VICAR'S VOICE

Happy and Blessed Summer Greetings to you all!

As we enter into July, we find ourselves busy with our children's activities, our activities, and/or other events that summer brings. It really is a busy yet joyful time. SC SYNOD ASSEMBLY

The South Carolina Synod held its annual assembly at the Marriot in downtown Columbia June 8-10. This was the 198th annual gathering of the Lutheran Church in South Carolina! Lay voting members from each ELCA congregation as well as Pastors and Deacons on the synod's roster were invited to join in this year's assembly. The theme was "I See Jesus" and attendees heard about various places where God is at work within our own Synod and beyond. There were four lenses through which we considered the theme—I See Jesus: in unexpected places, in those that look, talk, act, and believe differently than I, in our spaces, and in our community.

The assembly also voted to enact a resolution committing our congregations and synod to an intentional one-year study process of Scripture in order to address social, cultural, and scriptural issues that threaten to divide us. The goal will be to work toward understanding and unity wherever it is possible to do so. The Office of the Bishop will provide materials to guide this process, which should begin some time this fall.

Voting members from Good Shepherd were: Pastor Andrew Isenhower, Jan Haigler, David Lucas, and Karen Lucas. In addition, Raymond Hendrix, the synod treasurer, and Deacons Jim Johnson and Barbara Rowell were voting members. Julie Hendrix and Vicar Laura Henrickson were visitors to the assembly. SOCIAL MINISTRY MONTHLY EMPHASIS



The South Carolina Synod, ELCA has been supporting a group of orphans from the South Western Diocese, ELCT by paying their school fees. There are ten who have been attending Itamba Secondary school for years. Last summer, six of these students graduated from their general education coursework. These students did very well with their studies and scored in the upper half of the nation on their national exams. NOISY OFFERING – SARAH'S WHEELCHAIR



Our global mission team met Sarah in 2012 when she was brought to the clinic for medical help. She had been unable to walk since birth. Efforts to get her to the city for evaluations did not work. We were able to find her a wheel chair tricycle to help her get to school. Until she received the wheelchair her grandmother would carry her to school. At that time, Sarah was 12 years old and almost as big as her grandmother. The walk to school was over 1 mile.



In 2018 the mission team visited Sarah's village. We had the opportunity to visit with Sarah. We couldn't help but notice that her wheelchair had seen better days; after all she uses it continually. The guys on the team tuned the wheelchair up the best they could. It was usable but needed a new seat, peddles etc. Unfortunately, there are no places nearby to get these items to make the repairs.

Hearing this story in Sunday School, the children at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church want to raise the funds for a new wheelchair for Sarah. This month's noisy offering will be for this wheelchair. Please help them raise enough funds to purchase a new wheelchair for Sarah.

Philipp attended worship regularly at Good Shepherd, participated in YOGS and sang in the choir.

Rosemarie, a German native, met her future husband Arthur when he was serving in the U.S. Army in Germany just after the end of World War II. 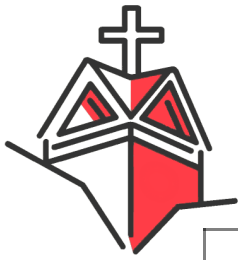

LECTIONARY FOR JULY 2023

July 2 – 5th Sunday After Pentecost

The welcome of baptism is for all God's children. This baptismal gift sets us free from the power of sin and death. In today's gospel, Christ promises that the disciple who gives a cup of cold water to the little ones serves Christ himself. From worship we are sent on our baptismal mission: to serve the little ones of this world and to be a sign of God's merciful welcome.

First Reading – Jeremiah 28:5-9

Through a symbolic action Jeremiah insisted that Judah and all the surrounding nations should submit to the king of Babylon (Jer. 27). Hananiah contradicted the word of Jeremiah, who in reply insisted that Hananiah's rosy prediction should not be believed until it came true. God confirmed the word of Jeremiah and sentenced the false prophet Hananiah to death (vv. 16-17).

Psalm – Psalm 89:1-4, 15-18

Your love, O LORD, forever will I sing. (Ps. 89:1)

Second Reading – Romans 6:12-23

Sin is an enslaving power which motivates us to live self-serving, disobedient lives. Sin's final payoff is death. We, however, have been set free from sin's slavery to live obediently under God's grace, whose end is the free gift of eternal life.

Gospel – Matthew 10:40-42

When Jesus sends his disciples out as missionaries, he warns them of persecution and hardships they will face. He also promises to reward any who aid his followers and support their ministry.

July 9 – 6th Sunday After Pentecost

The mystery of God's ways is sometimes hidden from the wise and intelligent. Jesus associates with those often excluded from the religious community. Like Paul, we struggle with our own selfish desires and seek God's mercy and forgiveness. We gather to be refreshed by Christ's invitation: "Come to me, all you that are weary." Gathered around word, water, and meal, we find rest for our souls.

First Reading – Zechariah 9:9-12

The coming messianic king will inaugurate an era of disarmament and prosperity. Because of God's covenant with Israel, the people are designated as "prisoners of hope."

Psalm – Psalm 145:8-14

The LORD is gracious and full of compassion. (Ps. 145:8)

Second Reading – Romans 7:15-25a

Life captive to sin is a catch-22 existence in which we know good but do not do it and do things we know to be wrong. Through Jesus Christ, God has set us free from such a futile existence.

Gospel – Matthew 11:16-19, 25-30

Jesus chides people who find fault with both his ministry and that of John the Baptist. He thanks God that wisdom and intelligence are not needed to receive what God has to offer.

July 16 – 7th Sunday After Pentecost

God's word is like the rain that waters the earth and brings forth vegetation. It is also like the sower who scatters seed indiscriminately. Our lives are like seeds sown in the earth. Even from what appears to be little, dormant, or dead, God promises a harvest. At the Lord's table we are fed with the bread of life, that we may bear fruit in the world.

First Reading – Isaiah 55:10-13

God's word to Israel's exiles is as sure and effective as never-failing precipitation. Their return to the Holy Land in a new exodus is cheered on by singing mountains and by trees that clap their hands.

Psalm – Psalm 65:1-13

Your paths overflow with plenty. (Ps. 65:11)

Second Reading – Romans 8:1-11

There is no condemnation for those who live in Christ. God sent Christ to accomplish what the law was unable to do: condemn sin and free us from its death-dealing ways. The Spirit now empowers proper actions and values in our lives and gives us the promise of resurrected life.

Gospel – Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23

In Matthew's gospel, both Jesus and his disciples "sow the seed" of God's word by proclaiming the good news that "the kingdom of heaven is near." Now, in a memorable parable, Jesus explains why this good news produces different results in those who hear.

July 23 – 8th Sunday After Pentecost

It is an age-old question: why is there evil in the world? In the parable of the wheat and the weeds Jesus suggests that both grow together until the harvest. With Paul, we long for the day that all creation will be set free from bondage and suffering. Having both weeds and wheat within us, we humbly place our hope in the promises of God, and from the Lord's table we go forth to bear the fruit of justice and mercy.

First Reading – Isaiah 44:6-8

There are no other gods besides God: the word of the LORD does not fail to come to pass. We can trust in God, through whom Israel—and we—are redeemed.

Psalm – Psalm 86:11-17

Teach me your way, O LORD, and I will walk in your truth. (Ps. 86:11)

Second Reading – Romans 8:12-25

For Paul, true spirituality means that we experience the reality of the Spirit, which enables us to pray as God's children, keeps us in solidarity with creation, and gives us unseen hope that God will liberate us and creation from bondage to death and decay.

Gospel – Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43

Jesus tells a parable about the coexistence of good and evil in this world. God's judgment will remove all evildoers and causes of sin, but not until the end of human history.

July 30 – 9th Sunday After Pentecost

As Solomon prays for wisdom, we seek to more deeply know the treasures of faith. In today's gospel Jesus offers everyday images that reveal to us the reign of God: a tree that becomes a sheltering home, yeast that penetrates and expands, a treasured pearl, a net that gains a great catch. Even as we seek the riches of God's reign, the great surprise is that God's grace finds us first!

First Reading – 1 Kings 3:5-12

Because Solomon did not ask for long life, riches, or the defeat of his enemies, God gave him what he asked for: wisdom to govern the people well.

Psalm – Psalm 119:129-136

When your word is opened, it gives light and understanding. (Ps. 119:130)

Second Reading – Romans 8:26-39

These words celebrate the depth of God's actions for us. Through Christ's death for us and the activity of the Spirit praying for us, we are fused to God's love poured out in Jesus Christ. Nothing, not even death itself, is able to separate us from such incredible divine love.

Gospel – Matthew 13:31-33, 44-52

Throughout Matthew's gospel, Jesus and his disciples proclaim the good news that "the kingdom of heaven is near!" Here, Jesus offers several brief parables that explore the implications of this announcement for people's lives.
