Library open house planned for August 26th-27th

Many times over the years, the Kirk Library has undergone face-lifts, reorganizations, revitalizations, and reinvigorations. People like Lowell Gardner have written newsletter articles, led summer book studies, and promoted new books, all with the aim of making our library more visible and more interesting to our congregation. Despite these efforts, many of us have never taken the time to really peruse our library to find out what a wonderful resource it can be.

Sadly, over time our library became a sort of dumping ground. Books stacked willy-nilly on the shelves and donations placed on temporary shelving units under the stairwells made locating and checking books out nearly impossible. Then, during the dark days of Covid-induced isolation, something wonderful happened! Lowell and Sharon Gardner used that time to do away with the old card system that didn't work and painstakingly enter all of our books into a computer program. After excluding duplicate books and those unlikely to be used, with help from Lucy Allen, Millie Croson, Edie and Don Loveday, Patty Barnes, and Martha Nielsen, remaining titles were then marked with their Dewey Decimal System (DDS) numbers and shelved in numerical order. The computer system also allowed Sharon to create printed lists of our holdings to allow users to determine whether a book is available by title or author, then locate it on the shelves organized and marked with DDS numbers.



The best news of all is you don't have to touch a computer or reshelve the book when you are finished. The library "elves" do all of that. So, if you are one of those people who hasn't yet discovered what a treasure our library has become, we invite you to come to our "Back to the Books" event to be held after each of our services on August 26th and 27th. One of the elves will be there to show you how simple it is to find what you're looking for, write down when you took it home, and see where to drop it off when you are finished with it. No hassles, no late fees, no computer skills – just reading enjoyment!

The Pastor's Corner

How can we grow deeper in our faith? Are there practices which help us grow closer to God?

One of my professors at Princeton, Dr. Craig Dykstra, thinks there are. He wrote a book entitled *Growing in the Life of Faith* in which he listed 14 "practices" that consistently appear throughout Christian history and that are particularly significant for Christians today. I am certain you will recognize most of these:

- 1. Worshipping God together—praising God, giving thanks, offering prayers, hearing the Word preached and receiving the sacraments.
- 2. Telling the story of faith to one another—reading and hearing the Scriptures.
- 3. Interpreting together the Bible and applying it to our lives.
- 4. Praying together and for each other in worship and by ourselves.
- 5. Confessing our sin to one another—forgiving and being reconciled.
- 6. Tolerating one another's failures and encouraging each other.
- 7. Carrying out specific faithful acts of service and witness together.
- 8. Giving generously of one's means and receiving gratefully the gifts of others.
- 9. Suffering with and for one another.
- 10. Providing hospitality and care for one another as well as strangers and even enemies.
- 11. Listening and talking attentively to one another about our experiences in life and with God.
- 12. Struggling together to understand the world in which we live.
- 13. Criticizing and resisting all those powers (in the church and in the world) that destroy human beings and injure God's creation.
- 14. Working together for peace and justice—
 trying to maintain and create social structures
 and institutions that will sustain life in ways
 that accord with God's will.

Beginning in September 6th and 7th, I will be leading Bible study on Wednesday mornings at 9:00 a.m. and a discussion about the life of Dietrich Bonhoeffer on Thursday mornings, also 9:00 am. We will probably talk about almost all of these ancient practices. If you would like to put your Christian faith into practice, please make plans to join us this fall.


Wear Kirk logo close to your heart

He graduated with a BS in Forestry from Miss. State University in 1964. He began working with MS Forestry Commission and moved in 1967 to Vicksburg to start his 35 years with civil service with the USDA Soil Conservation Service. Five years later, he went to work for US Army Corps of Engineers as a Realty Specialist and that gave him opportunities to live in Europe. Over 17 years, he worked and lived in Frankfurt, Munich, and Heidelberg, Germany and Naples, Italy. He and Cheryle had many adventures while camping with family and friends and made many dear friends. He retired twice from the US Navy, in 1998 and 2005.

In 1996 they bought their home in Hot Springs Village, AR for their retirement years. For 25 years, he was a member of Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines. Stanley will be remembered as a good friend, a good and kind man, a funny man with a quick wit, and for leaving our world a better place. 

In lieu of flowers, memorials may be made to the Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines, or the Hot Springs Village Animal Welfare League.



Loss of innocence but not responsibility

The opening four chapters of the Old Testament Book of Genesis portrays a whole of creation including the rise and ultimate fall of the first family. Man and woman found themselves in a lush garden surrounded by all divinely instituted foliage and fauna. In the midst of all was the tree of life and the tree of knowledge of good and evil. All was their responsibility and for their benefit save the latter, the tree of knowledge of good and evil, to partake of which meant death.

The rest of the story is well known. The serpent is beguiling. The woman is seduced. The man proves too trusting, careless or greedy. Theologians refer to it as *Original Sin*. Where lay the fault: the reptile's deception or the woman and the man eating the forbidden fruit. What was the author of Genesis seeking to convey to us?

The answer is found in the participant's reaction. Man blamed the woman along with a veiled hint of guilt on God's part too. Woman blamed the serpent and the serpent simply kept a typically low profile.

No one owned up! No one accepted responsibility.

The real consequence was the loss of innocence leaving everyone altered, naked, embarrassed and full of excuses.


The purpose of the Genesis author is to make clear mankind's status. Born in innocence we must all eventually take personal responsibility. We will make mistakes, some catastrophic requiring recompense. God, as a loving Heavenly Father, is available if we believe. As man and woman reproduce the family grows with relational responsibilities required. Cain's question - "Am I my brother's keeper?" - necessitates a resounding <u>YES!</u>

The Gospel of Matthew 22:36-40 records Jesus being questioned regarding the greatest commandment. The Lord identifies two on which all others adhere.

"Love the Lord, your God, with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind" (Deut. 6:5) and "Love your neighbor (Brother/Sister) as yourselves." (Levi. 19:18). Wherein is covered all of Genesis 1-4.

Kirk receives Covid related funds

Early 2023 the Kirk received notice that we could be eligible for Employee Retention Credit Program (ERC) funds from the government for keeping our employees working through Covid. In questioning ERC GO, the accounting firm that handled these refunds, we learned that churches were eligible. We moved forward with a claim. The total claimed was \$68,451.66. The firm required 15% for their fee. They walked us through the process. To date we have received \$59,256.99. This includes the interest on the refund less the fee to ERC GO. There may be a small amount still to come.
