The Kirk in the Pines Moving Forward A Report on the Work of Ministry Architects

It's been a year now since the Session decided to embark on a time of introspection and discernment with the help of the consulting firm, Ministry Architects. Our two Ministry Architect consultants, Sara Bailey and Krista Mulhollen came alongside of us over this last year to help us examine our mission, our values and our goals. They have helped us develop a clear sense of who we are and good practices for who we want to be. Their wealth of knowledge and experience from working with churches around the country have helped enable us to identify our strengths and challenges, develop a vision for our future, and strengthen our systems and processes.

As this year together draws to a close, it's time to recap for you what has been done and the ongoing plans. Here's what's been happening:

- We began a year ago in August of 2024 when our two consultants visited the Kirk to conduct a 3-day church-wide assessment of our ministries. They held multiple small group sessions with the congregation, Session members, and staff to hear our joys, frustrations, and dreams. They then synthesized what they had heard into a written report that identified assets and challenges for the Kirk, provided context for the Kirk compared to other churches across the nation, named best practices in ministry, and provided recommendation for a renovation process. Their findings along with recommendations towards a sustainable approach for future ministry was then presented to the congregation at a Wednesday night dinner in Bailey Hall.
- A 5-member ReVisioning Team had been elected by the congregation to help carry out the recommendations coming from the report. So, in November the consultants again traveled to the Kirk for a 2-day in person meeting with these team members.
- A third visit from the consultants was a 2-day Visioning meeting in March of 2025. They
 met with the Re-Visioning Team, Session members, the Pastor Nominating Committee and
 others in the congregation to develop a new mission statement that articulated the Kirk's
 purpose, along with core values that define the spirit of the Kirk, and future goals to carry
 us into a healthy and sustainable future.
- Throughout the year the Re-Visioning Team has been working on the long list of recommendations. They have had monthly Zoom meetings and many phone conversations with the consultants as they have shared progress on given tasks, celebrated accomplishments, and discussed additional recommendations.

So, what are these recommendations that are being worked on—some accomplished, some underway, and some still to be tackled. This is only a partial list:

- A plan for thanking volunteers
- A plan for recruiting volunteers
- Planning Intentional welcoming strategies for visitors to the Kirk
- Strengthening ties between Saturday night and the Sunday morning services
- Creating systems for managing the new membership database
- Following up with those members who are not attending

• Shoring up communication and "marketing" strategies

- Creating a church logo
- Redesigning the church website
- Installing a new financial accounting and data management system
- Evaluating staff positions for effectiveness and efficiency
- Working toward launching a New Member Class
- Creating a unified Mission Statement and Kirk Values
- Establishing 3-year goals and measures for their assessment
- Updating job descriptions for both ministry areas and staff positions
- Examining and updating church procedures
- Strengthening the stewardship program
- Developing a yearly planning calendar

As you can see, it's been a busy year for the Re-Visioning Team, Session members, and staff as they've partnered with our consultants. It's been a year of discovery, looking with fresh eyes at who we are, who we want to be and the direction we want to go. We're grateful to Ministry Architects for coming alongside us with a structural road map and the tools needed to help us fulfil our mission. Year two is now beginning and, with God's help, the Kirk will continue to move forward into a strong and healthy future.

Family Man, Farmer, Social Worker Meet Nathan Chennault Vera Lloyd's New CEO

"Somebody has to tell the children that it doesn't have to be this way."

It's a conviction that Nathan has carried with him through every step of his career. Born and raised in Monroe, Louisiana with a children's home down the street, he saw early on how steady guidance can impact a young person's life. After earning his Master's degree in Social Work and becoming an LCSW, Nathan dedicated himself to being that positive influence for the children who need it most—counseling, overseeing clinical teams, and leading youth-focused residential programs much like Vera Lloyd, including CEO of Millcreek Residential Treatment Center in Fordyce, AR. Now he steps in as our Chief Executive Officer, ready to provide our youth with the safety and support that they deserve.

Nathan's default setting is to learn, share, and leave things better than he found them, and a restless curiosity drives a lot of how he spends his time. He often finds himself skimming the latest trauma-care journals - his idea of light reading-before heading out to disassemble a stubborn tractor carburetor just to see how he could improve it. Years of Coast Guard service gave Nathan the calm to tackle a crisis, and his experience as a counselor has taught him the patience for achieving long-term growth, one conversation at a time.

At home, Nathan, his wife, and their three children tend to a lively farm in Sheridan. Evenings are spent feeding the ducks, checking on LuLu the pig and Lucy the exotic cow, and coaxing oak boards into sturdy furniture in the woodshop. "I just like taking care of things," he says. In every corner of the farm, as in his leadership, the goal is simple: give life the attention it needs to thrive.

In Memoriam

Patricia Smart Maack Ormsbee

Our sweet and loving mother, Patricia (Pat) Smart Maack Ormsbee 96, passed away peacefully in the loving company of her family on July 2, 2025. Pat was born Feb. 3, 1929 in Hinsdale, Illinois, the daughter of Chauncey Smart and Florence Fleck Smart. She grew up in the family home in Downers Grove Township where the Smart family had homesteaded since the 1830's. Besides her parents and brother, the household included her grandmother Smart and beloved Smart aunts Cora, Grace, Ada, and Nelle. Her aunts were teachers at one room schoolhouses that Pat attended until high school. Her aunts had a significant impact on Pat's life, leading her to continue the family tradition of teaching.

Pat attended Grinnell College in Grinnell, Iowa. It was there that Pat "the country girl" met Kenneth Ballentine Maack "the city boy" from Chicago. Pat graduated from Northern Illinois University in 1951 and she and Ken married that summer. They started their married life in the Chicago area where Pat taught elementary school. Shortly they moved to Milwaukee. Wisconsin where their three children were born, then moving to Brookfield, Wisconsin to raise their family. After her youngest finished grade school, Pat returned to teaching, finding that second graders were her favorite. Ken's success at work resulted in a number of international award trips they enjoyed together, as well as numerous family vacations. Pat and Ken lived in Brookfield for over 30 years. They were active members of Brookfield United Church of Christ.

In 1993, they retired to Hot Springs Village, Arkansas where they were drawn to a retirement community with year-round golfing. Unfortunately, Ken died in 1994, early into his retirement. Pat continued living in Hot Springs Village for another 30 years. She held leadership roles in AAUW, PEO and was a member of Kirk in the Pines Presbyterian Church. She met and was married to Elliot Ormsbee until his death in 2010.

Later, she developed a caring friendship with Horace Shankwiler until his death in 2018. Pat supported many causes dear to her heart, most



importantly the opportunity for education, particularly for women. She created and endowed numerous scholarship funds through AAUW, her church and local high schools in Arkansas.

In 2022 at the age of 93, Pat moved to be near her daughter in Boise, Idaho. She enjoyed three years of active assisted living at Meadow Lake Village, participating in nearly all outings and activities. For all that knew Pat, she'll be remembered as kind, humorous, social and joyful.

She was preceded in death by her parents, stepfather Lewis Dickinson, husbands Kenneth Ballantine Maack and Elliot Ormsbee, brother William Smart, nephew William Smart IV and niece Lisa Smart. She will be sadly missed by her children; Share Maack (Eric Schulman) of Boise, ID., Karen Maack (Pete Dixon) of South Lake Tahoe, CA., Steve (Kathy) Maack, of Kokomo, IN., grandchildren; Rebecca (Cody) Shuler, Markus Maack, Casey (Anna) Dixon and Sam Dixon and great grandchildren; Chance, Jett and Quinton Shuler and Sawyer MacEwen.

A memorial service was held at Meadow Lake Village, 650 S. Arbor Lane, Meridian on Friday July 11, 2025 at 2pm. The family will gather at a later date for a graveside burial at the family pioneer graveyard, Cass Cemetery in Darien, Ill. 

Pastor's Corner

Carey Nieuwhof wrote the following a few years ago, but his thoughts are timeless, at least for the age in which we find ourselves. This is not an attempt to step on the toes of Ministry Architects, but I think it underscores what we are finding in our working relationship with them.

10 Predictions About the Future Church and Shifting Attendance Patterns

- 1. The potential to gain is still greater than the potential to lose. Why? Because the church was Jesus' idea, not ours. Because of that, it will survive our missteps and whatever cultural trends come along our way.
- 2. Churches that love their model more than the mission will die. Churches are like companies in many respects. Those that show innovation around the mission (Apple, Samsung) will always beat companies that remain devoted to the method (Kodak). Leading people into a growing relationship with Jesus is the mission. Desperately clinging to our traditions is the model.
- **3.** The gathered church is here to stay. The church is inherently communal. Gatherings shift and take on different appearances, but Christians will always come together to do more than could be done on their own.
- **4. Consumer Christianity will die and a more selfless discipleship will emerge**. Consumers ask, "What's in it for me?" The gospel calls us to die to ourselves, to lose ourselves for the sake of Christ.
- **5. Sundays will become more about what we give than what we get.** Our gatherings will change, will become less about us and more about Jesus and the world he loves. It is the kind of outward focus that drove the rapid expansion of the first-century church.
- 6. Attendance will no longer drive engagement; engagement will drive attendance. Nuff said.
- 7. Simplified ministries will complement people's lives, not compete with people's lives. "Churches that focus their energies on the few things the church can uniquely do best will emerge as the most effective churches moving forward."

- **8.** Online church will supplement the journey but not become the journey. The journey has to do with relationships, when people are face to face with one another.
- **9.** Online church will become more of a front door than a back door. A church's online presence will be a first (church) home for many people. That's why streaming is so important, and we have to keep our website updated.
- **10.** Gatherings will be smaller and larger at the same time. Size is irrelevant to a church's effectiveness. "We will see the emergence of bigger churches and smaller churches at the same time as the gathered church continues to change."


