not OK for campers to have cell phones. All parents will have access to the Summer Camp Director, Asst Director, and camp nurse at all times. Should parents need to communicate with their campers, they will go through these channels.

ALL ELECTRONICS ARE PROHIBITED AT SUMMER CAMP.

Setting your camper up to fail: If you permit your camper to keep their phone, you are setting your camper up to be in conflict with the camp. Specifically, the cabin counselor, other campers (who do not have their cell phones), and the directors of the camp. Since cell phones are very expensive, the camp will NOT take any responsibility for broken, damaged, lost, or stolen phones, even if our office is holding them for you.

Please take your camper's phone home with you. Cell phones or other electronics found with campers will be taken away, and the Director will notify the parent of this action and then keep the item until the camper is picked up at the end of camp. If you have any questions about cell phones, I would be happy to visit with you and your camper(s) prior to your leaving.

PROGRAMMING:

Activities at Camp

What are the main activities at camp?

Exploring and experiencing the Christian faith has been the central theme at Camp All Saints since 2004. Each program week, clergy work with the camp theme, tying the program to the central event of Holy Eucharist at our beautiful chapel. Campers enjoy an assortment of outdoor recreation activities, including swimming, kayaking, fishing, archery, hiking, and our 660+ acres along the shores of Lake Texoma.

Many of the games teach life skills and teamwork. Arts, crafts, songs, low and high ropes courses (age-appropriate), music, and skits allow for creative expression. All of our programs are age-appropriate and led by qualified staff.

Campers have the opportunity to participate in a wide variety of sports, waterfront, and hobby activities while at camp. You can view a full list of activities on our website. Please note on the online Camper Profile Form if there is any reason why your child may not participate in a specific activity. Almost all activities fall under our regular programming, and you do not need to sign up or make selections in advance. Campers will participate in each activity, and on specially designated days, "Camper's Choice", they can choose what activities they would like to participate in.

Activities that young people will enjoy while at Summer Camp include:

- archery
- arts and crafts
- campfires
- daily chapel and Bible study
- dance and cheer
- fishing
- hiking
- low and high ropes courses
- making new, lifelong friends
- swimming

All programming at All Saints takes place on our campgrounds. There will be no occasion for your camper to leave the grounds except in the case of a medical emergency or an all-camp evacuation.

Birthdays

If a camper's birthday falls during the camp season, we will make sure it is special. During dinner on their birthday, they will receive a cake with candles, and the entire dining hall will sing "Happy Birthday" to them. If a parent would like to make a special call to them on their birthday or even make a visit, that can be arranged. At the time of check, if parents want to drop off something for your camper to receive on their birthday, those items will be left with the Summer Camp Director and delivered to your camper as requested.

SAFETY:

Supervision: (ST.35.1-4)

All Saints maintains an overall minimum supervision ratio of 1:6 (2 cabin counselors to no more than 12 campers), regardless of age and gender. In activity areas, 2 counselors plus 1 activity staff meet this requirement for an adequate ratio. Ideally, all Cabin Counselors are 18 or older. There are some limited occasions when a Cabin Counselor has graduated from high school, but not yet turned 18. All Cabin Counselors are high school graduates. All Saints employees, Jr. Counselors who are at least 15 years of age and have completed the 10th grade (their sophomore year) of high school. Every effort is made to assign counselors to campers where there is at least a 2-year age difference.

Cabin counselors sleep in the cabin with their assigned campers. They have separate sleeping quarters and restrooms – never to be shared with campers. Jr. Counselors do not sleep in camper cabins unless under extreme circumstances. All Saints makes every effort to keep minors and adults apart.

Summer Camp staff or volunteers are never alone with a camper – the Rule of 3 is always to be followed. It is advised that there always be two staff members with a camper; sometimes, a staff member must use a second camper as a buddy in order to leave the larger group supervised.

The Rule of 3 applies to all camper/counselor activities. This includes visits to the Health Lodge, transportation around camp in the case of an injured camper, and transportation off-site in the case of an ill or injured camper.

FA.13.1

All program areas are off limits to campers unless being used specifically for programming, and then campers will be supervised by All Saints Summer Camp staff and/or TECOT staff.

The following activities at All Saints Summer Camp are **facilitated by TECOT staff**.

- Archery
- Fishing
- Orienteering
- Low Ropes
- High Ropes

Thus, All Saints seasonal summer staff will be present for these activities, but are considered support during these activities.

The following activities around All Saints Summer Camp are **facilitated by All Saints seasonal summer camp staff**. Program staff will plan and run these events. Some counselor assistance will be required, depending on the event.

- Weekly campfire
- All campwide evening programming
- Arts and Crafts
- Swimming
- Indoor games
- Hiking
- Biking
- Bracelet Making
- Camp Store

Communicating with non-parent inquirers.

At times, non-parent or non-custodial family members or friends may contact All Saints to check in on a particular camper or seek other information about a camper. It is the practice of All Saints that only the parents/guardians listed in the camper's registration form are eligible to receive information about said camper(s). Parents will have the opportunity to designate whether other family members may receive information about their camper(s).

ORIENTATION:

AD.19.1

Safety Orientation and Emergency Plan

During pre-camp Parent Zoom meetings and on the first day of camp, Safety Orientation will be conducted to cover:

- Identifying boundaries for living areas - the cabin circle, camper cabins, the Health Lodge, and other buildings used during camp; and general activity areas - the cabin circle, Activity field, and other buildings used during camp;
- Expectations of appropriate/expected behavior while at camp;
- Precautions concerning natural or physical hazards at camp - closed toed shoes are required due to natural critters such as snakes and spiders, bug spray/repellant is needed for flies, bees, mosquitos, wasps, etc; sunscreen is needed to prevent sunburn; water bottles to prevent against dehydration; and counselors are equipped with first aid kits and are certified in First Aid/CPR/AED;
- Emergency Response plans in case of foreseeable emergencies;
- Missing camper drills
- What to do in case of fire on site
- What to do in case of inclement weather
- What to do in case of an unidentified person identified or found on the campgrounds
- What to do in case of active threats

Before each summer camp season, safety and security inspections are conducted around the campgrounds in conjunction with the TECOT and property owners, to ensure the Emergency Action Plans in place are appropriate for Summer Camp. Date of inspection for the 2026 camping season: March 6, 2026.

After check-in and prior to the beginning of any programming except the Safety Swim, all campers will attend a Summer Camp Orientation Session.

At this session, they will:

- Meet all the staff and volunteers on site for the week;
- Learn how to keep themselves safe during the week: listening to their counselors, drinking plenty of water, wearing the appropriate clothing (and shoes), wearing sun screen and bug spray, staying on the designated paths when hiking through the woods, the Rule of 3's, items prohibited at camp and the protocol if contraband is found, there is no tolerance for bullying or any maltreatment of co-campers, staff, and volunteers.
- Learn the following safety procedures: missing camper drill, injury protocol, transportation protocol,

AD.16.1

Following the commitment All Saints has to be a safe place for our campers, the following items are PROHIBITED from Summer Camp:

1. Drugs, alcohol, and vape pens - a copy of our Drug/Alcohol Policy is available upon request. This policy is signed by ALL Summer Camp staff (EDOD) and volunteers.
2. Pets - the only animals on the campus are the wild ones in the woods or the animals owned by the TECOT for educational purposes.
3. Weapons of any kind; this applies to some tools that can be used as weapons. i.e. box cutters or hammers.

AD.8.1 Transportation Orientation

Accident and TRANSPORTATION SAFETY PROCEDURES (AD.7)

If campers or staff have to be transported due to accident or illness, they will be transported by the Summer Camp Nurse, Summer Camp Asst Dir, or Summer Camp Director in their respective vehicles. To ensure the Rule of 3, another staff person will accompany this transport. The 3rd adult (staff person or volunteer) will supervise the injured/ill during transport.

The nurse will have provided the transporting staff with the camper's/staff's emergency information.

Before transporting a camper, their parent will be contacted to determine if they are able to transport the injured/ill camper (if time allows) or if they prefer the camp staff to provide the transportation.

Campers, if being transported by camp staff (specified above) will follow the rules set out above.

During any transports involving campers or staff, the following guidelines will be adhered to:

1. There will be no more passengers than the vehicle is equipped for – that seat belts will accommodate.
2. All passengers will wear vehicle-installed seat belts.
3. All passengers will remain seated during the transportation.

For camper or ill staff transportation, the Summer Camp nurse and Asst Director will know the vehicle occupants.

OPENING DAY

When should I arrive for camp?

Full week Youth sessions open on Sunday with check-in from 3:00 - 5:00 p.m. All campers should plan to arrive by 3:00 p.m. and allow some time to go through the

Registration process. When campers arrive, staff will guide vehicles to parking areas & help campers move to Beck Center, where we will check campers in. At registration, we confirm the following:

All balances of fees are paid in full;

The Health History Form is completed in full;

The Texas Elks Waiver completed in full;

The All Saints/EDOD Waiver is completed in full;

The Camp Nurse receives camper medications (all prescriptions and over-the-counter medications must be in their original container); and

The Camp Nurse will conduct a brief Health Care Screening (including lice check) before admitting a camper to camp.

When does camp begin?

Once campers have moved through the registration process in the Beck Center, they move to their cabin and meet their counselor. The expectation is that cabin groups will be assembled no later than 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. After cabin groups are assembled, cabins will have “orientation meetings” to go over safety protocols, safety drills, introductions to all the staff and volunteers that will be on-site for the week, and under what circumstances campers will be sent home.

After these meetings, counselors begin moving their cabin group to different parts of the camp with their campers to continue orientation. To have a successful week, campers need to become familiar with the camp and learn what opportunities there are for the week. Because cabins move as a group and must visit a variety of areas before dinner, the cabin group will begin on time. Late arrivals will be connected to their cabin group & we will do our best to help a camper catch up on what they have missed. For this reason, we recommend planning on arriving early (much like you would for the airport) to ensure a smooth check-in.

Health care screening

Our Camp Health Care Officer is responsible for checking campers' health before admitting them to camp.

It is important to us that campers arrive healthy and do not pose a risk to themselves or others while they are at camp. Campers who arrive with any medical condition, deemed by the camp nurse as a health issue placing the camper or others in the camp community at risk, will not be checked into camp.

Parents and guardians should plan to stay with their child(ren) until they connect with their counselor. Emergency contacts need to be verified and available.

When does camp end?

Can campers spend the night between sessions?

Camp closes on Saturdays after Eucharist.

All families are invited to this special service that begins at 10:00 a.m. All campers should be picked up no later than 11:30 a.m. The Camp Director must approve any deviation from the checkout schedule well in advance. *Requests for or notification of campers needing early release must be submitted to the Summer Camp Director in writing before the start of that camper's registered session.*

When the program is concluded, campers will need to check out with our staff prior to departure. Specifically, the camp needs a record of when the camper has left and who has picked them up. We ask for this information at camper check-in, and we need to verify who we are releasing a camper to before letting them go. Please make sure the party picking up the camper has proper photo ID. They will be required to show proof of identification.

Campers who have medications will need to check out with the Camp Health Care Officer.

Remaining campers will be able to check out with their counselors, who will have a sign out clip board for each camper group.

Adherence to this schedule enables the camp staff to plan an orderly conclusion to your child's session.

Can campers stay overnight between sessions?

No.

Summer Camp Store

All Saints operates a camp store during each session that campers can shop in. The Camp Store has snacks, non-carbonated drinks, and souvenirs. Campers have the ability throughout the week to shop at the camp store. What we recommend is that during the check-in process, parents deposit money into their camper's store account. That way, campers don't have to keep up with money during the week, which can be very risky. If there is a balance due at the end of camp, that will be included in your camper's discharge paperwork. If your camper spent more than you deposited, you will be notified of the outstanding balance. This is not a practice we enjoy, and we try our best not to allow your camper to spend more than they have in their account.

Is there a need for spending money?

We'd rather they not! Any money the camper has on them during the week, it is their responsibility and All Saints cannot guarantee its security

- From HWY 75 (also known as Central Expressway)
- Take the Hwy 82 Exit and go west toward Pottsboro
- Take the 289 Exit and turn right or North onto Hwy 289
- Follow Hwy 289 to the blinking light and 4-way STOP· coming from East and West directions, and turn left or West onto

Hwy 120W

- Remain on HWY 120W for 5.5 miles; this road turns into Cooks Corner Road.
- Turn left onto Locust Road and continue 2.2 miles
- (There is an All Saints WHITE and BLUE sign at this turn)
- At the only STOP SIGN, turn right on Mill Creek Road
- (Note the small grocery/gas station in front of you)
