
made first-time decisions for Jesus Christ!

Testerday, I had the privilege of speaking at one of our nearly 30 participating RCI (Rural Church Initiative) L churches, while visiting CRF The Mine-Harrison County, OH. It felt like home.

Mount Shiloh Baptist Church had fallen victim to a dreaded flu virus sweeping through Harrison County. When a small rural church experiences sickness, it begins duct taping regular things together. If the same church sees illness for a more prolonged period of time, they begin to use gum instead of duct tape. Things on Sunday morning were cobbed together on the fly. The Pastor, and what was left of his family after the epidemic went door to door, filled in the gaps. That's when it dawned on me.

> This is what we talk about creating in ministry. We desire to show teenagers, older persons and recent believers, they are important. We want them to grasp that they make a difference and they need to be serving each other. It's funny when a flu-bug does a better job of creating value and service than a seminar at a national conference.

Challenge rallies the body around a mutually shared need.

Last night, due to the fact that Dawn and I were already in Harrison County to observe a regular ministry night at The Mine, we were allowed to step in and fill a few gaps as the virus pillaged our newest branch's worker base. Luke Marshall, who is the Ministry Director and regular speaker each Sunday, was sick. The worship and tech team was sick. The volunteer staff number was down significantly. They feared low attendance would be likely.

I spoke. Dawn registered students. A volunteer ran tech for the first time at The Mine. Luke's brother and another volunteer led worship. Two new community volunteers made popcorn and sold snacks. Carrie Olson, The Mine's Administrative Director, ran everything.

Value. Belonging. Ministry. Relationship.

The students didn't seem to mind. The same amount showed up, as always, except the students who were sick had been replaced by a group of brand new students. God doesn't miss a beat.

I have already written this letter once. I thought better of including it in the newsletter. Sometimes, things get stuck in your craw. It's easy to feel negatively about the challenges in ministry. The reality of CRF in these past months is anything but negative.

It is true that Crossroads Farm is meeting needs during a massive shift in teenage culture, CRF has viewed these

days as an opportunity to speak truth in love to a community of people who need a rock upon which to build life. We are excited about the new ways we can demonstrate a God who values dignity and purpose, community and individuality, form and void.

Next week, across our three branches, hundreds of students will celebrate Christmas together. We anticipate hundreds of students to attend and perhaps double this amount of deep-fried OreosTM to be consumed.

There will be students struggling with poverty and hunger. Some will be wrestling with familial disfunction. A large number will be lonely. Some are doubters. Many are determining how God speaks to their sexual identity in a

> world of dysforia. It is easy to look there: at the challenges. As the Bible says so clearly, "Even though we speak like this, beloved, we are convinced of better things in your case—things that accompany salvation."

We see better.

As we move toward our fourth branch, as we see greater and greater commitment from the CRF branch directorships, we are embracing a God who sees broken as an opportunity to redeem, restore and demonstrate value and purpose to rural students across the United States.

You may see flu germs. God sees openings in our best laid plans for Himself.

I trust this New Year offers you just enough challenge to see God do what God desires to do. 🜋
