

Luke 19:1-10 The Grumble Behind the Gospel

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①→ Why does Luke deliberately echo Israel's wilderness muttering in Jericho's crowd, and what does that reveal about how the human heart resists grace?

2→ Why does grace always feel unfair to those who think they've earned more, and how have you personally felt the sting of that "unfairness"?

3→ From Jonah sulking outside Nineveh to the older brother sulking outside the feast, why do God's people so often become barriers instead of witnesses?

4 → Jesus insists, "I must stay at your house today." How does that divine necessity — the same word Luke later ties to the cross — change the way we understand grace?

5→ What does the difference between muttering outside Zacchaeus' house and the transformation inside teach us about where the miracle really happens?

6→ Who would shock you if Jesus went home with them, and what does that discomfort expose about your own scorecards?

→ When grace waves someone forward you wouldn't, do you celebrate with heaven, or mutter with the crowd? And how does your answer shape the kind of church we are becoming?
