This composition is inspired by two Gregorian chant melodies: The 7th-century Hymn for the Vespers of the First Sunday of Advent Conditor alme siderum (Hymn 60) and the Kyrie of Mass XVIII (XI Century), for Advent and Lent.

Rachel Laurin expresses various descriptive ideas found in the text of the hymn verses through musical symbolism. A musical "World of Stars" begins the tone poem, after which the Kyrie melody represents the pleas of humankind for our prayers to be heard (verse 1). More dark and chaotic music depicts the temptation of Adam and inherited sin before yielding to a more triumphant passage representing the power of Divine glory and its ability to cure our ills (verse 2). The more tranquil middle section corresponds to verse 3 and 4 of the hymn, referring to the Creator's coming as a "child of Mary, blameless mother mild." A return of the more tumultuous music illustrates the plea made in verse 5 for our defense at Judgement Day. Finally, the music representing the "World of Stars" returns, this time combined with the Kyrie theme, which is played three times, in representation of the Trinity.

First Lesson: Genesis 3:1–15

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, 'Did God say, "You shall not eat from any tree in the garden"?' Second Lesson: Isaiah 40:1–11

Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins. A voice cries out: 'In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.' A voice says, 'Cry out!' And I said, 'What shall I cry?' Fifth Lesson: Zephaniah 3:14–18

Seventh Lesson: John 1:6–28 The Rev'd Allen Junek

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out, 'This was he of whom I said, "He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said,

'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord", as the prophet Isaiah said. Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.
