**Introduction**

In this passage, the Psalmist celebrates a royal wedding between a righteous king and a beautiful bride.

**Structure:**

1. *Introduction* (45:1)
2. *Concerning the King* (45:2-9)
3. *Concerning the Bride* (45:10-15)
4. *Conclusion: The King's Blessing* (45:16-17)

**Notes:** While used for weddings throughout the history of the people of God, this Psalm ultimately trains the church to gaze upon the splendor of Jesus Christ, the cosmic bridegroom!

- The church rightfully praises Jesus Christ, the Bridegroom (vv. 1-9).
- The church, the bride of Christ, reflects the King's beauty and majesty (vv. 10-15).
- The marriage of the church to Christ is one of generational and eternal blessedness (vv. 16-17).

**Response:** Church, let us *rejoice and be glad and give him glory* (Rev. 19:7a), for our Bridegroom is worthy!
