

Missions Committee shares your gifts locally and beyond

The approach of the Lenten season is a good time to remember the apostle Paul's reminder in Romans 12:13. "Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality". The Presbyterian Kirk in the Pines congregational community has wholeheartedly embraced this in your generous sharing through our Missions Committee. Since in our church the allocation of support to the various agencies requesting our help is left totally up to the Missions Committee, we want you to know that we take the responsibility of distributing the gifts you have donated prayerfully and with a great sense of gratitude.

Led by Moderator Judith Rosenthal, the committee's work in 2025 was supported by the following members: Becky Wakefield (secretary), Vicki Rosenquist, Daryl Henry, Marcia Bauer, Priscilla Hayek, Richard McPheters, Bob Morrow, and Norma Stevens. Traditionally, fifteen percent of the Kirk's total annual budget is earmarked for mission giving. Last year this money funded 26 different mission programs or agencies and the funds were provided from one or more of six Session approved fund accounts. These are the Congregational Mission Fund, \$1.00 Mission Fund, the Endowment Fund, the Luke 12:48 Endowment Fund, the International Mission Fund, and the Special Projects Fund.

We'd like you to know how your generous gifts were distributed. Altogether \$45,200 was allocated to the Missions Committee's budget for 2025. Additional donations raised this figure to \$50,740, and this was the amount distributed to missions and agencies



In 2025 the Missions Committee led the Kirk wide collection of peanut butter and cereal honoring Father's Day. Thanks to your generosity 555 jars of peanut butter and 301 boxes of cereal were collected for local agencies. These included Ferncliff, Ouachita Children's Center, Vera Lloyd Presbyterian Family Services, Samaritan Ministries, Presbyterian Disaster Relief, Meals on Wheels, Jackson House, Project Hope Food Bank, Cooperative Christian Ministries and Clinics, the C.A.L.L, and Potter's Clay.

As in 2024, the committee continued its focus on food, shelter, and health with additional emphasis on disaster relief. And what about the mission dollars collected in the offering plate each Sunday? These \$1.00 Mission funds totaled \$2600.00 and went in equal amounts to Lyon College, The University of the Ozarks, Frontier Fellowship, Presbytery of Arkansas, West End Presbyterian Church, Ferncliff, Vera Lloyd, and the Medical Benevolence Foundation. International Fund dollars (totaling \$1700.00) went to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Solar Under the Sun, and Living Waters of the World. The Luke 12:48 endowment funds are directed to both the Missions and Christian Education committees. In 2025, Mission's directed Luke 12:48 endowment funds were equally divided between Vera Lloyd and Ferncliff.

We want you to know that the Missions Committee distributed all of your gifts to those organizations representing our brothers and sisters in need. All of the recipients expressed heart felt gratitude for your loving generosity. Those who serve on the Missions Committee are deeply grateful to be able to faithfully share the love of God expressed through your gifts with the agencies in our community. We want to thank Judith Rosenthal for her years of service as Moderator and look forward to the leadership of Richard McPheters as Moderator for 2026.

The amount of money that members of the Kirk donates to missions is amazing for a church of our size. Our hopes and prayers are always that your gifts will find their way to those who are in greatest need.

Pastor's Corner


Each year, the PCUSA produces a work calendar designed to aid clergy, as well as other staff and lay leaders, with their planning. I've used this calendar for several years since my introduction to Presbyterian life and have found it to be quite useful.

The calendar includes a theme for the year. I confess that in the past I have paid little attention to that portion of the calendar, but my eye was drawn to this year's offering. The theme is *Wholeness*. "This concept," the editors explain, "deeply rooted in Scripture and the Reformed tradition, invites us to live as disciples of Jesus in ways that foster completeness and connection."

"In the Bible," the calendar continues, "wholeness often appears as *shalom* in Hebrew and *eirene* (eye-ray-nay) in Greek, both typically translated as 'peace.' Yet this peace is far more than the absence of conflict. It is about right relationships – with one another, with God, within our communities and with ourselves. It's the healing and restoration of relationships, systems, and societies that reflect God's justice and love. Jesus, often referred to as the Prince of Peace – Prince of shalom – embodies what wholeness looks like in action."

The calendar editors ask, "Where do you already see glimpses of shalom around you? How might God be inviting you to extend and deepen shalom? As you plan, pray, and dream, may your work and play reflect and refract God's kingdom come, on earth as it is in heaven."

We seek to do just that as we anticipate the season of Lent, which begins Ash Wednesday, February 18 with our traditional midweek service at 11:00. Once again, layfolk from our church will be the speakers for the weekly services that follow, using the theme *Lent in Plain Sight*, based on a book by Jill J. Duffield.


Weekly Lenten services and lunches to begin Ash Wednesday, February 18th

Weekly Lenten services, a longstanding tradition at the Kirk, start on Ash Wednesday, February 18th, at 11:00 a.m. The Ash Wednesday service includes a moving ceremony of imposition of ashes. The Wednesday services, ending on March 25th, will be held in the sanctuary and following the service, as in previous years, there will be our traditional soup and bread luncheon in Bailey Hall.

Lenten reflections will be shared by Pastor Hyde and by members of our congregation. This marks the third year of this tradition, started in 2024 when we didn't have a pastor to lead our Lenten worship. Pastor Hyde writes, "Our theme for these services is "Lent in Plain Sight," based on the book of the same name by Jill J. Duffield, former editor of Presbyterian Outlook. She uses "plain" objects or subjects for each week of Lent, and we will do the same, though not in her order." A list of worship leaders for each week will be forthcoming.

If you would like to enhance your Lent meditations by reading *Lent in Plain Sight*, you can order the book through Amazon or other book vendors. An audio version of the book is available on Audible.

Also, if you plan to attend the lunch following our Lenten service, please fill out the form found in the worship bulletin and place it in the collection plate so we will know how many tables to set up. Also, indicate on the form if you can bring soup or bread.



We encourage you to come and enjoy a hot bowl of soup as we reflect on the meaning of this season of Lent.

Legacy gifts have major impact on the Kirk


