

Good Grief and Respect for Authority

34th in the "Samuel" Series 2 Samuel 1:1-16 January 21, 2024 Pastor Mickey Klink

Introduction: In this sermon, God instructs his church on the goodness of grief and the importance of respect

for	authority.
1)	The story of the books of Samuel transitions from king Saul to king David (vv. 1-10).
	1 Sam 31:2-6 – ² The Philistines were in hot pursuit of Saul and his sons, and they killed his sons Jonathan, Abinadab and Malki-Shua. ³ The fighting grew fierce around Saul, and when the archers overtook him, they wounded him critically. ⁴ Saul said to his armor-bearer, "Draw your sword and run me through, or these uncircumcised fellows will come and run me through and abuse me." But his armor-bearer was terrified and would not do it; so Saul took his own sword and fell on it. ⁵ When the armor-bearer saw that Saul was dead, he too fell on his sword and died with him. ⁶ So Saul and his three sons and his armor-bearer and all his men died together that same day.
2)	David and his men teach us the importance of human grief and lament (vv. 11-12).
3)	The judgment of the Amalekite teaches us to respect the authorities God places over us (vv. 13-16).

Response

Lord, help us to follow Jesus' example in the way we lament in this world and submit to the authorities over us.

Sunday Text Questions

2 Samuel 1:1-16 January 21, 2024 Pastor Mickey Klink

Read the text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.

1)	What is your experience with "death" – family, friends, co-workers, neighbors?
2)	The response of David and his men to the news of the death of Saul, his sons, and so many Israelites (vi 11-12) is filled with formal and personal expressions of lament and grief. What does that teach us?
3)	Is it fair to say that our culture has a death-free posture (avoidance, elevate youthfulness, health craze), and how does the Christian faith offer a different perspective on death and aging?
4)	David brings judgment on the Amalekite for assuming he could lay a hand on "the Lord's anointed" (volume 13-16), which teaches Christians to respect the authorities God has placed over us. What authority has God placed over your life?
5)	How can you show respect and even submission to authorities over you in the home, at work, in the city and even in the church?
6)	In what other ways, if any, did this passage speak into your life to teach, rebuke, correct, or train you in righteousness (cf. 2 Timothy 3:16)?
