The Sadness of Christmas

Lesson 2

Second Sunday of Advent: Light the Preparation Candle!

For Many People Christmas Is Far from Merry and Bright.

The holidays can be a time when barrenness, sadness, and loneliness are acutely felt.

A "Blue Christmas" brings a sense of helplessness and hopelessness. But with the Advent of Jesus Christ there's hope of reversals that are humanly impossible!

The Sadness of Christmas

Is there *sadness* in your life this Christmas? *Matthew 2:16-18*

- 1. The HISTORY of Rachel Genesis 29:1–33:7
 - > Her Life: Barrenness to FRUITFULNESS with the Birth of Joseph. Genesis 30:2, 22ff.
 - Her Death: Fruitfulness to SADNESS with the Birth of Benjamin. Genesis 35:16-21
 - ▶ Her Lineage: Rachel's grandson **EPHRAIM** and son **BENJAMIN** represent Israel. *Genesis 35:24-25; 46:19-25*
- 2. The MEMORY of Rachel Genesis 48:7; Ruth 4:11-21; 1 Samuel 10:2
 - > Jacob's Memory: **SADNESS** over her death. *Genesis* 48:7

"Now as for me, when I came from Paddan, Rachel died, to my sorrow, in the land of Canaan on the journey, when there was still some distance to go to Ephrath; and I buried her there on the way to Ephrath (that is, Bethlehem)."

Bethlehem's Memory: FRUITFULNESS of her life. Ruth 4:11-21; 1 Samuel 10:2

"May the LORD make the woman who is coming into your home like Rachel and Leah, both of whom built the house of Israel; and may you achieve wealth in Ephrathah and become famous in Bethlehem."

Here Is Hope for a Reversal from Sadness to Joyfulness!

- 3. The PROPHECY of Rachel Weeping Over Her Children Jeremiah 31:10-20
 - Jeremiah the "Weeping Prophet" laments over the exile of both Israel (Ephraim) and Judah (with Benjamin)

"Thus says the LORD, 'A voice is heard in Ramah, lamentation and bitter weeping. Rachel is weeping for her children; she refuses to be comforted for her children, because they are no more." Jeremiah 31:15

Where is Ramah?

A Benjamite city on the border of Judah near Bethlehem!

What Is Rachel Is Weeping Over?

Her "children" Israel who are in exile, especially Judah and Benjamin!

But There's Hope of a Reversal from Sadness to Joyfulness!

The Promise of Yahweh's New Covenant is wrapped around Rachel's inconsolable sadness!

Jeremiah 31:10-20

Yahweh's Promise to Israel as a Nation at the Advent of Her King

Repentance > Regeneration > Restoration (North & South) > Revelation to the Gentiles!

4. The REVERSAL of Rachel's Weeping Over Her Children — Matthew 2:12-23

- King Herod "the Great" was NEITHER great nor the true "King of the Jews." (2:1-11)
- The LORD WARNS the wisemen and Joseph of Herod's murderous plot. (2:12-15)
- ➤ Herod **BUTCHERS** Bethlehem's baby boys, so Rachel once again weeps for her children. (2:12-16-18)

Christ's Advents Bring Hope for a Reversal from Sadness to Joyfulness!

- > Jesus was **BORN** to be the "Man of Sorrows" who carried our sadness to the Cross.
 - "Jesus wept." Over Lazarus' death due to the curse of sin. John 11:35

 Over Jerusalem's rejection of Him. Luke 19:41–44; 13:34

 Over sin's sinfulness and God's just wrath in Gethsemane. Hebrews 5:7
- > Jesus was **RAISED** to reign as the King of Joy. Hebrews 12:1-2; 1:8-9; John 17:13

The Advent of Jesus Christ Our Lord Is Good News for the Sad!

- **LEARN** to lament in your sadness especially at Christmas.
 - Listen to a sermon on lament: "The Lost Art of Lament" Scan the QR.
 - Leverage the psalms of lament: Pray them back to God.
 - Learn to the lost art of lamenting: See the "I CRY!" Handout.



- LOOK to the Man of Sorrows whose Advents will reverse sadness into joyfulness.
 - Christ's First Advent brought sadness due to the sinfulness of sin and the hardness of hearts.
 - Christ's Second Advent will bring the joyfulness of righteousness and changed hearts.
 - We live in the "Now-Not Yet" of these Advents lamenting with great joy in Him.
