

A Worship Discussion Guide for Individuals, Groups & Families for the week of March 17, 2024

Read the Bible passage aloud in your group meeting. This is a worship discussion guide, and our reflections and applications are grounded in Scripture. You do not need to work through the whole guide. Decide which points would be most helpful for your meeting, and use them as a starting point for your time together.

Warm Up

What is something you do (or do not do), simply because you believe that Jesus is alive?

I Corinthians 15:29-34

²⁹ Now if there is no resurrection, what will those do who are baptized for the dead? If the dead are not raised at all, why are people baptized for them? ³⁰ And as for us, why do we endanger ourselves every hour? ³¹ I face death every day—yes, just as surely as I boast about you in Christ Jesus our Lord. ³² If I fought wild beasts in Ephesus with no more than human hopes, what have I gained? If the dead are not raised,

"Let us eat and drink, for tomorrow we die."

³³ Do not be misled: "Bad company corrupts good character." ³⁴ Come back to your senses as you ought, and stop sinning; for there are some who are ignorant of God—I say this to your shame.

- Verse 29 is notoriously difficult to understand. We do not know why or how the Corinthians were practicing baptism for those who have died, but it is clear that Paul saw their practice as an expression of hope in the resurrection from the dead. Without the resurrection, hope in the future becomes pointless. What is one thing you look forward to simply because Jesus Christ is risen?
- Paul is convinced that Jesus Christ is "Lord" (31). What exactly is Paul declaring about Jesus? What freedom do we know when we believe that Jesus is Lord?

The Present Significance of the Resurrection

- Without the resurrection, Paul points out that our suffering and faithfulness would be pointless (30-33). However, since Christ is risen, we are granted strength and perseverance. Can you share a way God gives you strength to endure because Jesus lives?
- Why is it sin to deny the resurrection of Jesus Christ? (34)
- To be human is to struggle with cynicism and meaninglessness. Paul quotes <u>Isaiah</u>
 22:13 to exemplify the purposelessness of those struggles. Can you share about a time Jesus offered you His hope to lead you out of a dark season?
- Reflect on this week's passage together, and use it as a guide for a time of prayer.
