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### A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

"But that's not fair!"



If I had a nickel for every time I heard that phrase as a parent of two young children, I'd be swimming in nickels. At our house everything—from what time we go to bed to what we eat to how we play—is always at risk of being deemed "not fair" by children who don't yet understand that life is rarely fair.

As I look ahead to our upcoming gospel readings for the month of September, I can't help but read them and think to myself, "But Jesus, that's not fair!" You see, we are at

a point in Matthew's gospel in which Jesus is especially blunt with his message that living as a member of the kingdom of heaven will mean a radical reordering of the way we live.

For instance, during this month we will see Jesus teach the disciples that if someone in the community sins against them, they must work hard to reconcile and forgive the wrongdoer. But that's not fair! We'd rather just write off those who hurt us and eliminate them from the community. Jesus doesn't let us off the hook that easily.

When Simon Peter presses Jesus on how many times he must forgive someone who has wronged him, we hear Jesus say that we must forgive not just seven times, but seventy-seven times! But that's not fair! Instead, shouldn't we live by the adage "fool me once, shame on you, fool me twice shame on me? Yet this idea of repeated and lavish forgiveness is precisely the radical way in which God's forgiveness works toward us. Who are we to deny it to others?

And perhaps most offensive to our modern sensibilities, Jesus tells the disciples a parable in which day laborers wait to be chosen to work. Those who are chosen first labor all day. Those who are chosen last labor only an hour. At the end of the day, the master pays them all the same wage. *But that's not fair!* We ought to get what we deserve! Yes, but if God gave us all what we deserve, would we really like the outcome? I'd wager not.

Jesus frames this whole section of "unfair teachings" with our gospel lesson for the first Sunday in September. In that lesson he teaches the disciples that he must be handed over, suffer, be killed, and be raised on the third day. Simon Peter chimes in with a version of (you guessed it): *That's not fair!* Furthermore, Jesus teaches them that if they want to follow him and be his disciples, they must take up their own crosses and follow him. No, that's not fair either. It is, however, the call of the gospel. We are called to live differently than the world lives. While the world seeks a crown, we are called to seek a cross. While the world says "get yours for you and forget everyone else," Jesus' way says we are to remember the mercy we've been shown and show it to others. While the world says "get revenge," Jesus says "forgive, even seventy-seven times." While the law of the land says, "you are paid according to how much you work," the gospel of grace says, "you are given freely that which you can never earn."

These teachings aren't easy. And no, they aren't fair either. But they are life-giving and life-changing if we have the courage to listen to Jesus and to follow his way together. I'll see you in worship this month as we meet to do just that.

The monthly emphasis for September is The Free Medical Clinic. Their mission is to provide quality health care, at no cost, to residents of the community who cannot pay for such services and who have no health insurance. The clinic was started by a local pastor in 1984 and has been serving individuals in need of medical care ever since. During fiscal year 2021, the Free Medical Clinic served over 1,300 patients during more than 6,100 visits and dispensed over 26,000 prescriptions. 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### GOOD SHEPHERD FOUNDATION NEWS

The Good Shepherd Foundation awarded nine grants in August totaling \$26,000.

The South Carolina-Tanzania Companion Synod Network received two grants. The Network received \$3,000 for building supplies and medical equipment to upgrade the Magoye Health Care Center in the South Western Diocese. The improvements will help the Center become accredited by the government as a hospital that can be staffed by a full-time doctor.

The second grant to the Network provides \$3,000 to send six Southwest Diocese orphans to Advance Level Secondary School. These are the first students from the Diocese orphanage to graduate from Entrance Level Secondary School and move on to the Advance Level.

Good Shepherd members of the Tanzania Mission 2023 Team, Cathy Milejczak and Rod Kent, each received \$3,000 to help with the costs of their Mission trip in July.

Susan Uehling is supporting the South Carolina-Tanzania Companion Synod Network's Layette/Health Care Kit Mission. The Mission provides baby clothes and blankets to mothers who come to the Magoye Health Care Center to deliver their babies. Health care kits donated by SC Women of the ELCA will go to homebound patients. The Foundation awarded \$3,000 to Susan Uehling to use toward shipping the kits to Global Health Ministries in Minnesota and then to Tanzania.

The SC Lutheran Retreat Centers built a new fully accessible swimming pool and bath house at Camp Kinard, Leesville, SC. The Foundation awarded \$3,000 for the purchase of furniture and equipment for the pool area.

Lutheran Services Carolinas started a Transitional Youth Day Services Program this summer. Located next to Reformation Lutheran Church,

Columbia, the program serves youth in DSS custody awaiting foster care placement. The program provides a safe, structured environment where up to 24 youth can receive academic help, counseling, and recreation. DSS funds the building and staff costs; the Foundation's \$3,000 grant will be used for recreational/educational supplies and activities not covered by DSS.

Oxford House, Inc. is a network of self-run and self-supporting homes for people recovering from substance use disorder. There are 105 Oxford Houses in South Carolina housing up to 769 people in recovery. In some of these Houses, children are able to stay with their mother or father. Oxford House received \$3,000 to send three parents to the annual Oxford House convention as an opportunity to strengthen personal recovery and to build up the parent/child housing initiative.

Emily Whitlow, a member of Good Shepherd, completed her seminary internship year in August and will return to LTSS for her last year of seminary. She received \$2,000 from the Foundation for living and educational expenses.

Your generosity has provided meaningful gifts that have improved the quality of life and well-being of the villagers.



The recent Foundation Grants helped us to open the newly renovated ward building and the surgery operating room. This is astronomical. The services this soon to be hospital will be able to offer are lifesaving. This effort will give the community a new hope to be able to care for their villages. The funding for the transportation of the layettes, home health kits, and medical supplies greatly supports our efforts at the clinic.

The Good Shepherd Congregation has always been willing to support the children of the diocese's orphanage. Many efforts have been made to support these children including foundation grants, monthly emphasis donations, noisy offerings, Gift of Hope gifts and general contributions. All of this has provided so much love for these children and they are growing up into fine young adults. All of them have performed

well in school and are very happy. Six of the older orphans have graduated their Entry Level Secondary School coursework, top of the nation at that, and have expressed interest in going on to Advance Level Education.

The young people of Good Shepherd have gone above and beyond with helping with the ministry in the South Western Diocese. They have collected funds for avocado trees, purchased farm animals for poor villagers, and a wheelchair for Sarah. The villagers love the children of Good Shepherd. Thank you to their Sunday School teachers, Youth Group Advisors and Adult mentors!!

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### LECTIONARY FOR SEPTEMBER 2023

### <u>September 3 – 14th Sunday After Pentecost</u>

The prophet Jeremiah speaks of the incurable wound of his suffering yet finds in God's words the delight of his heart. When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering, Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world.

### First Reading - Jeremiah 15:15-21

Jeremiah's delight in the word of the LORD is contradicted by the heaviness of God's hand upon him and God's seeming unfaithfulness. God's tough love to Jeremiah says that if he repents, he will be allowed to continue in his strenuous ministry. Jeremiah is strengthened by the simple words, "I am with you."

### **Psalm - Psalm 26:1-8**

Your love is before my eyes; I have walked faithfully with you. (Ps. 26:3)

### Second Reading – Romans 12:9-21

Paul presents benchmarks for faithful relationships with Christians and non-Christians. Love is the unflagging standard of our behavior. When we encounter evil, we do not resort to its tactics but seek to overcome it with good. While Christians cannot control the actions and attitudes of others, we seek to live at peace with all people.

### Gospel - Matthew 16:21-28

After Peter confesses that Jesus is "the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (16:16), Jesus reveals the ultimate purpose of his ministry. These words prove hard to accept, even for a disciple whom Jesus has called a "rock."

### September 10 – 15th Sunday After Pentecost

Conflict is a part of relationships and life in community. Jesus' words in today's gospel are often used in situations having to do with church discipline. The prophet Ezekiel tells of warning the wicked to turn from their ways, and Paul reminds us that love is the fulfilling of the law. We gather in the name of Christ, assured that he is present among us with gifts of peace and reconciliation.

### First Reading - Ezekiel 33:7-11

God appointed Ezekiel as a sentinel for the house of Israel. Ezekiel must faithfully convey God's warnings to the people. Remarkably, God—who is about to attack Jerusalem—gives a warning with the hope that repentance will make the attack unnecessary.

### Psalm - Psalm 119:33-40

I desire the path of your commandments. (Ps. 119:35)

### Second Reading - Romans 10:5-15

The obligation of Christians is to love one another and so fulfill the heart and goal of the law. Clothes make the person as we "put on the Lord Jesus Christ" and live today in light of the future God has in store for us.

### Gospel - Matthew 18:15-20

Jesus offers practical advice to his disciples on how individuals—and the church as a whole—should go about restoring relationships when one member has sinned against another.

### September 17 – 16th Sunday After Pentecost

In today's second reading Paul questions why we judge one another, since we all stand before the judgment of God. Yet we do sin against one another, and Jesus' challenge that we forgive seventy-seven times reveals God's boundless mercy. When we hear the words of forgiveness in worship and sign ourselves with the cross, we are renewed in baptism to be signs of reconciliation in the world.

### First Reading – Genesis 50:15-21

After Jacob's death the brothers of Joseph begged for forgiveness for the crime they had done against him. You intended to do me harm, Joseph said, but God used this as an opportunity to do good and save many lives.

### Psalm - Psalm 103:1-13

LORD, you are full of compassion and mercy. (Ps. 103:8)

### Second Reading – Romans 14:1-12

This Christian community has significant struggles with diversity. Here Paul helps us understand that despite different practices in worship and personal piety, we do not judge one another. All Christians belong to the Lord Jesus Christ who died for all of us and will judge each of us.

### Gospel - Matthew 18:21-35

When Peter asks about the limits of forgiveness, Jesus responds with a parable that suggests human forgiveness should mirror the unlimited mercy of God.

### September 24 – 17th Sunday After Pentecost

Matthew narrates one of Jesus' controversial parables in which Jesus says that the reign of God is like that of a landowner who pays his workers the same wage no matter what time of day they began to work. When God changes God's mind about punishing Nineveh for their evil ways, Jonah is angry. Yet God is gracious and merciful, abounding in steadfast love. In baptism we receive the grace of God that is freely given to all. As Martin Luther wrote, in the presence of God's mercy we are all beggars.

### First Reading - Jonah 3:10-4:11

After Jonah's short sermon in 3:4, the Ninevites all repented and God decided to spare the city. Jonah objected to this and became even more angry when God ordered a worm to destroy a plant that was providing shade. The book ends with a question that challenges any who are not ready to forgive: You, Jonah, are all worked up about a bush, but shouldn't I be concerned about a hundred and twenty thousand Ninevites?

### Psalm - Psalm 145:1-8

The LORD is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. (Ps. 145:8)

### Second Reading - Philippians 1:21-30

Paul writes to the Philippians from prison. Though he is uncertain about the outcome of his imprisonment, he is committed to the ministry of the gospel and calls on the Philippians to live lives that reflect and enhance the gospel mission.

### Gospel - Matthew 20:1-16

Jesus tells a parable about God's generosity, challenging the common assumption that God rewards people according to what they have earned or deserve.


