



Hebrews 5:11-14 *Dad's Romulan Sn-Ale*

- 1 → Most of us were trained, somewhere along the way, to treat hearing from God as the main sign of spiritual health—the prompting, the sign, the "I felt led." Where did you pick up that version of faith? Who taught it to you?
- 2 → Think about how most people around you actually talk about "knowing God's will." Is the emphasis usually on getting better at receiving instructions, or on becoming a different kind of person? Which one does the language in your own head default to? Why?
- 3 → Has what was said this week landed on you personally — has your faith actually produced discernment, or has it mostly produced a longer list of things you need someone else to confirm for you? Be specific about one decision from the last year where this showed up.
- 4 → Hebrews 5:12 says the readers should have been teachers by now, but still needed someone to explain the basics — again. Where in your own life have you been circling the same lesson for years without it ever turning into something you could hand to somebody else?
- 5 → Romans 8:29 says the goal is being conformed, not informed. If you're honest, which one have you actually been chasing — more information, more verses, more answers — or the slower work of becoming someone different? What would change about your week if conformed were really the target?
- 6 → Galatians 4:19 is about Christ being formed in you like a child is formed — slowly, over time, no shortcuts. Is there part of your character right now you know hasn't finished forming? What's kept it from forming?
- 7 → Ephesians 5:1-2 says we're called to imitate God the way a loved child imitates a parent — not by following a list, but by watching long enough to absorb something a list could never provide. Who have you watched closely enough, for long enough, that you've started doing what they'd do without being told? What did that imitation cost them, to make it worth imitating?
- 8 → John 15:15 — Jesus tells his closest followers he no longer calls them servants, but friends, because friends understand purpose instead of just taking orders. Where in your walk with God do you still operate like a servant waiting for the next instruction, rather than a friend who's starting to understand what He's after?
- 9 → This message wasn't against hearing from God — guidance still has its place. But most of life isn't a mission moment; it's everyday faithfulness: telling the truth, keeping your word, forgiving someone, walking humbly. Which one of those is the part of God's will you already know, but haven't actually been doing? Why?
- 10 → **EXTRA CREDIT:** Picture the version of you ten years from now who has actually learned your Father's heart well enough that the instructions have mostly become unnecessary. What's one thing that the future version of you does instinctively that the current you still has to be told to do?
