The celebration of the season of Advent, beginning four Sundays before Christmas day, dates back to the 4^{th} century AD. It's a time that focuses our attention on Christ's first coming as well as His second coming when He will return to redeem His creation and rule with all power and authority. We are to be reminded that we do not know the day or the hour of Christ's return, and we are filled with both a sense of joyful expectation and humble reverence, with our spiritual focus being on lives of prayer and preparation.

Advent literally means "coming" or "arrival" and teaches us to expect Jesus as the long-awaited King, His salvation, and the final judgment of the world.

As we look forward to celebrating Christ's birth, we all know grief, loss, and longing. We come to the manger realizing that the world is as cold as stone, that feelings of loneliness and loss overwhelm, and that our hearts cry out: "Come, Lord Jesus! Wipe away every tear! Make all things new!"

Tonight's worship service leads us to lament the losses experienced in this broken world and **look expectantly in hope to Jesus**, the Desire of every nation, the true Joy of every longing heart.

Our great God, we lament the loss of loved ones who are now absent in our gatherings with family and friends. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament the loss of broken relationships that bring grief and heartache in our homes. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament the loss of health in those we love and in our own weak bodies. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament with those that have lost loved ones in death due to violence, leaving widows and orphans in grief. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament with those who have lost jobs and face economic hardship. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament the lives of unborn children lost through abortion and miscarriages. **Lord,** hear our prayer.

We lament with those who have experienced grief and pain through racial tension, violence, conflict, and discrimination. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament with the poor and the oppressed, for the unemployed and the destitute, for prisoners and captives. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament hearts that have known confusion and condemnation. **Lord, hear our prayer.**

We lament with the weary, the rejected, the lonely, and the fearful. **Lord, hear our prayer**.

The people can add their own cries for God to meet them in their longings, and for Christ to come and set things right.
