

### It May Be the Lord

53<sup>rd</sup> in the "Samuel" Series
2 Samuel 16
August 4, 2024

**Introduction:** In this text, God teaches us the value of receiving and responding to criticism from others.

Proverbs	15.31	1-32.
LIUVUIDS	1 . / /	- 1

- <sup>31</sup> Whoever heeds life-giving correction will be at home among the wise.
- <sup>32</sup> Those who disregard discipline despise themselves, but the one who heeds correction gains understanding.

The encounter has much to teach us about receiving and responding to criticism. Three things in particular:

- (1) Criticism will not always be constructive, for sometimes its intentions are destructive (vv. 5-6).
- (2) Criticism, even of the destructive sort, can contain kernels of truth (vv. 7-8).
- (3) David teaches us how to receive and respond to criticisms of any sort (vv. 9-14).

#### **Pastoral Reflections:**

- The biggest danger of receiving criticism is not to our reputations but to our hearts.
- Whenever criticism comes—constructive or destructive—look to see if there is a kernel of truth in even the most exaggerated and unfair broadsides.
- Listen to criticisms as a tool God can and does use to minister to you.
- Even if your critic is wrong in most (or dare we say all) of what they say, do not let your heart move to judgment. Deal gently with your critic in your own mind.

#### Response

Christians, do not flee from life-giving correction but humbly pursue wisdom and understanding.

ead t	he text aloud and discuss together any significant observations or issues needing clarification.
1)	Have you ever been criticized unfairly, and how did you respond?
2)	How is the criticism of David by Shimei in vv. 5-8 both unfair and biased but also reflecting a kernel of truth?
3)	What is the reason David gives in vv. 9-12 to not retaliate against Shimei or to not reject entirely his hate-filled criticism but to receive it?
4)	If you are being honest, how well are you at receiving criticisms – both constructive and destructive?
5)	What advice would you give to another Christian (or yourself) about looking for a kernel of truth in any criticism you receive?
6)	How can you prepare yourself to receive criticisms with open arms and not to let your heart move to judgment of the critic?
7)	In what other ways, if any, did this passage speak into your life to teach, rebuke, correct, or train you in righteousness (cf. 2 Timothy 3:16)?

What does it really mean to keep "Christ" in Christmas? Christians today might be surprised that Christians of old had a very different perspective than most Christians today. ### CHRISTIAN HOSPITALITY AND ISLAM

Class Length: 4 weeks (August 4—August 25)

Teacher: Bryan Ott

Location: Fellowship Hall

## Summary:

When we hear the words "Islam" or "Muslim" what are the thoughts that come to our minds? What do we actually know about the religion of Islam, and more importantly, how well do we know Muslim people? What does it mean to love our neighbors as we love ourselves? Moving beyond political rhetoric, this course is intended to be a dialogical and pastoral discussion of Islam in America and how we Christians are to live with our non-Christian neighbors in a diverse country.

### Growth Goals:

To discuss how our perceptions of Islam may unhealthily affect how we think about Muslim people.

To better understand the distinctives of Muslim culture, faith and practice.

To understand how to avoid the rhetoric of the right and left in our society, in favor of adopting a posture of Christian hospitality. To define and describe Christian pluralism and discuss how the application of this theology may inform how we relate to our Muslim neighbors.
