**1** Ecclesiastes says there is a time for things, not that we get to choose the time. Where do you most resist that distinction in your own life?

**1** The sermon suggested that waiting is not the absence of God, but often the place where God is working most deeply. What makes that hard for you to believe or trust?

**2** Ecclesiastes says God has “set eternity in the human heart,” yet we cannot see the whole story. How do you experience that tension between longing for meaning and living with partial understanding?

**3** Paul speaks of “the fullness of time” as something God is bringing about. How is that different from the way we usually think about timing in our own lives?

**4** The sermon claimed that Christ is not God’s Plan B, but the meaning of time itself. If that were truly how you saw your life, what might change about how you interpret delays or disappointments?

**5** We often only recognize patterns in hindsight. How does that reality challenge the pressure we put on ourselves to understand what God is doing right now?

**6** The sermon ended with the image of having “enough light for the next step.” Where in your life do you want more clarity than you’ve been given—and what would it look like to trust God with the light you have?
