- 1 → Think about the last thing that pulled a crowd without anyone organizing it, a song, a moment, a person. What was it about that thing that made people show up on their own?

- 2 → Jesus wept over Jerusalem before he ever confronted what was wrong with it (Luke 19:41). What does it look like when correction comes from love instead of being finished with someone or something?

- 3 → Be honest about where you actually are right now: is more of your life with Jesus running on obligation, or on something closer to wanting to be there? What's one specific place in your week where you could actually test the difference, rather than just assume the better answer?

- 4 → "Hung on his words" describes suspended attention, nothing left over for anywhere else (Luke 19:48). When's the last time you gave Jesus, or anything about your faith, that kind of attention without being asked to?

- 5 → Familiarity can deepen love, or it can quietly replace it with something that only looks like love — attendance, habit, the motions without the magnetism. How would you actually know which one you're in, and who besides you would be able to tell?

- 6 → Jesus said what the temple was supposed to be before he said what it had become (Luke 19:46). Where might that order — vision before critique — change how you talk to someone about what's wrong in their life, or your own?

- 7 → **EXTRA CREDIT:** If someone watched your last week without you narrating it, would they be able to tell what pulled you toward it, obligation, or something closer to delight?
