### Kirk hosts superb Ozark Music Festival musicians

An enthusiastic crowd of 70 enjoyed an afternoon of beautiful and exciting chamber music in the Kirk sanctuary, performed by the faculty and students of the Ozark Music Festival on Saturday, June 21. The musicians played a varied program of 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> century composers, from Claude Debussy to two living American composers, Kevin Puts and Kenji Bunch.

The ensembles used unique combinations of instruments to the delight of the audience. The opening piece, *And Legions Will Rise*, by Kevin Puts, was offered by all faculty players on violin, clarinet, and marimba. The remainder of the program featured students from all over the U.S., each of whom auditioned to be accepted into the Festival.

And Legions Will Rise was commissioned by a Japanese newspaper in 2001. The composer says "It is about the power in all of us to transcend during times of tragedy and personal crisis." The unusual combination of instruments produced sounds that evoked grand vistas and intense emotions. The audience obviously liked it, offering the players a standing ovation.

The student players are participating in the inaugural Ozark Music Festival, which is a rebirth of what many of you knew as the Hot Springs Music Festival. (continued on pg. 2)



## In Memoriam


## Earl Smith Mulley, II

Earl Smith Mulley II, beloved husband, father, grandfather, brother and friend, passed away following a long illness on May 24, 2025, at the age of 91. He was born on August 1,1933 in Shreveport LA, to Harold and Martha (Johnson) Mulley. He was the oldest of four children: Earl, Jo Alice, Sylvia and Gilbert. Earl married Bette Wheeler in 1959 and they became the parents of four children: Barbara, Earl III, Thomas and Mary. His second marriage, to Barbara (Widenhouse) Wagner in 1987 added two stepsons, David and James Wagner to the now blended family.

In early childhood Earl was surrounded by extended family, grandparents, aunts and uncles, cousins. Of particular note was his cousin Lloyd Johnson, who was the same age and more like a twin than a cousin. When Earl was about 11 the family relocated to New Orleans, enticed by his father's love of music. It was a radical shift! He rode the city bus to high school (it cost a nickle), took piano lessons, played golf and was active in the youth group at Gentilly Presbyterian Church. He graduated from Warren Easton High School in 1951, in a school that was segregated by both race and gender.

After high school he enrolled at Tulane University, living at home and again riding the bus to classes. The influence of the pastor at his church convinced Earl and several of his classmates to attend seminary. However, his parents urged him to major in business, just in case! Graduating from Tulane in 1955, with that business major, he enrolled at Austin Theological Seminary, graduated and was ordained in 1959. He and his bride, moved to Bentonville, LA where he was pastor of the Presbyterian church. He discovered quickly that parish ministry was not his calling, packed up his growing family and decamped for New Jersey.

There he enrolled in a graduate program in theology at Princeton Theological Seminary, thinking that he might be better suited to teaching. Next, he accepted a position on the staff of the campus ministry at Rice University in Houston. He joined the staff of the Ecumenical Campus Ministry at Washington University in St. Louis in 1966 where he was intimately involved with student activities and counseling throughout the Vietnam era.



When the university discontinued support of campus ministry programs in the late 1970's Earl discovered that his parents were right. His next position was as CFO of the Arts and Education Council of Greater St. Louis until his retirement in 1993. Here he was able to continue his support and love for the arts and music.

Earl retired at age 60 and when Barbara retired in 1997, they moved to the Village and never looked back. Earl spent his retirement continuing his hobbies of creating beautiful stained-glass pieces and photography (taking, editing, printing, matting and framing). He loved going to the fitness center, playing golf and he discovered lawn bowling. He became an addict, eventually being President of the club as well as club champion.

He even enticed Barb into it and they won pairs championship three years running. He loved traveling, especially with Road Scholar groups. In 2017, as Earl's health declined, they moved to Good Samaritan Cedar Lodge.

Earl is survived by his wife, Barbara, his four children and two stepsons, his three siblings and a host of other family and friends. His passing leaves a deep void but his memory and the impact of his life will live on in the hearts of those who knew and loved him.

## Avoid "SCAMS" using these Lunch & Learn tips

Amy NcNeely, Manager at Regions Bank in Hot Springs Village, spoke on Scam Protection and Prevention at the Kirk Lunch & Learn on June 19<sup>th</sup>. Amy presented real life stories and actual cases including current techniques used by scamsters. Scams, phishing and various forms of identity theft seem to be a constant reality. How can we discriminate between the legitimate information requests and the scamsters?

Amy had some helpful Dos and Don'ts to consider for scam protection and prevention.

#### Amy's Don'ts include:

Do Not offer any sensitive information to any party if you did not initiate the request. This applies to email requests, text messages or phone calls. Do not respond or click or reply to any sensitive information requests. Instead, promptly contact the source from your contact list and make inquiries about the nature of the request to confirm as legitimate.

#### Amy's Dos include:

- Do Keep your Social Security card at home if possible.
- Do carry only one credit card if possible, instead of multiple cards
- Do place outgoing mail containing check payments or secure information in a collection box or at the post office.
- Do review your bank and credit card statements promptly to identify suspicious activity
- Do consider a shredder to dispose of sensitive personal information
- Do shop online but only with known merchants. Use a credit card instead of a debit card. Credit card liability for unauthorized charges is limited to \$50.
- Do use web pages that encrypt the credit card number. You should see "https" in the address, and the padlock should appear on the screen.
- Do report any incidents of identity theft to the proper authorities.

Using Amy's tips should minimize the persistent efforts of scamsters to gain access to private financial information. The goal is to be aware, alert and informed.

## Pastor's Corner


In a *Christian Century* column several years ago, John Buchanan, the former editor and retired Presbyterian minister, wrote about the things he misses about the pastorate in general and preaching in particular.

Buchanan quotes Barbara Brown Taylor (see, I'm not the only one who quotes her!) from her book, *Leaving Church*. "Being a priest seemed only slightly less dicey to me than being chief engineer at a nuclear plant. In both cases, one needed to know how to approach great power without loosing great danger and getting fried in the process."

Since that statement comes across as being a bit overstated, allow me to explain something, while letting you in on a trade secret: we preachers are wont to complain at times! I've done my share, I guess. So what do we do to compensate when we tend to feel sorry for ourselves and play the "woe is me" game? We look for the occasional compliment, especially when it comes to the sermon we have been laboring over all week.

Maybe we complain because "...the pastor lives and works close to the heat," Buchanan says. Then he reflects on Taylor's additional comment of, "the passion, tragedy, exultation, the pain, loss, and indescribable joy of human life." He goes on to say, "People invite us (pastors) into their lives at a level not accessible to anyone else. They tell us things they tell no one else, things we must never tell anyone (even our spouse), things we carry around the rest of our lives. They call us when they lose their jobs or a spouse dies... that they can't believe in God any longer, that their teenage daughter is doing cocaine. They want us at their bedside when they are critically ill and invite us into the most intimate space in all of life when life comes to an end."

That leads me to ask, what do we pastors get in return? Going back to Buchanan's comments about the pastor's life: "They (parishioners) turn

us into addicts with their post-worship compliments, and then devastate us with criticism when we're most vulnerable. They know our salaries, what kind of car we drive, and where we go on vacation." See, I told you preachers tend to complain!

But there's a trade-off. Buchanan again: "... remarkably, they (parishioners) also come week after week to sit quietly and listen to us talk. If there is a more astonishing fact and more unlikely honor, I cannot imagine what it might be."

It's a trade-off, to be sure. And my only response to that is... fair enough, fair enough.

# Native Arkansan, Woody White joins the Kirk


Woody White is a native Arkansan. He grew up in De Queen, Arkansas and was nurtured by the local Presbyterian Church. He was called "Little Woody" since his father's name was also Woody. Of interest is that he knew Kirk member Don Allison, who was a business owner in De Queen. Woody has moved to Hot Springs Village three different times, the first time in 1999 and his last move to the Village was in April of 2022.

Woody graduated from the University of Arkansas with majors in economics and accounting. He was a member of Sigma Chi social fraternity and was a cheerleader for two years. One of Woody's two daughters lives in Fayetteville and works at the University's law school. He also has a grandson who lives in Tulsa.

He was a CPA and spent twenty-five-years with the large accounting firm KPMG, the last fourteen years as an audit partner. During his tenure with KPMG, he lived in several locations including New York, Oklahoma, Hawaii and Louisiana.
