DAY ONE

PRAY: Ask the Lord to guide your study this week as you commit to pursuing Biblical resolve in your daily life.

MEMORIZE: 2 Thessalonians 1:11a: *“To this end we always pray for you, that our God may make you worthy of His calling.”*

Please write 2 Thessalonians 1:11a on a notecard and place it in a spot where you will be reminded to review it.

Please repeat it several times, emphasizing a different word each time.

STUDY: Throughout this study we will consider the concept of making annual resolutions from a Biblical perspective. Our goal is to look for the ways that Biblical resolve differs from the cultural idea of a New Year's Resolution. During this study we will define resolve as a God-imparted resolution to do good or a gracious purpose with a good object in view. This week we will learn that these God given desires for a good outcome can only be accomplished as works of faith through the power of God believing the promises of God. This week let's consider how it would change our perspective to move from making resolutions to having Biblical resolve. Please read 2 Thessalonians 1:11-12.

1. *Briefly explain your thoughts about “making resolutions”. Do you continue with your resolutions or give them up? Do you find them helpful or discouraging?

2. *As you read these verses, how would you summarize the ways that Paul is praying for the Thessalonian believers?

3. These verses contain several important concepts to encourage our growth in Christ. Which word or phrase is most challenging to you at this time? Why did you choose it?

4. Read the following passages. How could these verses encourage you to think about resolutions from a Biblical perspective?

STUDY: These verses list several ways that Paul is always praying for the believers in Thessalonica. One of the things he asks the Lord for is that they be worthy of their calling. The idea of being worthy is an important one in the first chapter of 2 Thessalonians. It means “to match up” or “live up to”. As followers of Jesus Christ, in God’s eyes we are worthy of the kingdom of God (2 Thess 1:5), but while we are still living on this earth we are called to grow by living in a way that matches up to how God sees us. The ultimate purpose of any Biblical resolve is to enable us to walk worthy of the Lord’s calling in our lives. Please read 2 Thessalonians 1:11-12 & Colossians 1:9-11.

1. What do you learn from these two prayers of Paul on behalf of Christians?

2. One of the things he prays is that Christians would walk worthy of or live up to their calling in the Lord. What does this teach you about the importance of prayer in our lives?

3. From Colossians 1:9, what is needed to help us walk in a way that is worthy of the Lord?

4. According to Colossians 1:10-11, what are the outcomes of living in this way?

5. *Of the qualities listed in Colossians 1:10-11, which one do you feel is most needed in your life as you desire to walk worthy of what the Lord is calling you to? How could this help you live up to His calling in your life?

STUDY: Yesterday we studied the idea of living in ways that are worthy of God's call in our lives. As we learn about Biblical resolve, we will understand that this is not something we do in our own strength. In our study today, we will look at the role of faith and God's power in our Biblical resolve. In 2 Thessalonians 1:11, Paul prays that the Lord would fulfill their good intentions and that through His power, their good works would be inspired by faith. This means that every resolve should be an overflow of what Jesus Christ has done for us. Through the lens of faith in God's power, we will also consider the role of our will in Biblical resolve. In his 2015 New Year's sermon, John Piper said, "The power of God engages itself beneath or behind and within our will, not in place of our will." This means that God's power in our lives is revealed in the strength of our will, not in the absence of our will. Please read 2 Thessalonians 1:11 & Philippians 2:12-13.

As we will see in this passage, we should be characterized by "radical freedom from earthly things and earthly security, with a joyful pursuit of God and his righteousness as our treasure." Please read Matthew 6:19-34.
