RLC Joins a 2 -Year Learning Cohort Program Through Augusburg University

The Riverside Innovation Hub Team will be starting its work with Augsburg University this fall. This is a two year program where we will partner with folks at Augsburg in order to learn how to be and become a public church. To quote the folks at Augsburg, "A public church is a local congregation active in mutual relationships with its neighborhood and neighbors in ways that promote the well-being and thriving of the larger community. This looks like neighbors experiencing "good news" - Christ's love, resurrection, hope, reconciliation - in ways that truly matter to their daily lives. A public church does this together in its location so its people can also learn to do this in their locations of family, neighborhood, work, etc."

Being a part of this program will help us here at RLC by helping us to focus on what we want to do in our community. It will help us to learn about and from our neighbors and our neighborhood so that we can love our neighbors better-just as we are called to do by Christ. We will learn what the bad news is for our neighbors and what we can do to displace that bad with good. TIME TO MOVE


We know that sometimes children just need an opportunity to stretch their legs! Watch for these times in worship where they can do just that:



LEGACY GIVING AT ROSEVILLE **LUTHERAN CHURCH**

Did you know you can leave a Legacy Gift to the RLC Endowment Fund in your estate plan? Including your church home in your estate plan can extend your ministry passion for future generations.

In the 1970s, members and friends of Roseville Lutheran Church began an endowment fund to help enhance and extend the ministries and outreach of the congregation. Over time the fund has grown primarily through individual donations and planned estate gifts, memorials and proceeds from the Love Light sales each year. While the principal of gifts remain in the Fund in perpetuity, the earnings are distributed as grants twice annually.

Since 2005, the Fund has distributed over \$230,000 in grants. Grants are awarded for seed money, education, capital projects, missions, benevolence, worship and music. With each contribution, donors have left a legacy and entrusted their dollars to help meet the future needs of RLC and our community.

THE WORK OF OUR CHILDREN

"God's work, our hands" is quite a powerful statement. Our hands can do many things in this world, and being a representative of the work God is doing is even more powerful. Upon hearing this, I think about the hands of the youngest members of our congregation. I think about how many times they are being told their hands cannot do as much as those who are older than them, that they need to 'wait until they are older'.

While there are some things that

are simply not safe 'work' for children, there are plenty of other things they are able to do, and we don't give them enough credit for the things they do.



When I was working in the Roseville School District, I worked with a 5th grade student who constantly was trying to push my buttons. He knew the exact ways to do it too! I was about at the end of my rope when I noticed something he was doing when he thought no one was watching. He sat down next to a 1st grade student who was struggling with reading. He walked with him as he was reading a new story. He himself was still trying to fully grasp reading, but stopped to help this student.

This is the work our children are doing. This beautiful work shows kindness, inclusivity, and the love of Christ. I think it is something we all should strive to be not just at church but in our community as well. I love working with our children. The things they are constantly teaching me far outweigh the things I could teach them. We all have something to learn about the work the youngest members of our congregation are doing!

NEW CRASH COURSE

WED. NIGHTS FOR GRADES 2-4 (+) STARTS OCT.4

This fall we are starting a new opportunity for children called Crash Course! This will be an hour and a half long time for children to come with a parent to learn the ins and outs of a specific topic through teaching time and a fun activity. Then we'll gather with Confirmation together students to have supper all together afterward. The first Crash Course is on Wednesday, Oct. 4 at 5:00 pm - so mark your calendars and be there - you won't want to miss it! Intended ages for the Crash Course will be 2nd - 4th grade, but other grades are welcome if they are interested.

GROWING OUT OF OUR COMFORT ZONE

Thedrivetowork, biking through your neighborhood, walking into the office, how often do you really notice what's around you. Often we are on autopilot. Did you see anything new today? What about the spaces around you, have you really stopped and taken a look lately. Does it look exciting and inviting? Or does it look old, worn and comfortable?

I recently had the opportunity to meet with two individuals in the preschool field. I had invited them into our classrooms. The women visited at two separate times and did not know each other. The meetings were both energetic and uplifting, but they both left me feeling perplexed, with lots to think about. They both asked me questions about our space. You see they were looking at it with new eyes, looking at it from a different or fresh perspective. They both made me aware of things that we could no longer see, because we had become too comfortable in our space.





After they left I walked through the classrooms trying to see what they were seeing. Looking with new eyes, trying to see it with a fresh perspective. I realized that while it worked, it seemed slightly tired and comfortable like an old pair of running shoes. Yes, they did the trick. They keep my feet warm and dry, but running the race in them just wasn't going to give me my best effort, or time. Perhaps it was time to really take a look at what was in our spaces and how we were using it. Does it need to be refreshed? I continued walking through the space with new eyes, their questions in my thoughts. Yes the preschool is a mission of the church, God's work but were we really using it to the best of our ability?

Are we being the best stewards of our resources? I have been working closely with CYF and really forming a partnership with Pastors Marty and Tori and working closely with Jenna. It truly feels like we are becoming the best ministry together for our kids. We decided that merging our supplies would benefit us all. By merging the supplies, it meant that the storage of preschool materials would not be in the classroom taking up valuable space. By merging our materials and supplies, we would better know what was available and reduce spending.

Then it was time to roll up our sleeves and really take a look at the space – was it inviting? Was it the best arrangement for the little humans that we will be helping to succeed?

We also took a hard look at the programs that we were offering our preschool/preK families. While it had worked wonderfully for a long time, much like those old worn out shoes, it was comfortable. The short day still worked for many but what about those who wanted a longer day in a Christian program. It was time to take a leap of faith and expand our program hours available to our families and the community. The response has been fabulous. We are still offering the half day, with slightly longer hours but now are also offering a full day option.

God's hard at work guiding us in these changes. While we could have continued running in those worn out comfortable shoes, I believe that it is in the uncomfortable that we change and grow. It's important to lean in and take a good hard look at what's going on around you. It's hard to give up those comfortable old shoes, they're familiar, you know what to expect. If you get new shoes, they might feel tight, a little bit uncomfortable like growing pains, you might even get a blister or two from the change, but when you cross the finish line and your time is a little bit faster than before, you will be able to say it was all worth it.



SEPT. 18: The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics by Daniel James Brown (one of Bud Helmen's favorite books!) The unforgettable story of the underdog rowing team from the University of Washington that beats the odds by defeating the elite teams from the East Coast and Great Britain, and then goes on to shock the world by competing for the Olympic Gold Medal against the highly-favored German team rowing for Adolf Hitler. We're reading this one to honor the memory of the legendary Bud Helmen. (2014, 432 pgs)

OCT. 16: The Bluest Eye by Toni Morrison October is "Banned Book Month", so we're celebrating by reading one of America's top five banned books. Set in a small town near Cleveland, Ohio in 1940-41, this is Morrison's first novel. Her main character is an 11-year-old girl who prays for her eyes to turn blue so she will be considered "beautiful". Written in an innovative style with nontraditional structure, the story deals with the difficult topics of racial prejudice, sexual assault, and abuse, while asking challenging questions about the nature of beauty and its place in a manipulative society. If you've already read it, read it again, and if you haven't read it, don't miss it! (2007, 224 pgs) (suggested by Bob Bergstrom)

NOV. 20: Together: The Healing Power of Human Connection in a Sometimes Lonely World by Vivek Murthy As the current Surgeon General of the United States, Dr. Murthy is very aware of the public health concerns facing us. In this new book, he describes loneliness as a deadly epidemic and offers solutions and strategies to overcome it. Reviewers have called this "the most important book you'll read this year". "It's fascinating, moving, and essential reading, and it will help make the world a better place for everyone. Read it, then pass it on." (2023, 352 pgs) (suggested by Alice Neve)

JAN. 15: (MLK Day, but we'll still be meeting) We Will Be Free: The Life and Faith of Sojourner Truth by Nancy Koester. Local ELCA pastor and historian Nancy Koester "chronicles the spiritual journey of Sojourner Truth as an enslaved woman, a working mother, a preacher, and activist." This is a fascinating look at the life of the legendary abolitionist and how her strong faith in God drove her actions. With some states today denying the legacy of slavery and segregation, this life of Sojourner Truth inspires us and reminds us of her courage and passion for justice. (2023, 293 pgs) (suggested by Nancy Olson)

FEB. 19: (Presidents' Day, but we'll still be meeting) Poverty, By America by Matthew Desmond This was named one of the most anticipated books of 2023 by several major publications, and it's easy to see why. Desmond unflinchingly answers the question: Why does the United States have more poverty than any other advanced democracy? The acclaimed sociologist shows how affluent Americans knowingly and unknowingly keep poor people poor. "Elegantly written and fiercely argued, this compassionate book gives us new ways of thinking about this morally urgent problem, and helps us imagine solutions." (2023, 304 pgs) (suggested by Dave and Karen Dudley)

MARCH 18: Solito: A Memoir by Javier Zamora Named one of the best books of the year by several reviewers and winner of multiple awards, Solito will immerse you in the migrant experience like no other book. Nine-year-old Javier takes a harrowing 3,000-mile trek from his small town in El Salvador, through Guatemala and Mexico, and into the United States. Traveling to be reunited with his parents, he's alone on this two-month journey with a group of strangers, facing pointed guns, arrests, and dangerous desert crossings. Javier's treacherous trip also reveals unexpected kindness and love in this gripping memoir. The LA Times says, "You will be changed by this extraordinary book." (2023, 416 pgs) (suggested by Dana Ochocki)

APRIL 15: Disability Visibility: First Person Stories from the 21st Century edited by Alice Wong With 37 powerful narratives by people living with a disability, Alice Wong shows us the depth of everyday courage and their extraordinary capacity to face life's adversities. 15% of people around the world have a disability, yet their stories are rarely told. This collection celebrates and documents the lived experiences, power, and culture of the diverse disabled community. This book will educate and inspire you. (2020, 336 pgs) (suggested by Paula Olander)

MAY 20: We Should Not Be Friends: The Story of a Friendship by Will Schwalbe This is a "warm, funny, irresistible memoir that follows an improbable and lifechanging college friendship over the course of forty years." Will is an artsy Latin and Greek major who avoids "the jocks" at his college, but somehow he meets Maxie, the school's star wrestler and ultimate jock. The two form an unlikely friendship that takes them through marriages, divorce, triumphs, and devastating losses. This book tracks their challenges and changes over the years, and artfully shows us how we may find some of our greatest friends if we can just get over our preconceptions. (2023, 336 pgs).

We've got some exciting plans for this fall and winter. Here's what's coming up soon:

Oct. 15 Adult Ed: Pastor Dave Wangaard will discuss LIRS' latest efforts to build a Welcome Center in Guatemala which will serve those who are denied asylum in the U.S. and returned to the country. Immersion Experience in El Paso

with travelers from Edina Community Lutheran

In February, ten people from Edina Community Lutheran Church traveled to El Paso for an immersion experience with Iglesia Luterana Cristo Rey, an ELCA congregation. Immersed in powerful stories from those with first-hand experience--escaping violence or poverty, crossing the dangerous Darien

Gap between Columbia and Panama, being separated from family members, living in fear of being apprehended without documentation, and of trauma they've endured—we tried to understand the dimensions of our immigration system. People reached safety through the compassion of organizations, churches, and individuals assisting them. Intermingled with the stories were visits to refugee shelters, observing criminal court, going to the fence, meeting with a Border Patrol agent, and talking with an immigration attorney. It was a transformational learning experience. We were inspired by the determination, resiliency, faith, love, and generous spirit of those we met.

OCTOBER 29, NOVEMBER 5 Christian Nationalism: A Review, Update, and Conversation with Pastor Rolf Olson

In February of 2022, Pastor Rolf and Dr. Nancy Koester presented a well-received overview of Christian Nationalism. It is a political movement which uses Christian terms and symbols to achieve its goal of power. Behind it is a rewriting of American history, twisting our Founders into right-wing Fundamentalist Christians rather than the Deists they were. Because of the encouraging reception Olson and Koester received at Roseville Lutheran they then continued to make presentations—over 25 so far. Because Christian Nationalism is a growing movement fraught with danger



to both democracy and faith, Pastor Olson will give an update and lead us in conversation on how we can respond. If you wish to prepare for these sessions, he suggests reading The Power Worshippers by Katherine Stewart.

NOVEMBER 12 Discussing Difficult Decisions with Dr. Jeffrey Nelson

Dr. Jeff Nelson will discuss abortion, religious freedom, and difficult decisions using the key concepts from his book *What Should I Do?* Even in normal pregnancy, there is the risk of death for the woman. That risk increases in a variety of situations. Dr. Nelson will review the Supreme Court decision of Dobbs v. Jackson and its effect on all the above. Does God think that all abortions are wrong as some Christians believe? Dr. Nelson will explain the concept of pro-choice pro-life and how that impacts our nation that was founded on freedom of religion. 
Advent has been part of the church calendar since medieval times. We will examine what Advent has meant to Lutherans through the years. Spoiler alert:

RLC ORGAN TASK FORCE UPDATE

It has been a busy time for the Organ Task Force. While evaluating organ builders, the Task Force travelled to New Ulm in late May to hear the pipe organ at Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Cathedral that the J.F. Nordlie Pipe Organ company restored and installed. On June 8, four Task Force members visited St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Birmingham, Alabama to evaluate the Holtkamp #1762 pipe organ that will be gifted to RLC. The people from St. Luke's are excited for their own organ project which includes a new, larger Casavant pipe organ and are happy their current Holtkamp organ will continue to serve at RLC. It is a win-win for both congregations and we look forward to the potential of an on-going relationship with St. Luke's.

The Task Force evaluated bids from three organ builders and requested revised bids from two of them. The Organ Task Force unanimously voted to recommend J.F. Nordlie Pipe Organ Company of Sioux Falls, South Dakota as the builder of choice for RLC's organ project. Their proposed rebuilt organ will combine the tonal resources of the Holtkamp #1762 with some of the best pipework of our current Möller organ. This will preserve and make use of the craft and art of three generations of pipe-makers, voicers, and builders, saving 35% over a brand-new pipe organ of similar size. The outcome will be a balanced, colorful instrument that will give our organists more options and flexibility. The Task Force is confident the proposed stop list and initial conversations about design, console, and tonal concept will result in a beautiful, unique new instrument for RLC and the Twin Cities region.

An investment in a pipe organ may seem like an indulgence in a luxury item, however there is nothing more central to the life and health of the church as worship. Music and singing allow our hearts to speak to God. An upgraded pipe organ will demonstrate our mission to love God and love our neighbor through our music and united song. It will serve in our regular worship life and enhance our worship center for generations to come as a place for music performance – concerts, recitals, hymn festivals – reaching out to a wider and more diverse community with a message of grace, hope and joy in Christ.

A project update will be presented at the Adult Education session on September 24, 2023.
