
Our Spiritual Home We cultivate, challenge and live our faith in Christ through



Our History

Holy Spirit Parish has a long and distinguished history in Missoula.

In 1870, nineteen years before Montana became a state, Bishop Daniel Tuttle arrived in Missoula and held the town's first Protestant worship services. During the same trip he purchased a lot that became Holy Spirit Parish's first home.

With the completion of the Northern Pacific Railroad in 1883, Missoula experienced rapid growth. Holy Spirit Parish grew along with the town and served as the spiritual home of many of Missoula's prominent early citizens. In 1914 the Holy Spirit Vestry voted to purchase the current church site and the cornerstone of the new building, taken from the church's original foundation, was laid on August 22, 1915.

In the early 1930s a number of memorials enabled furniture upgrades and the installation of stained glass windows, designed by the

famed glass maker Charles

J. Connick, resulting in the

beautiful church we see

today.

Over the last century, Holy Spirit Parish has evolved, as the needs of our Parish and our community changed. From its current location within easy walking distance of Missoula's downtown and the University of Montana, Holy Spirit Parish continues to grow, to enhance our facilities, and engage in social outreach throughout the Missoula community and beyond.
