Genesis 3



CELEBRATE

1. For what do we forfeit eternal riches and rewards, and why do we do so?

CONNECT

- 2. Many Christians are quick to talk about the challenges of homosexuality, but what are other forms of sexual brokenness that are common to life?
- 3. Read Genesis 25:29-34 and Hebrews 12:16. How do these two passages relate to each other?
- 4. When Esau got up from eating the stew he was embittered; he "despised his birthright" (Gen. 25:34). Why, and how does this relate to our experiences today?
- 5. Consider Genesis 3:21 (it might help to read all of Genesis 3). What is so powerful about this verse? See also Romans 5:6-11
- 6. Contrast the aforementioned story of Esau in Genesis 25:34 with 1 Corinthians 11:23-26. Why is one set of bread and cup better than the other? See also John 6:22-58.
- 7. Genesis 25 highlights Esau's forfeiture of his birthright. It also highlights Jacob's scheming against his brother. But read Genesis 33. Why does reconciliation and respect among broken people matter so much?
