FLIGHT OVERVIEW

Jacob Takes Esau's Blessing - Genesis 27

FLIGHT OVERVIEW

Joseph Sold Into Slavery - Genesis 37:12-36

FLIGHT OVERVIEW

In Genesis 37:12-36, our story of Joseph picks up where we left off last week. Jacob asked his son Joseph to go check on his brothers who were watching over their sheep. While Joseph was checking on his brothers, they came up with a plan to get rid of him. They threw Joseph in a well with no water. When the brothers saw some Ishmaelite people who were on their way to Egypt, they sold Joseph to them. Joseph's brothers didn't want to get in trouble, so they lied to their dad, Jacob, saying Joseph had been killed by an animal. Jacob was brokenhearted and mourned for Joseph. Meanwhile, Joseph was sold to one of Pharaoh's officials, Potiphar. This situation seemed awful; however, God was using it for His good. We can trust in God at all times, not just when things are going well, but also when things are difficult and we don't understand the plan.

FLIGHT OVERVIEW

While in Potiphar's house, Joseph was tempted to sin against God with Potiphar's wife. He was faithfully obedient to God as he refused to sin against Him. Joseph was falsely accused by Potiphar's wife. Even though Joseph was completely innocent, he was thrown into prison by Potiphar. Joseph was not alone as God never left him.

Joseph in Prison - Genesis 39:21-40:23

FLIGHT OVERVIEW

In Genesis 39:21-40:23, we read about what happened after Joseph had been falsely accused and thrown into prison. However, Joseph was not alone, God was with him. God blessed Joseph while in prison through Joseph being put in charge of the prison by the warden. Joseph continued to trust in the promise God made to him early in his life that Joseph would eventually be prosperous. The evidence of Joseph's trust in God was seen when he continued to interpret dreams for the Pharaoh's cupbearer and baker. Both the baker and cupbearer had been thrown into prison as well when Pharaoh became upset with them. After God helped Joseph to interpret the dreams, indeed, everything Joseph said would happen did. Even while Joseph was in prison, he had faith in God and waited upon Him.

Pharaoh's Dreams - Genesis 41:1-40

FLIGHT OVERVIEW

In Genesis 41:1-40, Joseph was still in prison. God allowed Pharaoh to have dreams that God used to bring Joseph out of prison and into the palace. These dreams greatly upset Pharaoh, and he was unable to find anyone in Egypt to tell him what they meant. Then the cupbearer remembered Joseph in prison who had interpreted dreams for him. Joseph was brought before Pharaoh to interpret the dreams through God's help. God told Joseph that the dreams predicted 7 years of a great harvest followed by 7 years of famine. Joseph said a wise man would need to be in charge of managing the harvest so Egypt would be prepared for the famine. Pharaoh was so pleased with Joseph that he put him in charge of managing all of this. Joseph was made the third most powerful person in all of Egypt. Joseph trusted that God reigned over all and would keep His promises.

First Journey to Egypt - Genesis 42

FLIGHT OVERVIEW

After the seven years of plenty, the famine came. Jacob sent 10 of his sons to Egypt to buy food because he heard they had supplies. Jacob didn't want to send Benjamin in order to keep him safe. Joseph recognized his brothers when they arrived and saw the dreams from God start to be fulfilled when they bowed down before him. Joseph accused them of being spies and had them put in prison for three days until they would bring Benjamin back with them. Joseph kept Simeon and sent the rest back to retrieve Benjamin. This was a test to see if they were the honest men they claimed to be. When they returned home, Jacob was crushed to hear Simeon had been taken and Benjamin would have to make the next trip. Jacob couldn't bear to lose his youngest son, so he told the other sons it wouldn't be possible for Benjamin to go to Egypt. Jacob and the rest of his sons were sad and didn't realize what God was doing at this time. God was working all things out to protect His people for His glory.

They asked for the thief who had stolen the cup. The brothers were so sure they hadn't taken anything that they said if the cup was found, that brother could be killed and the rest would become slaves. When the cup was found in Benjamin's bag, Joseph's brothers showed true compassion and grief. When they were brought before Joseph, they were grieved and admitted all the past sin they had kept hidden that God had brought to light. Judah showed true repentance when he was willing to take Benjamin's place.
