## CALL TO WORSHIP: (Based on Ephesians 3:17-19)

Leader: May God the Father strengthen you with power

through His Spirit in your inner being,

so that Christ may dwell in your heart through faith;

so that you, being rooted and established in love,

may have power together with all the saints

to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

## **CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS:**

Leader: If we say we have no sin we deceive ourselves

and we are not rooted in the truth.

**People:** But if we confess our sins,

God is faithful and just and will forgive our sins

and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Leader: Let us then confess our sins to God our Father.

People: Most merciful God,

we confess that we are by nature sinful and unclean. We have sinned against You in thought, word and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved You with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

We justly deserve Your present and eternal punishment. For the sake of Your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us.

Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in Your will

and walk in Your ways to the glory of Your holy name. Amen.

Leader: In the mercy of almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us,

and for His sake God forgives us all our sins.

Those who believe in Jesus Christ are God's own children

and on them He bestows His Holy Spirit.

May the Lord, who has begun this good work in us,

bring it to completion in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

## PRAYER OF THE DAY: (Luther's Small Catechism)

Leader: Your kingdom comes Lord when You give us Your Holy Spirit.

People: So send us Your Spirit we pray Lord, that we believe Your Word,

lead godly lives that bear witness to You,

and share the love of Christ in what we do and say that many might welcome Your kingdom come. Amen.

#### FIRST SCRIPTURE READING: Exodus 17:1-7

The whole community of Israelites left the desert of Sin and traveled from place to place as the LORD commanded them. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. So they complained to Moses by saying, "Give us water to drink!"

Moses said to them, "Why are you complaining to me? Why are you testing the LORD?"

But the people were thirsty for water there. They complained to Moses and asked, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt? Was it to make us, our children, and our livestock die of thirst?"

So Moses cried out to the LORD, "What should I do with these people? They're almost ready to stone me!"

The LORD answered Moses, "Bring some of the leaders of Israel with you, and go to where the people can see you. Take the staff you used to strike the Nile River. I'll be standing in front of you there by a rock at Mount Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it for the people to drink."

Moses did this while the leaders of Israel watched him.

He named that place Massah [Testing] and Meribah [Complaining] because the Israelites complained and because they tested the LORD, asking, "Is the LORD with us or not?" – GW ®

## **SECOND SCRIPTURE READING:** Romans 5:1-8

Now that we have God's approval by faith, we have peace with God because of what our Lord Jesus Christ has done. Through Christ we can approach God and stand in His favor. So we brag because of our confidence that we will receive glory from God. But that's not all. We also brag when we are suffering. We know that suffering creates endurance, endurance creates character, and character creates confidence. We're not ashamed to have this confidence, because God's love has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us.

Look at it this way: At the right time, while we were still helpless, Christ died for ungodly people. Finding someone who would die for a godly person is rare. Maybe someone would have the courage to die for a good person. Christ died for us while we were still sinners. This demonstrates God's love for us. – GW ®

### **CHILDREN'S SERMON**

THE HOLY GOSPEL: John 4:5-30, 39-42

**H**e arrived at a city in Samaria called Sychar. Sychar was near the piece of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's Well was there. Jesus sat down by the well because He was tired from traveling. The time was about noon.

A Samaritan woman went to get some water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink of water." (His disciples had gone into the city to buy some food.)

The Samaritan woman asked Him, "How can a Jewish man like You ask a Samaritan woman like me for a drink of water?" (Jews, of course, don't associate with Samaritans.)

Jesus replied to her, "If you only knew what God's gift is and Who is asking you for a drink, you would have asked Him for a drink. He would have given you living water."

The woman said to Him, "Sir, You don't have anything to use to get water, and the well is deep. So where are You going to get this living water? You're not more important than our ancestor Jacob, are You? He gave us this well. He and his sons and his animals drank water from it."

Jesus answered her, "Everyone who drinks this water will become thirsty again. But those who drink the water that I will give them will never become thirsty again. In fact, the water I will give them will become in them a spring that gushes up to eternal life."

The woman told Jesus, "Sir, give me this water! Then I won't get thirsty or have to come here to get water."

Jesus told her, "Go to your husband, and bring him here."

The woman replied, "I don't have a husband."

Jesus told her, "You're right when you say that you don't have a husband. You've had five husbands, and the man you have now isn't your husband. You've told the truth."

The woman said to Jesus, "I see that you're a prophet! Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain. But You Jews say that people must worship in Jerusalem."

Jesus told her, "Believe me. A time is coming when you Samaritans won't be worshiping the Father on this mountain or in Jerusalem. You don't know what you're worshiping. We Jews know what we're worshiping, because salvation comes from the Jews. Indeed, the time is coming, and it is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth. The Father is looking for people like that to worship Him. God is a spirit. Those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth."

The woman said to Him, "I know that the Messiah is coming. When He comes, He will tell us everything." (*Messiah* is the one called *Christ*.)

Jesus told her, "I am He, and I am speaking to you now." ...

At that time His disciples returned. They were surprised that He was talking to a woman. But none of them asked Him, "What do you want from her?" or "Why are you talking to her?"

Then the woman left her water jar and went back into the city. She told the people, "Come with me, and meet a man who told me everything I've ever done. Could He be the Messiah?" The people left the city and went to meet Jesus...

Many Samaritans in that city believed in Jesus because of the woman who said, "He told me everything I've ever done." So when the Samaritans went to Jesus, they asked Him to stay with them. He stayed in Samaria for two days. Many more Samaritans believed because of what Jesus said. They told the woman, "Our faith is no longer based on what you've said. We have heard Him ourselves, and we know that He really is the Savior of the world." – GW ®

The Lord's Supper is celebrated at Bethany in the joyful confession that our Lord gives us His very Body and Blood for the forgiveness of sins in this sacrament. To help you prepare for communion we invite you to take a few moments of quiet prayer. For aid there are prayers on the front page of the hymnal for both before and after the reception of communion. Or simply pray, Dear Lord Jesus, at Your gracious invitation You invite me to come to You, to eat and drink Your holy body and blood as You Yourself have promised to give in this sacrament of Your altar. Forgive me of my sin, through this Your meal of Forgiveness. Let me experience the fullness of Your love, through this Your meal of love. Strengthen my faith, through this meal of Yours that calls for and bestows faith. Empower me to live for You, through this Your meal that promises life everlasting and equips me for daily living as one who has received You and Your gifts.

People: He is the root, we are the branches.


Leader: So ever keep in the mind the kindness of God
