### Re-Vision Team enthusiastic and ready to lead

Back in September, Ministry Architects presented to the Kirk congregation recommendations to help you move forward. A Re-Visioning Team was formed and in October, began their work. This team will oversee the two-year process of developing and implementing the Kirk's vision for the future, and addressing Ministry Architect's recommendations, serving as a non-anxious presence during this period. They will work with the Session, the Staff, and the congregation to address the immediate and long-term issues facing the Kirk, affirm a consensus for the direction of the church, support work on accomplishment of goals and implementation of the

mission statement and values, and help assess any infrastructure needed to support all this work.

On October 18th the members of the Re-Visioning Team gathered to be oriented to the Agile Project Management Process. This is a method that the team will use in prioritizing the recommendations and mapping out the next steps. Some priorities have been identified as tasks to tackle first. These initial priorities are related to welcoming visitors, assimilating new (continued on pg. 2)


She moved to the Village to get away from the extreme heat of Houston. A side benefit is that she gets to see her brother more often, since he lives in Russellville.

# Angel Tree will be back for Christmas in 2024

Approximately 27 years ago, the Kirk Mission Committee began the Christmas Giving Tree tradition. Marilyn Johnson was the first of many to organize the project. Since then, Kirk members have helped put smiles on the faces of hundreds of boys and girls in our community.

The Christmas Giving Tree or Angel Tree, as it's also known, will be loaded with tags again this year. The tags represent children from Mountain Pine Head Start, Vera Lloyd Children's Home, and Ouachita Children's Center. Gifts for Mountain Pine children should be returned wrapped or in gift bags with the tag attached to the outside of the package. Vera Lloyd gifts should be put in gift bags only, with the tag attached so the contents are visible to the staff at Vera Lloyd.

Ouachita Children's Center asks for gift cards only, so they can be used by staff and youth to purchase gifts. The tag and gift card should be taped together to ensure that it goes to Ouachita instead of Vera Lloyd.

Someone will be available by the tree, if you have any questions. Look for the festive tree in the Narthex beginning Sunday, November 24. The deadline for returning gifts will be Sunday, December 15. Elves from the Mission Committee will deliver the gifts in time for Christmas. There will be specific information




