Elizabeth Maynard

A child of military and State Department parents, I was born in Thailand and grew up in the United States, Indonesia, and Brazil. I completed undergraduate studies at Occidental College, and graduate degrees in education and psychology at the University of Georgia and Fuller Theological Seminary. During my professional career, I have served as a university professor and department chair (18 years), U.S. diplomat (5 years), and mental health professional (30 years). Most of my teaching years have been spent in faith-based universities, including a stint on the faculty of Loyola University Maryland's pastoral counseling graduate program from 2011-2013. I now spend my professional time as a clinical psychologist serving adults in Houston and around the world through international telehealth.

I first called Palmer my church home from 2004-2011, during which time I met and married my son Russell's father in Palmer's nave (not on the same day, of course), and Russell was baptized here in 2010. We returned to Palmer 2013-2018, before seven years away for diplomatic service. Russell (now a teen) and I returned to Houston in the summer of 2025 and made a beeline back to Palmer. It has been a blessing to return to this community, and I am grateful for the unconditional welcome we have received during this season of life, especially as a single parent. Over the years I have served in a number of roles within our community, including a Sunday school educator, chalice bearer, and committee member for Palmer's process of honoring same-gender marriages. As we settle back in to the community, Russell and I are connecting with both familiar and new activities (ushering, acolyting, bell ringing), and I am ecstatic that Russell has found his own spiritual home base in the youth group here.

Andrew Kraebel

I am an Associate Professor of English at Rice University, where my research focuses on the religious literature of England before the Reformation. Within that field, my particular areas

of interest include the history of Christian liturgy, biblical commentary and translation, and Christian mysticism. My first book offers a new history of the earliest English translations of the Bible, and it was awarded the Ecclesiastical History Society's book prize.

I am a cradle Episcopalian, and I grew up attending a small parish – originally a summer chapel – on the North Fork of Long Island, New York. While in college I spent a semester living and serving as an intern at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin in Times Square. I went on to earn my MA in Church History from Yale Divinity School and my PhD in English from Yale. During my time in New Haven I was a member of Christ Church, where I served on the vestry, on the altar guild, and as an acolyte.

My wife and I have been attending Palmer since the birth of our second child, Teddy, who was baptized at Palmer – and we immediately appreciated the many things that make this parish distinctive. It is so hard today to find a welcoming and inclusive church that is also committed to the long tradition of Christianity, its liturgy, music, and theology, and where Christianity is seen, not as providing easy answers, but as inviting and equipping people to wrestle with the hardest issues we face throughout our lives. I feel so lucky to be part of a church community in which my five-year-old, Henry, is being introduced to Christianity through these kinds of big questions, and I have been utterly amazed by all that Palmer's children's ministry has offered to our boys, and to my wife and I as parents.

I spend a lot of time studying what the Church has been throughout its history, but I am also committed to serving my church today, and to supporting it with whatever skills, knowledge, or other insights I can offer. I truly believe that Palmer is a unique place, and it is our responsibility to preserve it for the future and do all that we can to enable it to thrive.
