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Kirk Pastor and author Randy Hyde to offer course

DAVID. Many people share the name, but when it is used singularly even those unfamiliar with the Old Testament know of whom it speaks. Shepherd boy, warrior, giant-slayer, king, adulterer. A man after God's own heart. That's the mystery of David's story. How could such an enigmatic man, who is almost bigger than life, be so close to the heart of his God?

Randy Hyde, Transitional Pastor of the Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines, will share insight into David's life by breaking it down into four seasons: Spring, Summer, Fall, and Winter. The scriptures for each season are:

Spring- 1 Samuel 16-20 Summer- 1 Samuel 21- 2 Samuel 1 Fall- 2 Samuel 2-8 Winter- 2 Samuel 11-13, 23-24

From the foreword to his book, *After God's Own Heart:* The Life and Faith of David... Hyde "realizes that the story of David, even though it was set in a time when people fought with swords and spears instead of guns and Humvees, is as fresh now as it was when it was first told – and that it will continue to be relevant and to influence people's lives long after the events in today's newspaper have been forgotten." (John Killinger)

This unique class will occur on Wednesdays, October 23 through November 13, 9:30 – 11:00 a.m. in Bailey Hall. Pastor Hyde will be sending out thought questions before each session to those who sign up for the study. Refreshments will also be served.

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We are thrilled to welcome the choir back to worship after its summer break. The first rehearsal is always a fun time to catch up with our dear choir friends. Now, the work begins!

In the Hymn Study earlier this year, we noted this statement from Appendix I of the Glory to God hymnal: "Collections of hymns, psalms, and spiritual songs give voice to ...[our] core beliefs and ...convictions. Their texts are 'compact theology'." This phrase really connected with me.

The music of worship lifts us emotionally, rekindles poignant memories, and helps convey the message of the text. We must remind ourselves that the text is the "compact theology." Without the text, hymns and anthems are just lovely tunes. So, where do these meaningful words come from?

In early September, the choir sang "The First Song of Isaiah" by Jack White, a popular song in the 1970's. White wrote the music and the text. The strong statement of our enduring trust in God coupled with

an easy to sing melody made it a good choice for our response after the Passing of the peace.

Tom Fettke, a popular composer, once asked a choir member to write lyrics for a future anthem based on Psalm 8. Linda Lee Johnson collaborated with Fettke on this and many other popular anthems, but this was her first! "The Majesty and Glory of Your Name" remains one of the all-time favorite anthems of church choirs.

In October, you will hear the choir sing *Come, Share the Lord* on World Communion Sunday, October 6, welcoming all to the table as a family. The composer and lyricist is Bryan Leech. He beautifully captures the essence of the Lord's Supper: Sharing the Lord's Supper is a response to the "burning in our hearts" for the love of Christ who "makes us one."

I am thankful for the poets and lyricists who give us this "compact theology" week after week.

We welcome any potential choir members to come check us out. We rehearse every Wednesday at 3:00 in the choir room, and we love to have visitors.


Pastor's Corner

New leaders take the helm of Kirk PW

Presbyterian Women of the Kirk in the Pines just began its new season. The women meet on the second Monday of each month between September and May. They meet seven times in two small groups called Circles for Bible study and fellowship. Circle one meets in the morning and Circle two meets in the afternoon. Each chooses its own study materials. They also meet twice for Gatherings, where both circles meet together for a program and a luncheon.

The officers for the 2024-2025 year are Becky Wakefield, moderator; Vicki Rosenquist, treasurer; and Dotty Rector, secretary. Moderator Becky says "I plan for PW to move forward as we embrace change for our Kirk. I am encouraged by the willingness of our members to work together." These women are thanked for agreeing to lead.

At the September meeting of Circle 1, the 10:00 a.m. circle, the fellowship aspect took an unusual turn. One of the women didn't like meeting at 10:00 instead of the previous time of 9:30. The later hour didn't give her time to go home and change into her gym clothes before a 12:00 p.m. exercise class. So, instead of telling her "too bad," the women decided that they would wear leotards to circle in solidarity with the one who could wear hers and then go directly from the circle meeting to the gym.

At the September meeting of the 4:00pm Circle all present were in favor of beginning a book study written by Pastor Randy Hyde, "Feminine Faces: Portraits of Biblical Women in Faith" as their next book study source. Who knows? They may even plan an author's book signing event.

The most recent past moderator, Susan Morrow, was interviewed about her experience as moderator. Asked about her goals for last year, she said she wanted to create opportunities that would be of interest to all Kirk women, support ongoing Circles and encourage meaningful Bible Study opportunities. She decided to target mission programs that PW supports. At both Gatherings she brought in speakers who were leaders of community agencies. She also provided mission projects to benefit our mission partners. The aoal of increasing meaningfulness of Bible study to help women to learn to live out their faith is ongoing.

Susan was stunned at the level of generosity, love and support of PW women. The amount of mission giving was astounding, and the amount of commitment and faith was humbling. Another year begins with camaraderie and the challenge to nurture faith through prayer and Bible study and to support the mission of the church.

There were more than 90 members present at the dinner and program on the Ministry Architects' Visioning Report. But if you were unable to be there, your Session wants you to know the status of our visioning process. Besides the delicious food, and the presentation of Kirk in the Pines emblem shirts to Rev Hyde and his wife, Janet, we had a power point presentation on the results of the listening sessions Ministry Architects held in August.

What they found were key indicators that the Kirk is poised to move forward based on its vitality and involvement, its strong programs, and the joyful enthusiasm and love the congregation has for it. Comparing it to generalized church norms they listed many, many positives. They also listed a number of challenges we face along with recommendations that we need to consider as we confront declining membership and waning resources.

So where do we start? First, they suggest that the Session create a 5-member team to carry out these recommendations. This Revision Team will address and help implement the Ministry Architect's recommendations and oversee the process of living into a new vision for the Kirk. The team will be working closely with the Ministry Architects' consultants and with the Session. In fact, one of the consultants is coming to the Kirk this month to help get the team started and then will continue working with them in monthly Zoom meetings.

And so, the Session and Rev. Hyde ask you to keep praying for this important process we're engaged in, but to also especially join us in prayers for each member of our Revision Team. They will have a lot of responsibilities.
