Pastor Hyde opened minds and hearts to King David

David, Shepherd boy, warrior, giant slayer, king, murderer and adulterer, Yet David was repeatedly described as a man after God's own heart. How can these coexist?

The Four Seasons of David's life grappled with this clashing of character flaws and strengths of David during the recent four-week study. The class was led by author and pastor Randy L Hyde in four sessions focusing on the four seasons of David's life.

Beginning with the life blossoming season of Spring this unnamed shepherd boy was annointed to be the next King of Israel. David with slingshot in hand conquers the Giant Goliath to begin a Philistine rout. From the study guide, class participants were asked

"Why do you think that God often chooses to do that which is not obvious?"

The parched dry season of summer follows with wilderness wanderings in an attempt to evade the political and physical annihilation of the present King Saul. Randy Hyde, course leader, describes this season as among David's greatest moments as a leader particularly with regard to the response of grief and love upon Saul's death. From the study guide participants were asked "When you go through your inevitable wilderness will you seek God there?"

The beautiful and colorful season of Fall follows with the people chanting about their beloved warrior King; "Saul has slain his thousands but David his ten thousands." David strategically moves the Kingdom base to Jerusalem to centrally unify the northern and southern tribes of Israel. This Fall season was a time of peace, strength unification and wise leadership under David's reign. God also uses veto power during this season of David's life to issue a strong NO to David's request to build a House for Yahweh. From the study guide participants were asked to examine personal life experiences to God's perceived NO which oftentimes results in an ultimate Yes.

Finally, the vibrancy of Fall is followed by the waning season of winter. David pursues and consummates a relationship with Bathsheba, Uriah's wife and is implicit in the consequential web of deceit that results in scheming to bring

about Uriah's death. From the study guide, participants were challenged to reconcile the character flaws of both murder and adultery during this winter season of David's life with the repeated affirmation of David as a man after God's own heart.

Open the door to further opportunities to strengthen your spiritual knowledge with the next Christian Education course offering in February 2025. Mark Clark, ordained minister and practicing lawyer will teach Religion and the Law. Hope to see you then.

Socks, socks, and more socks...... and shoes, and soups for Jackson House



If you prefer print resources, try the *Advent for Everyone* series by N. T. Wright. There are three book options: Advent devotionals from Matthew, Luke, and the Apostles. The books and the daily devotionals are scripture based and concise. You can order any of these inexpensive books through Amazon.com or other book sellers. Also, in the Kirk Fran Brown Library (first come first serve) you will find *Watch for the Light: Readings for Advent and Christmas* and *God With Us: Rediscovering the Meaning of Christmas*.

Consider using any or all of these to take a few minutes each day of Advent to refresh your experience of Christmas.



Though he had never before seen a circus, he had been told stories of how marvelous it was, and he couldn't wait.


