①→ Everyone has a number: that point where someone's used up their last chance with you. Where does that number actually come from: hurt, exhaustion, or something else you haven't named yet?

①→ We tend to call cutting someone off "wisdom" or "boundaries." When is that true, and when is it just being done, dressed up in better language?

①→ Think of someone you've stopped extending trust to. What would it cost you to send one more — and is that cost the real reason you stopped, or is something else driving it?

①→ The tenants in the story got away with more each time, until taking everything looked reasonable. Where has "getting away with it" quietly moved your own line without you noticing?

①→ What was said suggested God's patience doesn't run on our math. Where have you assumed there's a limit to God's patience with you? How would you actually know if you're wrong?

①→ It's easier to admire the owner's patience from a distance than to notice we're usually the tenants. Where have you recently taken more and given less, without calling it that?

①→ There's a real difference between a boundary that's wise and a stopping point that's just self-protection wearing wisdom's clothes. How do you tell which one you're standing behind right now?

①→ If God sent you "the next one" this week, another opening, another door held out, would you recognize it, or would you already have your reasons for why it's too late? Discuss.

①→ **EXTRA CREDIT:** Name one person you've quietly written off. What would it look like this week to leave the door open a crack, without pretending the past didn't happen?
