Lesson 30 – Week of May 25th

1. Mingling and catching up. (10 minutes)

2. Begin with a short prayer for your time together. (5 minutes)

3. Move to a time of accountability. (20 minutes)

i. **Accountability Questions on Mission & Kingdom-Mindedness**

- How have you practically sought first the kingdom of God in your daily life?
- Did you pray for or support the spread of the gospel locally or globally?
- How are you living with an eternal perspective, longing for Christ's return?
- Have you sought opportunities to advance the gospel locally?

ii. **Homework**

- Did you accomplish at least five devotionals this week?
- Did you read *Future Grace*, Chapter 29?

4. Lesson Time. (40-55 minutes)

- i. Is there anything that stood out to you from this chapter? Any questions, observations, or encouragements?
- ii. From page 353. How does Piper contrast the worldview of evolution with the biblical view of death at the beginning of the chapter? **Answer: Piper contrasts the idea that death is the end of existence (as in evolutionary naturalism) with the biblical teaching that humans are created in God's image and destined for eternity. This reality awakens a deep concern about what happens after death and opens the door to hope through Christ's promises.**
- iii. From pages 355-356. How does Hebrews 2:14–15 explain Christ's victory over the fear of death? **Answer: Christ became human in order to die and destroy the devil's power, which rests on accusing us because of our sin. By removing sin through His death, Christ removes Satan's weapon and frees believers from lifelong slavery to the fear of death.**
- iv. From pages 358-359. How does Paul overcome the discouragement of his "wasting away" body? **Answer: Paul renews his inner strength by fixing his eyes on unseen realities—eternal glory rather than temporary suffering (2 Cor. 4:16–18). His hope is anchored in future grace, especially the promise of resurrection and eternal life.**

- v. From pages 362-366. How does Piper explain the role of judgment after death in relation to grace and faith? **Answer: Believers will be judged according to their deeds, but these deeds are not the basis of salvation—they are the evidence of genuine faith. Salvation remains by grace through faith, and works demonstrate the authenticity of that faith and determine rewards.**
- vi. Do you avoid thinking about death—or do you see it as a final opportunity to glorify God in faith?
- vii. How does your view of dying reflect your trust in God's promises for what lies beyond?
- viii. What legacy of faith do you hope to leave for those who watch how you finish the race?
- ix. In your group's prayer time, pray for faith to face death with peace and assurance, resting in the victory of Christ and the hope of resurrection. Ask the Spirit to make you ready to finish well—rejoicing in the future grace that death cannot cancel.

5. Prayer time (15 minutes)

- i. Ask for specific prayer requests from members.
- ii. Pray for one another as you wish.
- iii. Write down these prayer requests so you can follow up in the next meeting.
