
## Many tasked with leading the Kirk forward

During this interim period between called pastors, the Kirk has not only hired Rev. Hyde, to temporarily lead us as the Transition Pastor, but it has also formed several new committees. To understand all the things going on, we have asked our Ministry Architects consultants to help define the different roles and interrelationships of these new committees.

Of course, it's self-explanatory what the Pastor Nominating Committee is doing. But what about their relationship with the Session and Re-Visioning Team? Here is our consultants' explanation:

The Session is taking care of the Kirk as always. They are making sure things are happening; taking care of worship and day-to-day ministry, maintaining the facilities, overseeing the staff, managing finances, and all continuing activities. The Session is the permanent leadership group elected by the congregation. They report to the congregation regarding their work and the status of the church. The Session members are the stewards that God has put in charge of this particular house called the Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines.

The Re-vision Team is tasked with improving the systems of the Kirk. It is like renovating a room in the house. You still live in the house while a room is being renovated. The Re-Visioning Team is the short-term leadership team scoping out Kirk



activities on a broader basis than the Session and they rely on the structure of the Session and the Kirk Budget to implement the changes. They also interact with the PNC regarding the Mission and Vision of the Kirk. They report to the Session and inform the congregation of their progress. The Re-Vision Team will have an end to their work when the house is renovated.

#### Lunch and Learn features Area Agency on Aging's Dody Roberts

The Area Agency on Aging of West Central Arkansas is a private nonprofit organization which has served Hot Springs/Hot Springs Village area with information and referral services for seniors 60 and over for 50+ years.

Dody Roberts, Development Director & Family Caregiver Program Administrator, was the guest speaker for the February Lunch & Learn program at the Kirk. Many of the attendees had personal experience with various services provided by the Area Agency on Aging and offered helpful tips on tapping into the resources (many of which are free) available through the Agency.

Ms. Roberts explained that the Area Agency on Aging for West Central Arkansas is available to assist if there are questions about:

- Caregiver support,
- Home care aides (both paid and volunteer),
- Financial assistance programs for caregiver short-term respite,
- CHI St. Vincent McAuley Senior Activity Center on-site weekday meals, recreational and educational activities, and social opportunities for Seniors,
- Meals on Wheels program,
- Free in-home evaluation by a qualified case manager and
- Medicare counseling and education.

## Pastor's Corner

In a conversation with one of our parishioners, my mind went to Debi Thomas, who is a monthly contributor to Christian Century. Her latest piece is entitled, Progressive Christians Should Read the Bible. Since I couldn't agree more with Debi, I read her comments with great interest, and then found that her experience with the Bible closely relates to my own. She writes...


"Raised in a biblio-centric tradition, I was taught that God's word is perfect, devoid of inconsistency or error. Every word in it is intentionally chosen by God, and every event recorded in it is historically accurate.... I was also taught to read the Bible as a straight forward and definitive rule book that covers all bases when it comes to daily living."

I would also add to Debi's comments that we were taught never to put anything on top of the Bible, due to its sacred nature. The book itself, and not just its content, was treated as holy.

"My work now, she continues, is to... reintegrate heart and mind, soul and body. To trust that the God who first met me in the pages of scripture can still meet and nourish me now. She goes on to say, I no longer approach the Bible as a rule book, science manual, or history text. I see it as a rich, multivocal, multigenerational library of conversations about God and with God, undertaken by flawed people who cared about seeking and serving the Divine... And finally, I see the Bible as the opening moves in a conversation that is dynamic and ongoing... Its next pages await our participation. They will be written across our very lives."

So I ask, what is your relationship with the scriptures? Do you read the Bible daily or often, for devotional thought as well as deepening your walk with God? Do you only hear the Bible when it is read at church? How did you approach scripture when you were young, and how do you do it now? Has your understanding grown and evolved, as Debi's experience has been?

I encourage you to knock the dust off your Bible, if necessary, and see it as inspiration for your spiritual journey. Understand that it bears the testimony of flawed people such as ourselves, as Debi puts it, who

had a unique experience with the Divine, and chose to share it with others like you and me. We, you and I, would do well to follow their example. After all, we may be the only Bible some people read.

Good news: the ad hoc search committee charged with finding a new Music Director and Organist/Pianist have been successful. We now again have a full complement of musical staff. Thanks go to Patty Barnes, Clark Mowry and Linda Hommema for first finding Tina Kneisler to lead our music program, and now Kathleen Kinney to play the organ and piano. We are blessed to have two wonderful musicians to help lead us in worship.

More good news: we had another visit from our two Ministry Architects consultants. Sara Bailey and Krista Mulhollen led the Re-Visioning Team in two full days of meetings to create a new Mission Statement, list our important Kirk values and develop 3-year goals. Joined part of the time by Rev. Hyde, Session members and the Pastor Nominating Committee, everyone worked hard to share thoughts and ideas. The result was a communal effort forming a consensus around what we consider the Kirk's vision and mission to be, and some of the action items to help carry them forward.

- Motion: Move to welcome Ron and Tina as members of the Kirk. Motion moved seconded and passed.
- We have hired a new organist, Kathleen Kinney. Motion: move to a approve the contract to hire Kathleen Kinney as organist to begin on March 19th. Motion moved by the Administration Committee and passed.

## Maack-Ormsbee 2025-26 Scholarship application cycle opens

We are pleased to announce the opening of the application window for the 2025-26 Maack-Ormsbee scholarship cycle. The application form is available in Bailey Hall and in the Kirk Church Office for eligible undergraduate, graduate, and trade school students seeking financial assistance. The deadline for submitting completed applications and all supporting documents is June 30, 2025.

Susan Morrow, current Kirk Christian Education Moderator, reports that a total of \$27,200 of scholarship awards have been given through the Maack-Ormsbee Scholarship Fund since its inception in 2019 to 12 individuals. She explains that scholarship amounts vary, and funds are paid to a recipient's school as credit toward tuition.

To be considered for a Maack-Ormsbee scholarship, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Members/employees and families of members/employees of Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines, Hot Springs Village, AR with membership/employment for a minimum of Three (3) years.
- Proof of registration at an accredited State University/College. Presbyterian Church USA university or accredited Trade school
- 2 letters of recommendation.
- Minimum of 3.0 GPA

## Kirk members participate in University of Ozarks program

In February we reported on the Thriving in Ministry program at the University of the Ozarks. The Kirk continues to send delegates to these informative and interactive gatherings to share and observe how other fellow churches navigate their similar challenges. Recently, Wendy Gage and Ruth Hamilton participated in a two-day training event at the University of the Ozarks. The first seminar was about prayer. Wendy says, "The training was more prayer as just talking to God. The point was made that we don't need "Churchy Words". God wants us to be real in our love of him. I found this very enlightening."

The Second Seminar was about "Congregational Integration." Again, Wendy shares "It is not so much growing our member numbers but taking care of our current members. Taking care of the members we currently have will bring new members just by word of mouth and our members passing the word that we are a loving and caring church."


