Disaster assistance finds a home at Ferncliff DAC

"There's kind of nothing that PW can't do." This is how our orientation to the Disaster Assistance Center (DAC) began. I wondered what Emily Hooker, Director of Mission and Outreach at Ferncliff meant. In this case, we were not a "PW" group. But it piqued my interest for what might be coming on our day trip to the Ferncliff DAC.

Most, like me, think of Ferncliff as a summer camp for kids or as a conference center for the Presbytery. But, I learned it is so much more. Starting in response to Hurricane Katrina, and with an interest in diversifying their mission, Ferncliff was identified as an ideal location for warehousing and staging disaster assistance. Over time the DAC, located on the "back 40" of the Ferncliff property, has become a major domestic distribution center for the area west of the Mississippi River.

The DAC, in fact, is one of only a few warehouses that operate through a partnership with Church World Service and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. DAC has a covenant partnership with those organizations, and receives supplies, kits, and other materials that have been assembled for rapid response to disasters. Kits are also assembled right in the DAC warehouse by a team of volunteers. After the kits are inspected (by volunteers) they're packed in uniform boxes ready for pickup and distribution.

Currently, the focus is on hygiene kits which have personal care supplies which is the most requested kit. There are also "kid" kits which include school supplies, flood cleanup kits including buckets, etc., and menstrual hygiene Church World Services handles kits. distribution to disaster areas. Sometimes Ferncliff doesn't even know where the kits are But increasingly, the DAC is also going. responding locally to needs of homeless shelters and in areas where there are incoming refugees and with low-income immigrants.

The Ferncliff DAC is funded through a variety of mechanisms. Some support comes from the Presbytery of Arkansas. They also receive some grant funding. Some of the undesignated donations to Ferncliff go to the DAC as well.

With only one paid employee, Emily, this program relies almost entirely on volunteer labor for assembling and checking of kits then packing them in uniform boxes for shipping. DAC relies on donated supplies to some extent but prefers to purchase supplies or obtain them from their covenant partners. Some funds are available through Presbyterian Church donations to purchase supplies for kits. Ferncliff can purchase supplies more cheaply and in bulk. Plus, there are specific requirements for the items in kits that must be met. So it is better for those who are interested to donate money rather than supplies.

Our Mission team including 9 Kirk members (and one Kirk friend) recently went to the Ferncliff DAC as part of a joint "Lunch and Learn" and Mission Committee effort. Our walk-through of the warehouse was an eye opener. Just the scale of the DAC is impressive. The warehouse was filled with boxes of kits and bulk donations from various organizations. Decorated ceiling tiles in the kit assembly space record the names of many teams that have come through their packing and checking workspace.

After training, we were tasked with checking hygiene kits that had been preassembled. All in all, our team checked and packed 480 kits! I think Emily was impressed with our efficiency and camaraderie. We even learned that the DAC could work with our Missions Committee to organize a kit assembly day at the Kirk at some future date!

So, what does PW have to do with it, that is, the DAC? Thanks to Presbyterian Women funding, the DAC was able to purchase a much-needed truck, christened "Boxanne", for pickup and delivery of supplies and aid. For our team the trip to DAC was an unforgettable day of learning, serving, and fellowship. *Contributed by Bob Morrow, Communications Committee Moderator*

Caring for our brothers and sisters

Serving on the Pastor Nominating Committee is a great honor. My fellow committee members are a joy to be and work with. Our task is challenging, but our motivation is keen. Our many conversations are stimulating and revealing.

To that last point, I've been prompted to reconsider the meaning of being Christian during the last several months, greatly, because the committee's topics of discussion have included the meaning of scripture passages, the nature of church polity, the centrality of faith in all that we do, and so much more.

At one meeting, I referred to an admonition my ethics professor at the Lutheran Theological Seminary shared with me and my fellow seminarians decades ago. Dr. William Lazareth was clear and bold in saying that when the Lutheran Church devolved to being nothing more than a Nordic Alumni Association, it would cease to be the church of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Dr. Lazareth's statement has resonated loudly for me since that morning in 1971. I believe his words weren't intended to diminish the value of fellowship, but rather to say that our social time together should only strengthen and embolden us to greater servanthood.

I'm reminded of the commitment of a gentleman who serves as an important example for me. His is a living, breathing embodiment of the Bible verse from Deuteronomy 15:7-11, "If among you, one of your brothers should become poor...you shall not harden your heart or shut your hand against your poor brother, but you shall open your hand to him and lend him sufficient for his need." This individual came to the conclusion that he simply wasn't "putting his money where his faith was," and so he found a new way to express it.

His path may not be remarkable, but it's worth noting. He told his family that because his was a fine and secure life, he did not wish to receive gifts on his birthday or at Christmas. Rather, he asked his family to give, as they chose, to organizations that assisted the poor, the needy, and the mistreated. He truly believes that the greatest gift he can receive is to know that the downtrodden are cared for, and

that he just might be an instrument of good.

I have taken notes. Simply do what is right and good, and always put others ahead of myself. Therein lies the power of the Gospel message.

LuDean Walston



Shepherd Groups provide camaraderie, support, and good food!

The Kirk Shepherd Groups have been around nearly as long as the Kirk itself. Our first pastor, Reverend Ernie Smith, created them in early 1980s. The Kirk was rapidly growing, and Rev. Smith wanted a way for members and newcomers to get to know each other more personally.

Smith formed the groups by drawing names out of a bowl. Each lasted for two years, then the bowl was brought out again. There were many groups initially. The two-year policy remains still and this year the groups are due to change. There was one group named "The Black Sheep" that refused to disband. Ask Dottie Rector about that...

In addition to social connections, the purpose of the groups was and still is to:

- Provide an avenue of prayer for each other on a regular basis
- Provide a communications network for emergencies to ensure each member was notified
- Help the church minister to those in need with transportation, food, etc.
- Assist the pastor by informing them of illness or other issues requiring their attention
- Provide a meal to families of a former member who gather for their loved one's memorial service.

Each of the original groups had a leader and together with the members each decided what they preferred to do together. Previously, one group took an overnight trip to Mountain Home where they dined, listened to music and embarked on a scenic train ride. Another popular activity was to attend an evening Traveler's game in Little Rock.

Today, there are 5 Shepherd Groups. As the church membership itself has aged and become smaller so have the groups. The original sorting bowl has been put away. Now members choose their own group(s), often by their meeting schedule. Currently, all of the groups meet for a meal at a local restaurant. As Jean Fisher, the current Lead Shepherd has said "Those that dine together share more than a meal".

A different group member chooses the restaurant and coordinates the meeting each month. Comments from members of the groups include:

"Nothing like friendly, good conversation over a tasty meal" one Group 3 participant commented. Another commented "we like the mix of Saturday night and Sunday participants that we don't usually see."

Group leadership isn't difficult. It involves coordinating the members once or twice a year to sign up to host a dinner or activity, making sure the word gets out, and keeping track of members in need.

Loved my neighbor (who's a #\$\$%^^&&#**) Treated people fairly this week regardless of race and social status


Late to church because I stopped to help a stranded mother and child

All in all, we were in contact with over 50 people. It was a wonderful way to reach out and touch missing members of our church family and let them, or their family, know we still have a place in our heart for them and that we pray for them as they continue their journey with Christ, our Lord.
